ADDRESS

Our people are sincerely urged to read and study this book, the *Manual* of the Church of the Nazarene, for four important reasons, namely: Because it contains a brief history of the church, both its origin and growth; it also contains the doctrines of the church; the laws of the church; and it sets forth the objects for which the church exists.

The *Manual* has been formed by representative bodies of godly and consecrated men and women, elected by the people, sitting in General Assembly, who have carefully and prayerfully sought to promote the kingdom of God without regard to their personal interests. This fact gives weight and greater significance to the contents of this volume. The study of this *Manual* and of all the other *Manuals* published by previous General Assemblies reveals the fact that no changes have been made in our doctrines. We hope and believe that none will ever be made as these doctrines are founded upon the revealed Word of God which abides unchangeable forever. A few changes have been made by the Tenth General Assembly in the laws of the church, but the fundamental principles of our government remain the same. The laws founded upon these principles may be changed from time to time, but the principles underlying these laws must ever remain the same.

The government of our church is unique. In polity we are neither purely episcopal nor wholly congregational; but we are representative in form of government; the laity and the ministry have equal authority in all deliberative and law making bodies. Thus there is a balance of power between the ministry and the laity and combination of episcopal and congregational principles. We find our government fundamentally satisfactory.

The Church of the Nazarene has an evident and well defined commission from God, namely, to propagate the gospel throughout the world, seeking the conversion of sinners, the reclamation of backsliders, and the sanctification of believers, especially emphasizing the precious doctrine of full salvation. We have a definite objective but this objective is not for the sake of a mere existence. Our purpose lies outside of ourselves; it is to evangelize and then to conserve the results accomplished. This we believe can be done best through a well organized church movement. True, holiness does not need to be organized, but it can be promoted and conserved effectively only through organization.

We urge our people everywhere to read the brief history of our church that they may be informed concerning the origin and the growth of the church of which they are members. We urge them to study our doctrine in order to be intelligent members of the church. We believe doctrines to be fundamental, and these

should be understood, loved and promoted. We believe that the principles contained therein should master our affections and be a foundation for our conduct. We urge loyalty to our principles, interests and institutions.

It is important that our members acquaint themselves thoroughly with the laws of their church. A study of our laws and doctrines will create respect and love for them and love will result in genuine loyalty and faithfulness. Love and loyalty to our doctrines and laws will increase our efficiency and usefulness under the leadership of the Holy Ghost. Solidarity of support and effort in service with faith in God will yield gracious returns in the coming quadrennium.

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PART I
HISTORICAL STATEMENT



HISTORICAL STATEMENT

I. Near the close of the nineteenth century, a movement for the spread and conservation of scriptural holiness in organized church form developed almost simultaneously in various parts of the United States. This movement was similar to that of the previous century historically known as the Wesleyan revival. There was manifested everywhere a spontaneous drawing in the unity of the Spirit towards closer affiliation of those of like precious faith which finally culminated in the organization of the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene.

The great impulse of this movement has been the emphasis placed by the scriptures upon the fact that, in the atonement, Jesus Christ has made provision not only to save men from their sins, but also to perfect them in love.

II. On May 12, 1886, a number of the brethren in Providence, Rhode Island, interested in promoting the Wesleyan doctrine and experience of entire sanctification, organized and held weekly religious services, first in private homes, but after a few months in a rented store on Oxford street. On January 16, 1887, a Sunday school was organized with ninety-five members. On July 21, 1887, the People's Evangelical Church was organized with fifty-one members, Rev. F. A. Hillery acting as pastor. On November 25, 1888, the Mission Church, Lynn, Massachusetts, was organized with Rev. C. Howard Davis as pastor. On March 13 and

14, 1890, representatives from these churches and other evangelical holiness organizations in southern New England, assembled at Rock, Massachusetts, and organized the Central Evangelical Holiness Association. Rev. W. C. Ryder, pastor of the Independent Congregational Church of that place was elected president. Within the following year the Mission Church, Malden, Massachusetts, the Emmanuel Mission Church, North Attleboro, Massachusetts, and the Bethany Mission Church, Keene, New Hampshire, were organized.

In January, 1894, William Howard Hoople, a business man in New York City, founded a mission in Brooklyn, which, in the following May, was organized as an independent church, with a membership of thirty-two, and called "Utica Avenue Pentecostal Tabernacle." A church edifice was afterward erected, and Mr. Hoople was called to the pastorate. The following February the Bedford Avenue Pentecostal Church was organized, in an abandoned church building, and a little later, the Emmanuel Pentecostal Tabernacle. In December, 1895, delegates from these three churches formed the "Association of Pentecostal Churches of America," adopting a constitution, a summary of doctrines, and by-laws. This association was duly incorporated. Associated with Rev. William Howard Hoople in this work were Rev. H. B. Hosley, Rev. John Norberry, Rev. Charles BeVier, and Rev. H. F. Reynolds.

On November 12, 1896, a joint committee

from these two associations met in the city of Brooklyn, New York, to formulate some plan of union. For the benefit of the counsel and co-operation, several brethren prominent in the work were invited to act with the joint committee. Among this number were Rev. C. Howard Davis, Rev. G. W. Wilson, Rev. John Norberry, Rev. H. F. Reynolds, Rev. H. B. Hosley, and Rev. Charles H. BeVier. This meeting resulted in the union of the two bodies. It was agreed that the work should be continued under the name of the Association of Pentecostal Churches of America.

III. In October, 1895, a number of persons, under the leadership of Rev. Phineas F. Breesee, D. D., and Rev. J. P. Widney, LL. D., formed the First Church of the Nazarene, at Los Angeles, California, with one hundred and thirty-five charter members. They adopted statements of belief, and agreed to such general rules as seemed proper and needful for their immediate guidance, leaving to the future the making of such provisions as the work and its conditions might necessitate. As a result of this organization, a number of churches sprang into existence, reaching as far east as Chicago.

IV. As these two bodies came to know more of each other, it was felt that they should unite; and, after consultation by delegates from one body to the other, the following basis of union was prepared and unanimously adopted by both bodies. The first union assembly was held in Chicago, in October, 1907.

BASIS OF UNION

It is agreed that the two churches are one in the doctrines considered essential to salvation, especially the doctrines of justification by faith and entire sanctification subsequent to justification, also by faith, and, as a result, the precious experience of entire sanctification as a normal condition of the churches. Both churches recognize that the right of church membership rests upon experience; and that persons who have been born of the Spirit are entitled to its privileges.

We are agreed on the necessity of a superintendency, which shall foster and care for churches already established, and whose duty it shall be to organize and encourage the organizing of churches everywhere.

We are agreed that authority given to superintendents shall not interfere with the independent action of a fully organized church, each church enjoying the right of selecting its own pastor, subject to such approval as the General Assembly shall find wise to institute; the election of delegates to the various assemblies; the management of their own finances; and of all other things pertaining to their local life and work.

It is agreed that any church of the Association of Pentecostal Churches of America going into this organization which may feel it imperative with them to continue to hold their property in like manner as at present, shall be at liberty to do so.

It was agreed that the name of the united body should be, "The Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene."

V. In 1894, the first organization of the New Testament Church of Christ was effected by Rev. R. L. Harris, at Milan, Tennessee, with fourteen members. This church was deemed necessary to conserve the work of holiness, and soon spread throughout Western Texas and Arkansas. Prominent among the leaders was

Mrs. Mary Lee Harris (now Mrs. Cagle), the wife of Rev. R. L. Harris, who took up the work after the death of her husband.

In 1898, the first holiness churches were organized in Texas, by Rev. Thomas Rogers and Rev. Dennis Rogers, who came from California.

In 1900, the first Independent Holiness church was organized, by Rev. C. B. Jernigan, at Van Alstyne, Texas, and the denomination grew and prospered until, in 1903, there were twenty church organizations.

The legal representatives of the Independent Holiness Church and the New Testament Church of Christ met at Rising Star, Texas, in November, 1904, where a joint committee framed a Manual and statement of doctrine and basis of union. The union was fully consummated at Pilot Point, Texas, in November, 1905, and the united body adopted the name Holiness Church of Christ.

VI. At the General Assembly of the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene, at Chicago, in 1907, in response to an invitation, several persons were present from the Holiness Church of Christ. Some of these were appointed to attend; but were not authorized to take any action with reference to organic union. The Assembly invited them into counsel, and provisional arrangements were made for incorporating this Church into the general body, upon proper action on their part. Upon the invitation of the Holiness Church of Christ, the Second General Assembly convened at Pilot

Point, Texas, at 2:00 o'clock, Thursday afternoon, October 8, 1908. On the following Tuesday morning, R. B. Mitchum moved: "That the union of the two churches be now consummated," and the motion was seconded by Rev. C. W. Ruth. Revs. John N. Short, J. B. Creighton, C. B. Jernigan, H. B. Hosley, P. F. Bresee, and others spoke favorably to the motion. The motion was adopted by a unanimous rising vote, amid great enthusiasm, at 10:40 a. m., Tuesday, October 13, 1908.

VII. In the year 1898, Rev. J. O. McClurkan and a few of God's children called a meeting of the holiness people of Tennessee and adjacent states to be held in Nashville. At this convention an association was formed known as the Pentecostal Alliance, which name was afterward changed to the Pentecostal Mission. From the beginning these people were evangelistic in spirit, having a burning desire to disseminate the doctrine and experience of sanctification; hence there came together in different sections of the Southland groups of holiness people, known as bands of the Pentecostal Mission. They were decidedly missionary in spirit, and soon were sending their representatives to "the regions beyond." Throughout their career they have been characterized by this missionary zeal.

At different times the question of the union of the Pentecostal Mission with the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene had been discussed, and on February 13, 1915, this union was ef-

fectured at Nashville, Tennessee, thus uniting both the home and the foreign work of the Pentecostal Mission and the Pentecostal Church of the Nazarene.

VIII. In November, 1901, the first stage in the present holiness church movement in the British Isles began, when Rev. George Sharpe, who had been for thirteen and one-half years a preacher in the Methodist Episcopal Church, accepted a call to the Congregational Church at Ardrossan, Scotland. In September, 1905, he was accepted as the minister of Parkhead Congregational Church, Glasgow, where, after a strenuous, successful, and glorious ministry of thirteen months, he was evicted for preaching Bible holiness.

On September 30, 1906, the first services of the first distinctively holiness church were held in the Great Eastern Roads Hall, Glasgow. The charter members numbered eighty. Other churches were organized and became the Pentecostal Church of Scotland. Visits of Dr. E. F. Walker and Dr. H. F. Reynolds to Scotland, and a visit of Rev. George Sharpe and Mrs. Sharpe to the Fourth General Assembly, at Kansas City, Missouri, led the way to union with the Church of the Nazarene, which was consummated in November, 1915.

IX. The General Assembly of 1919, in response to memorials from thirty-five District Assemblies, changed the name of the organization to "Church of the Nazarene."

X. For many years a holiness movement had been developing in Minnesota, the Dakotas and Montana. It was originated by a group of Methodist laymen, and formally organized at Jamestown, North Dakota, in 1907, as The Laymen's Holiness Association. Rev. J. G. Morrison was its first president and leading evangelist. With him were associated Rev. Ira E. Hammer, Rev. S. C. Taylor, Rev. W. G. Bennett, and over twenty other evangelists and workers engaged in a wide-spread program of holiness evangelism and campmeeting promotion. In 1922 more than one thousand people who were identified with The Laymen's Holiness Association, under the leadership of these ministers, united with the Church of the Nazarene.

CONSTITUTION of the CHURCH OF THE NAZARENE

PREAMBLE

In order that we may preserve our God-given heritage, the faith once delivered to the saints, especially the doctrine and experience of sanctification as a second work of grace, and also that we may co-operate effectually with other branches of the Church of Jesus Christ in advancing God's kingdom among men, we, the ministers and lay members of the Church of the Nazarene, in accordance with the principles of constitutional legislation established among us, do hereby ordain, adopt and set forth as the fundamental law or constitution of the Church of the Nazarene, the Articles of Faith, the General Rules, and the Articles of Organization and Government, here following, to-wit:

PART ONE. ARTICLES OF FAITH

I. *The Triune God*

1. We believe in one eternally existent, infinite God, Sovereign of the universe. That He only is God, creative and administrative, holy in nature, attributes, and purpose. That He, as God, is Triune in essential being, revealed as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

II. *Jesus Christ*

2. We believe in Jesus Christ, the second person of the Triune Godhead; that He was eternally one with the Father; that He became incarnate by the Holy Spirit and was born of the Virgin Mary, so that two whole and perfect natures, that is to say the Godhead and manhood, are thus united in one person very God and very man, the God-man.

We believe that Jesus Christ died for our sins, and that He truly arose from the dead and took again His body, together with all things appertaining to the perfection of man's nature, wherewith He ascended into heaven and is there engaged in intercession for us.

III. *The Holy Spirit*

3. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Third Person of the Triune Godhead, that He is ever present and efficiently active in and with the Church of Christ, convincing the world of sin, regenerating those who repent and believe, sanctifying believers, and guiding into all truth as it is in Jesus.

IV. *The Holy Scriptures*

4. We believe in the plenary inspiration of the Holy Scriptures by which we understand the sixty-six books of the Old and New Testaments, given by divine inspiration, inerrantly revealing the will of God concerning us in all things necessary to our salvation; so that whatever is not contained therein is not to be enjoined as an article of faith.

V. *Original Sin, or Depravity*

5. We believe that original sin, or depravity, is that corruption of the nature of all the offspring of Adam, by reason of which every one is very far gone from original righteousness, or the pure state of our first parents at the time of their creation, is averse to God, is without spiritual life, and is inclined to evil, and that continually; and that it continues to exist with the new life of the regenerate, until eradicated by the baptism with the Holy Spirit.

VI. *Atonement*

6. We believe that Jesus Christ, by His sufferings, by the shedding of His own blood, and by His meritorious death on the cross, made a full atonement for all human sin, and that this atonement is the only ground of salvation, and that it is sufficient for every individual of Adam's race. The atonement is graciously efficacious to the salvation of the irresponsible and to the children in innocency but is efficacious to the salvation of those who reach the age of responsibility only when they repent and believe.

VII. *Free Agency*

7. We believe that man's creation in godlikeness included ability to choose between right and wrong, and that thus he was made morally responsible; that through the fall of Adam he became depraved so that he cannot now turn and prepare himself by his own natural strength and works to faith and calling upon God; but the grace of God through Jesus

Christ is freely bestowed upon all men, enabling all who will to turn from sin to righteousness, believe on Jesus Christ for pardon and cleansing from sin, and follow good works pleasing and acceptable in His sight.

We believe that man, though in the possession of the experience of regeneration and entire sanctification, may fall from grace and apostatize, and unless he repent of his sin, be hopelessly and eternally lost. [Amendment 1935].

VIII. *Repentance*

8. We believe that repentance, which is a sincere and thorough change of the mind in regard to sin, involving a sense of personal guilt and a voluntary turning away from sin, is demanded of all who have by act or purpose become sinners against God. The Spirit of God gives to all who will repent the gracious help of penitence of heart and hope of mercy, that they may believe unto pardon and spiritual life.

IX. *Justification, Regeneration, and Adoption*

9, §1. We believe that justification is that gracious and judicial act of God, by which He grants full pardon of all guilt and complete release from the penalty of sins committed, and acceptance as righteous, to all who believingly receive Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior.

§2. We believe that regeneration, or the new birth, is that gracious work of God, whereby the moral nature of the repentant believer is spiritually quickened and given a distinctively spiritual life, capable of faith, love, and obedience.

§3. We believe that adoption is that gracious act of God by which the justified and regenerated believer is constituted a son of God.

§4. Justification, regeneration, and adoption are simultaneous in the experience of seekers after God and are obtained upon the condition of faith, preceded by repentance; and to this work and state of grace the Holy Spirit bears witness.

X. *Entire Sanctification*

10. We believe that entire sanctification is that act of God, subsequent to regeneration, by which believers are made free from original sin, or depravity, and brought into a state of entire devotement to God, and the holy obedience of love made perfect.

It is wrought by the baptism with the Holy Spirit, and comprehends in one experience the cleansing of the heart from sin and the abiding indwelling presence of the Holy Spirit, empowering the believer for life and service.

Entire sanctification is provided by the blood of Jesus, is wrought instantaneously by faith, preceded by entire consecration; and to this work and state of grace the Holy Spirit bears witness.

This experience is also known by various terms representing its different phases, such as "Christian Perfection," "Perfect Love," "Heart Purity," "The Baptism with the Holy Spirit," "The Fulness of the Blessing," and "Christian Holiness."

XI. *Second Coming of Christ*

11. We believe that the Lord Jesus Christ will come again; that we who are alive at His coming shall not precede them that are asleep in Christ Jesus; but that, if we are abiding in Him, we shall be caught up with the risen saints to meet the Lord in the air, so that we shall ever be with the Lord.

XII. *Resurrection, Judgment, and Destiny*

12, §1. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, that the bodies both of the just and of the unjust shall be raised to life and united with their spirits—"they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation."

§2. We believe in future judgment in which every man shall appear before God to be judged according to his deeds in this life.

§3. We believe that glorious and everlasting life is assured to all who savingly believe in, and obediently follow, Jesus Christ our Lord; and that the finally impenitent shall suffer eternally in hell.

XIII. *Baptism*

13. We believe that Christian baptism is a sacrament signifying acceptance of the benefits of the atonement of Jesus Christ, to be administered to believers, as declarative of their faith in Jesus Christ as their Savior, and full purpose of obedience in holiness and righteousness.

Baptism being the symbol of the New Testa-

ment, young children may be baptized, upon request of parents or guardians who shall give assurance for them of necessary Christian training.

Baptism may be administered by sprinkling, pouring, or immersion, according to the choice of the applicant.

XIV. *The Lord's Supper*

14. We believe that the Memorial and Communion Supper instituted by our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, is essentially a New Testament sacrament, declarative of His sacrificial death, through the merits of which believers have life and salvation, and promise of all spiritual blessings in Christ. It is distinctively for those who are prepared for reverent appreciation of its significance, and by it they show forth the Lord's death till He come again. Being the Communion feast, only those who have faith in Christ and love for the saints should be called to participate therein.

XV. *Divine Healing*

15. We believe in the Bible doctrine of divine healing and urge our people to seek to offer the prayer of faith for the healing of the sick. Providential means and agencies when deemed necessary should not be refused.

PART TWO. THE CHURCH

I. *The General Church*

16. The Church of God is composed of all spiritually regenerate persons, whose names are written in heaven.

II. *The Churches Severally*

17. The churches severally are to be composed of such regenerate persons as by providential permission, and by the leadings of the Holy Spirit, become associated together for holy fellowship and ministries.

III. *The Church of the Nazarene*

18. The Church of the Nazarene is composed of those persons who have voluntarily associated themselves together according to the doctrines and polity of said church, and who seek holy Christian fellowship, the conversion of sinners, the entire sanctification of believers, their upbuilding in holiness, and the simplicity and spiritual power manifest in the primitive New Testament Church, together with the preaching of the Gospel to every creature.

IV. *Agreed Statement of Belief*

19, §1. Recognizing that the right and privilege of persons to church membership rest upon the fact of their being regenerate, we would require only such avowals of belief as are essential to Christian experience.

§2. We, therefore, deem belief in the following brief statements to be sufficient:

(1) In one God—the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

(2) In the plenary inspiration of the Old and New Testament Scriptures, and that they contain all truth necessary to faith and Christian living.

(3) That man is born with a fallen nature, and is, therefore, inclined to evil, and that continually.

(4) That the finally impenitent are hopelessly and eternally lost.

(5) That the atonement through Jesus Christ is for the whole human race; and that whosoever repents and believes on the Lord Jesus Christ is justified and regenerated and saved from the dominion of sin.

(6) That believers are to be sanctified wholly, subsequent to regeneration, through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

(7) That the Holy Spirit bears witness to the new birth, and also to the entire sanctification of believers.

(8) In the return of our Lord, in the resurrection of the dead, and in the final judgment.

V. *The General Rules*

20, §1. To be identified with the visible Church is the blessed privilege and sacred duty of all who are saved from their sins, and are seeking completeness in Christ Jesus. It is required of all who desire to unite with the Church of the Nazarene, and thus to walk in fellowship with us, that they shall show evidence of salvation from their sins by a godly walk and vital piety; that they shall be, or earnestly desire to be, cleansed from all indwelling sin; and that they shall evidence this—

§2. FIRST. By avoiding evil of every kind, including:

(1) Taking the name of God in vain.

(2) Profaning of the Lord's Day, either by unnecessary labor, or business, or by the patronizing or reading of secular papers, or by holiday diversions.

(3) Using of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, or trafficking therein; giving influence to, or voting for, the licensing of places for the sale of the same; using of tobacco in any of its forms, or trafficking therein.

(4) Quarreling, returning evil for evil, gossiping, slandering, spreading surmises injurious to the good names of others.

(5) Dishonesty, taking advantage in buying and selling, bearing false witness, and like works of darkness.

(6) The indulging of pride in dress or behavior. Our people are to dress with the Christian simplicity and modesty that become holiness. "In like manner also, that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety; not with broided hair, or gold, or pearls, or costly array; but (which becometh women professing godliness) with good works" (1 Timothy 2:9, 10). "Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel; but let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price" (1 Peter 3:3, 4).

(7) Songs, literature, and entertainments not to the glory of God; the theater, the ball room, the circus, and like places; also, lotteries and games of chance; looseness and impropriety of conduct; membership in or fellowship with oathbound, secret orders or fraternities. "Know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity with God? whosoever therefore will be a friend of the world is the enemy of God" (James 4:4). "Be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers: for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? and what communion hath light with darkness? . . . Wherefore come out from among them, and be ye separate, saith the Lord, and touch not the unclean thing; and I will receive you" (2 Corinthians 6:14-17).

§3. SECOND. By doing that which is enjoined in the Word of God, which is both our rule of faith and practice, including:

- (1) Being courteous to all men.
- (2) Contributing to the support of the ministry and the church and its work, according to the ability which God giveth.
- (3) Being helpful to those who are of the household of faith, in love forbearing one another.
- (4) Loving God with all the heart, soul, mind, and strength.
- (5) Attending faithfully all the ordinances of God, and the means of grace, including the public worship of God, the ministry of the Word, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper;

searching the Scriptures and meditating therein; family and private devotions.

(6) Seeking to do good to the bodies and souls of men; feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and imprisoned, and ministering to the needy, as opportunity and ability are given.

(7) Pressing upon the attention of the unsaved the claims of the gospel, inviting them to the house of the Lord, and trying to compass their salvation..

§4. THIRD. By abiding in hearty fellowship with the church, not inveighing against its doctrines and usages, but being in full sympathy and conformity therewith.

PART THREE. ARTICLES OF ORGANIZATION AND GOVERNMENT

ARTICLE I. FORM OF GOVERNMENT

21, §1. The Church of the Nazarene has a representative form of government.

§2. We are agreed on the necessity of a superintendency, which shall foster and care for churches already established, and whose duty it shall be to organize and encourage the organizing of churches everywhere.

§3. We are agreed that authority given to superintendents shall not interfere with the independent action of a fully organized church, each church enjoying the right of selecting its own pastor, subject to such approval as the General Assembly shall find wise to institute; the election of delegates to the various assem-

blies; and management of its own finances; and all other things pertaining to its local life and work.

§4. It is agreed that any church of the Association of Pentecostal Churches of America going into this organization which may feel it imperative with it to continue to hold its property in like manner as at present, shall be at liberty to do so.

ARTICLE II. LOCAL CHURCHES

22. The membership of a local church shall consist of all who have been organized as a church by those authorized so to do and who have been publicly received by those having proper authority, after having declared their experience of salvation, their belief in our doctrines, and their willingness to submit to our government.

ARTICLE III. DISTRICT ASSEMBLIES

23. The General Assembly shall organize the membership of the Church into District Assemblies, giving such lay and ministerial representation therein as the General Assembly may deem fair and just, and shall determine qualifications of such representatives; *provided*, however, that all elders in good standing shall be members thereof. The General Assembly shall also fix the boundaries of Assembly Districts, shall define the powers and duties of District Assemblies.

ARTICLE IV. THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

24, *Section 1. How Composed.* The General Assembly shall be composed of ministerial and

lay delegates in equal numbers, elected thereto by District Assemblies of the Church of the Nazarene; such ex officio members as the General Assembly shall from time to time direct; and such representatives of the missionary districts of the Church of the Nazarene as may be provided for by the General Assembly.

25, Sec. 2. Election of Delegates. Every District Assembly shall elect by ballot at its session immediately preceding the meeting of the General Assembly, an equal number of ministerial and lay delegates to the General Assembly; provided that the ministerial delegates shall be elders of the Church of the Nazarene. Each Assembly District shall be entitled to at least one ministerial and one lay delegate, and such additional delegates as its membership may warrant on the basis of representation fixed by the General Assembly. Each Assembly District shall elect alternate delegates not exceeding the number of its delegates.

26, Sec. 3. Credentials. The Secretary of each District Assembly shall furnish certificates of election to the delegates and alternates severally elected to the General Assembly, and shall also send certificates of such elections to the General Church Secretary of the Church of the Nazarene immediately following the adjournment of the District Assembly.

27, Sec. 4. Quorum. When the General Assembly is in session a majority of the whole number of delegates elected thereto shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

If a quorum has once been had, a less number may approve the minutes then remaining unapproved, and adjourn.

28, Sec. 5. *General Superintendents.* The General Assembly shall elect by ballot from among the elders of the Church of the Nazarene as many General Superintendents as it may deem necessary, who shall constitute the Board of General Superintendents. Any vacancy in the office of General Superintendent in the interim of General Assemblies shall be filled by a majority vote of all the District Superintendents of the Church of the Nazarene.

29, Sec. 6. *Presiding Officers.* A General Superintendent appointed thereto by the Board of General Superintendents, shall preside over the daily meetings of the General Assembly. But if no General Superintendent be so appointed or be present, the General Assembly shall elect one of its members as temporary presiding officer.

30; Sec. 7. *Rules of Order.* The General Assembly shall adopt Rules of Order governing its manner of organization, procedure, committees, and all other matters pertaining to the orderly conduct of its business. It shall be the judge of the election and qualifications of its own members.

31, Sec. 8. *General Court of Appeals.* The General Assembly shall, from among the members of the Church of the Nazarene, elect a General Court of Appeals, and shall define its jurisdiction and powers.

32, Sec. 9. Powers and Restrictions. (1) The General Assembly shall have power to legislate for the Church of the Nazarene, and to make rules and regulations for all the departments related to or associated with it in any respect, but not in conflict with this Constitution.

(2) No local church shall be deprived of the right to call its pastor, subject to such approval as the General Assembly shall find wise to institute.

(3) All local churches, officers, ministers and laymen shall always have the right to a fair and orderly trial and the right to take an appeal.

PART FOUR. AMENDMENTS

33. The provisions of this Constitution may be repealed or amended when concurred in by a two-thirds vote of all the members of the General Assembly, and when concurred in by not less than two-thirds of all the District Assemblies of the Church of the Nazarene. Either the General Assembly or any District Assembly may take the initiative in the matter of proposing such alterations or amendments. As soon as such alterations or amendments shall have been adopted as herein provided, the result of the vote shall be announced by the Board of General Superintendents, whereupon such alterations or amendments shall have full force and effect.

SPECIAL RULES

I. Support of the Church

“Even so the Lord ordained that they which preach the gospel should live of the gospel” (1 Cor. 9:14).

34, §1. There can be no doubt (1) that the church is obligated to support its ministers, who have been called of God, and who, under the direction of the church, have given themselves wholly to the work of the ministry; nor (2) that all the members of the church have voluntarily committed themselves to this task of supporting the ministry. We urge, therefore, that money be gathered weekly for this holy business, and that, wherever possible and practicable, the pastor's salary be paid regularly every week. [70.]

§2. We believe that the scriptural method of gathering money for the support of the Church is by means of tithes and offerings. We urge that our people adopt tithing as the scriptural and satisfactory plan, that each member may do his minimum share in the support of the whole church, local, district, and general. And on the basis of the divine promises to liberal givers, we exhort our people to make freewill offerings, in addition to tithes, as generous as circumstances will permit. [429.]

§3. In disbursing to meet the requirements of the local, district, and general programs of the

Church of the Nazarene, local churches are urged to adopt and practice the budget plan, and wherever possible the general and district apportionments be paid monthly. [62 §14, 103 §7, 123 §§1-7.]

II. Temperance and Prohibition

35, §1. The Holy Scriptures and human experience alike condemn the use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage. The manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors for such purpose is a sin against God and the human race. Total abstinence from all intoxicants is the Christian rule for the individual, and total prohibition of the traffic in intoxicants is the duty of civil government. [420.]

§2. Only unfermented wine and unleavened bread should be used in the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. [62 §10, 206, 209, 370.]

III. Marriage and Divorce

36, §1. The institution of marriage was ordained of God in the time of man's innocency, and is, according to apostolic authority, "honorable in all"; it is the mutual union of one man and one woman for fellowship, helpfulness and the propagation of the race. Our people should cherish this sacred estate as becomes Christians, and should enter it only after earnest prayer for divine direction, and when assured that the contemplated union is in accordance with scriptural requirements. They should seek earnestly the blessings which God has ordained in connection with the wedded state, namely, holy

companionship, parenthood and mutual love—the elements of home building. The marriage covenant is morally binding so long as both shall live, and, therefore, may not be dissolved at will.

§2. We hold that persons who obtain divorce under the civil law where the scriptural ground for divorce, namely, adultery, does not exist, and subsequently remarry, are living in adultery, and are unworthy of membership in the Church of the Nazarene; and though there may exist such other causes and conditions as may justify divorce under the civil law, yet only adultery will supply such ground as may justify the innocent party in remarrying. [41, 42, 47 §§1-2.]

§3. The ministers of the Church of the Nazarene are positively forbidden to solemnize the marriage of persons not having the scriptural right to marry. [200a §6.]

IV. Church Officers

37. We direct our local churches in selecting their church officers to elect only such as are clearly in the experience of entire sanctification. [57.]

V. Growth in Grace

38. There is a marked distinction between a perfect heart and a perfect character. The former is obtained in an instant, the result of entire sanctification, but the latter is the result of growth in grace.

Our mission to the world is not alone the spreading of scriptural holiness as a doctrine, but it is also that we be "an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity." Our people should give careful heed to the development of holiness in the fear of the Lord, and to the development of the Christian graces in the heart and of their manifestation in the daily life. [10, 111 §5.]

VI. Stewardship

39. Our people should recognize God's ownership of all things and our trusteeship—that we are but stewards of our own lives and in the use of our time, means, and other possessions; and that we are under the sacred obligation of systematic and proportionate giving of our time and means for the support of Christian work, and of holding and using all possessions sacredly unto the Lord. This being essential to the more abundant life, we should seek by all proper means to promote the practice of stewardship throughout the church. [89, 154a, 297.]

Preamble

All life must have law; all organization must have government. He who is Head over all things unto the Church Himself gave form and order unto His body of followers and representatives. We seek as a church to conform to principles of government in accord with the Holy Scriptures and Divine providences, that all things may be done scripturally, decently, and in order.

The government of the Church of the Nazarene is representative, and thus avoids the extremes of episcopacy on the one hand, and unlimited congregationalism on the other.

CHAPTER I

THE LOCAL CHURCH

I. Organization of Local Churches

40. Local churches may be organized by the District Superintendent, or by the General Superintendent having jurisdiction, or by an elder authorized by either of them. [22, 139 §1, 257 §5, 216.]

II. Full Membership

41. All persons who have been organized into a local church by those authorized so to do, and all who have been publicly received by the pastor, the District Superintendent, or the General Superintendent, after having declared their experience of salvation, and their belief in the doctrines of the Church of the Nazarene, and their willingness to submit to its government, shall compose the full membership of the local church; *provided*, however, that only church members who have attained to their twelfth birthday shall be entitled to vote in annual or special church meetings. [22, 36 §2, 42, 48, 62 §2, 139 §1, 257 §5.]

42. When, at any time, there are persons who desire to unite with the church, having been favorably considered by the pastor after consultation with the church membership committee, the minister having charge shall call the applicants forward, and explain to them briefly

the privileges of membership in the church and especially with reference to the General Rules [20], and question them in reference to their faith and experience, using the approved form found in Part VII, Chapter II, 369, *Reception of Members* in the *Manual*, and, if acceptable, receive them into church membership. [36 §2, 47 §§1-2, 65a, 207a, 215a.]

43. Members of missions, where the organization of a local church has not been effected, shall not be counted as church members nor reported as church members; *provided*, that persons constituting membership in a mission, may, when duly received according to 42 and 43, hold church membership in some regularly organized local church in which they shall be counted as church members. But the members of missions shall not be reported in the annual statistics as church members. [60.]

III. Probationary Membership

44. Any local church may, through its church board, [103 §22] establish a system of probationary membership; but probationers must not be counted as church members.

45. Probationers shall have all the privileges of church members, with the exception of voting and holding church office.

46. Probationers may be received into full membership or dropped at any time, at the discretion of the pastor and church membership committee.

IV. Church Membership Committee

47, §1. The church board shall provide a church membership committee of not fewer than three persons whose duty it shall be to act in the capacity of an advisory committee with the pastor as chairman. [42, 103 §23.]

This committee shall seek out and recommend to the pastor such persons as may qualify for full membership in the Church of the Nazarene. [19, 20, 36 §2.]

§2. No person shall be received into full membership of the local church without the prior consultation of the pastor with the church membership committee regarding that person's reception.

V. Church Letters

48. The pastor, when requested by a member, may grant a transfer of church membership [see form in 378] to any local church of the Church of the Nazarene that may be named, such transfer to be valid for three months only. When the reception of the transfer is acknowledged by the receiving local church such person's membership in the former local church shall cease.

The pastor may, when requested by a member, grant a certificate of commendation [see form in 376] to any evangelical church that may be named, such person's membership in the local church issuing the certificate ceasing immediately.

The pastor may, when requested by a member, grant a letter of dismissal [see form in

377], such person's membership ceasing immediately. [62 §12.]

49, §1. A member of a local church, on removing his place of residence, is required to report to his pastor at least once in six months; and upon failure so to do, his name may be removed from the church roll by the action of the church board. After such action of the church board the pastor shall write opposite his name "Removed without letter." [103 §24.]

§2. When a member of a local church shall absent himself from all religious services of the church for six successive months without a reason deemed justifiable by the church board, his name may be removed from the church roll by action of the church board, after having been visited and faithfully dealt with, when possible, and after such action of the church board the pastor shall write opposite his name "Removed by the church board." [103 §25.]

§3. When a licensed or an ordained minister has united with the church membership or ministry of another denomination, his membership in the local church shall, because of that fact, immediately cease, and there shall be written opposite his name "Removed by uniting with another denomination." [207a §1, 215a §1.]

§4. When a member of a local church has accepted license to preach or ordination from any other religious organization, his membership in the local church shall, because of that fact, immediately cease, except in case such person is temporarily commissioned by that re-

ligious organization to do foreign missionary work.

§5. In case a licensed or an ordained minister shall, without the written approval of the district advisory board of the Assembly District in which he holds his ministerial membership or the written approval of the Board of General Superintendents, regularly conduct independent church activities which are not under the direction of the Church of the Nazarene, or be connected with the operating staff of an independent church or other religious group, his church membership in the local church shall, because of that fact, immediately cease, and there shall be written opposite his name, "Removed from church membership." [207a §2, 215a §2.]

50. When a member of a local church removes to another locality, his pastor shall notify the pastor of the local church nearest to the locality, giving the name and address, if known, of the member who has moved. [62 §9.]

VI. Church Meetings

51. A meeting of the members of a local church for conference and for the transaction of any business not otherwise provided for shall be known as a church meeting. [64, 69 §1, 71 §§1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 72 §1, 83, 90, 99, 109 §4, 110 §5.]

Only those persons who have been received into full membership and have attained to their twelfth birthday shall be entitled to vote in church meetings. [41.]

Any business, including elections, in harmony with the spirit and order of the church, and not otherwise specially provided for, may be transacted at any church meeting. [128, 308 §1.]

52. In all cases where the civil law requires a specific course of procedure in calling and conducting church meetings that course should be strictly followed. [92.]

53. The pastor, who shall be, *ex officio*, president of the local church, or the District Superintendent, or the General Superintendent having jurisdiction, or someone appointed by the District Superintendent or the General Superintendent, shall preside at annual or special church meetings. [63, 139 §11, 257 §9.]

54. An annual church meeting of church members shall be held for each local church within sixty days prior to the meeting of the District Assembly, public notice of the same always being given from the pulpit at least two Sundays preceding. [68, 71, 83, 93.]

55. The secretary of the church board shall be the secretary of all church meetings, and in his absence a secretary *pro tempore* shall be elected. [104 §4.]

56. Reports shall be given at the annual church meeting by the pastor [62 §16], the superintendents of Sunday Bible schools [110 §1], the presidents of the Nazarene young people's societies [116], the presidents of the local woman's missionary societies [122], the deaconesses [73, 186, 191], the local preachers [78],

the stewards [89], the trustees [95], the local church school board [109 §4], the secretary [104 §2], and the treasurer [105 §5] of the church board.

57. At the annual church meeting, there shall be an election, by ballot, of the stewards [83], the trustees [90, 93], the Sunday Bible school superintendent [110 §5], and the members of the church school board [106], of the local church, to serve for the next church year and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Local churches in selecting their church officers are directed to elect only such as are clearly in the experience of entire sanctification. [See Special Rules 37.]

58. At the annual church meeting, there shall be an election, by ballot, of lay delegates to the District Assembly, on the basis of representation fixed by the General Assembly according to 131 §§ 1, 2.

59. Special meetings of church members of the local church, for conference or the transaction of business, may be called at any time by the pastor or the church board after having obtained the consent of the pastor, or of the District Superintendent, or of the General Superintendent having jurisdiction.

Public notice of special church meetings shall always be given from the pulpit in at least two preceding regular services, or in such manner as meets the requirements of civil law. [68 §1, 71, 83, 88, 93, 94.]

VII. The Church Year

60. The church year shall begin on the Monday immediately following the final adjournment of the District Assembly of the Assembly District in which the local church is situated, and shall close at 12:00 o'clock midnight on the Sunday immediately following the final adjournment of the District Assembly.

But the statistical year shall begin with the first day of the month in which the District Assembly is held and close with the last day of the month immediately preceding the next meeting of the District Assembly. [43, 62 §15.]

VIII. The Pastor

61. A pastor is an elder or a licensed minister [68 §1] who, under the call of God and His people, has the oversight of a local church. [37.]

62. The duties of a pastor are:

§1. To preach the Word. [206, 209.]

§2. To receive persons into membership in the local church according to 41 and 42.

§3. To administer the sacraments in harmony with 206 and 209.

§4. To care for the people by pastoral visitation, particularly of the sick and needy. [73, 186.]

§5. To comfort those who mourn.

§6. To reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with all longsuffering and doctrine.

§7. To seek, by all means, the conversion of sinners, the sanctification of the converted, and

the upbuilding of God's people in their most holy faith. [18.]

§8. To have the care of all departments of local church work.

§9. The pastor shall, when a member of a local church removes to another locality, notify the pastor of the local church nearest to the locality, giving the name and address, if known, of the member who has moved. [50.]

§10. The pastor shall administer the sacrament of the Lord's Supper at least once a quarter. If he is a licensed minister but has failed to pass in the prescribed course of study as provided in 206 [see also 370], he shall arrange for such administration by an elder [35 §2.]

§11. The pastor shall, within each church year [60], read to the congregation the Constitution of the Church of the Nazarene and the Special Rules contained in 1 to 41 both inclusive.

§12. The pastor may, when requested by a member, grant a transfer of church membership [378, 379], a certificate of commendation [376], or a letter of dismissal [377]. [48.]

§13. The pastor shall appoint the teachers of the Sunday Bible school in harmony with 110 §4.

§14. The pastor shall, together with the church board, according to plans adopted by the General Assembly and agreed to by the District Assembly, arrange for the raising of the apportionment of the general budget funds

and the apportionment of the district budget funds made to the local church of which he is pastor, and raise these apportionments. [103 §7.]

The pastor shall see that all general budget funds raised through the local woman's missionary society are remitted promptly through the regular channels of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, and that all the other general budget funds are remitted promptly to the General Treasurer; and that all district budget funds are remitted promptly to the district treasurer. [105 §2.]

§15. The pastor shall supervise the preparation of all statistical reports from all departments of the local church, and shall promptly present all such reports through the district secretary to the District Assembly. [60, 111 §8.]

§16. The pastor shall submit a report to the annual church meeting. [56.]

§17. The pastor shall appoint an investigating committee of not fewer than three or more than five in case of accusation filed against a church member. [303 §1.]

63. The pastor shall be, *ex officio*, president of the local church, chairman of the church board, and head of the church schools, the Nazarene young people's societies, and all other subsidiary organizations in connection with the local church. [53, 101, 111 §1, 114, 115, 118 §§1-2, 121.]

The pastor shall have the right to a voice in

the nomination of all heads of all departments of the local church. [110 §2, 116, 122.]

64. The pastor shall not contract bills nor create financial obligations for the local church of which he is pastor, except he be authorized and directed by vote of the church board or by vote of a church meeting, which action shall be duly recorded in the minutes of the church board or of the church meeting respectively. [103 §§1, 7.]

65. The pastor shall always show due regard for the united advice of the District Superintendent and the district advisory board. [137, 150, 154 §1, 207b, 215b.]

65a. In case a licensed or ordained minister presenting credentials from another denomination, shall, during the interim of sessions of the District Assembly, make application for membership in a local church, the pastor may not receive such applicant without first having obtained the favorable recommendation of the district advisory board. [154 §9, 207a, 215a.]

66. For the exercise of his office the pastor shall be amenable to the District Assembly, to which he shall report annually and give brief testimony to his personal Christian experience. [133 §1, 207, 215.]

67. The pastor shall automatically become a member of the local church of which he is pastor; or, in case of more than one local church on his charge, of the church of his choice. [204, 214.]

IX. Calling of a Pastor

68, §1. An elder or a licensed minister [61] may be called to the pastorate of a local church by a two-thirds favorable vote of the church members of voting age present and voting by ballot at a duly called annual or special meeting of the local church; *provided*, that such elder or licensed minister shall have been nominated to the local church by the church board, which, after having advised with the District Superintendent, made such nomination by a majority vote by ballot of all its members; and *provided*, the nomination shall have received the approval of the District Superintendent [32 (2), 37, 103 §2, 139 §8.]

§2. In case of disagreement between the church board and the District Superintendent, the church board or the District Superintendent may submit the matter to the General Superintendent having jurisdiction for his decision. From such decision either the church board or the District Superintendent may appeal to the Board of General Superintendents for a final decision.

§3. The call of a pastor may be only for a term ending with the close of the next church year but the call may be extended as hereinafter provided [71, 72.]

69. In case any local church has not called a pastor prior to the convening of the District Assembly, the General Superintendent presiding at the District Assembly, the District Superintendent, and the district advisory board,

in concurrence with the delegates from such local church, shall make pastoral arrangements for that local church. [136, 154 §2, 257 §6.]

70. When a pastor is called, the local church should specify the remuneration he may expect, such amount having been recommended by the church board. When agreement has been entered into between the local church and the pastor in regard to his remuneration, the payment of the pastor's salary in full shall be considered a moral obligation by the church. If, however, the church becomes unable to continue the payment of the salary agreed upon, such inability and failure shall not be considered a sufficient cause for civil action against the church by the pastor; and in no case shall the church be legally responsible in excess of funds raised during the term of the pastor's actual service, and not otherwise designated.

The local church should also make provision for his traveling and moving expenses. [34 §1, 103 §§5, 6.]

X. Renewing the Call of the Pastor

71, §1. The call of a pastor may be renewed for the second year and each succeeding year of his pastorate without the nomination of the church board, at a church meeting duly called for this purpose [59] and held at least ninety days prior to the date of convening the next District Assembly, by two-thirds vote, by ballot, of all the church members of voting age present and voting; *provided*, such renewal call shall be approved by the District Superin-

tendent [139 §8] within thirty days after such call. His failure to disapprove shall be considered and treated as approval.

§2. In case of the disapproval of the renewal call by the District Superintendent within that time, either the local church or the District Superintendent may submit the matter to the General Superintendent having jurisdiction for his decision. From such decision either the local church or the District Superintendent may appeal to the Board of General Superintendents for a final decision.

§3. However, it is hereby *provided*, that the local church may, when voting to renew pastoral relations, at a church meeting duly called for that purpose [59] at least ninety days prior to the date of convening the next District Assembly, by two-thirds vote, by ballot, of the church members of voting age present and voting, extend the call for a period of two or three years, on condition that such extended call shall have been recommended by majority vote of all the members of the church board and approved in writing by the District Superintendent.

§4. In case of additional renewals of such pastorate the procedure shall be the same as that stated in 71 §1, but each successive renewal shall not be for longer than three years.

§5. In case the church meeting for the renewal call is held at a date later than ninety days prior to the convening of the next District

Assembly, the procedure shall be that of calling a pastor according to 68.

§6. Acceptance of an extended call to pastoral relations shall be given by the minister not later than thirty days from the date of the church meeting voting the call.

§7. After a minister has accepted a call for a period longer than one year, he shall not resign therefrom at any time without first having obtained the written approval of the District Superintendent to his resignation.

72, §1. In case the District Superintendent and the church board shall be of the opinion that the question of the continuance of pastoral relations beyond the close of the first year of a two-year term or the close of the first year or the second year of a three-year term of such extended pastorate, should be submitted to the local church, the District Superintendent and the church board together may order the question submitted to vote at a special church meeting [59] held at least ninety days prior to the date of convening the next District Assembly. The question shall be submitted in the following form: "Shall the present pastoral relations be continued beyond the end of the present church year?"

§2. If the church, by a two-thirds vote, by ballot, of the church members of voting age present and voting, decides to continue the present pastoral relations, the office of the pastor shall continue as though such vote had not been taken.

If, however, the church fails to decide by such vote to continue the present pastoral relations, the term of office of the pastor shall terminate with the close of the next District Assembly.

XI. The Local Deaconess

73. A woman who is a church member of the Church of the Nazarene and believes that she is divinely led to engage in ministering to the sick and the needy, comforting the sorrowing, and doing other works of Christian benevolence, and who gives evidence in her life of ability, grace, and usefulness, after proper examination by the church board as to her qualifications for that work, and recommendation by the pastor, may be licensed as a local deaconess for one year by the church board of the local church. She shall be a member of the local church where she is engaged. She shall make a report to the local church at the annual church meeting. [37, 56, 103 §10.]

74. The church board shall issue to each local deaconess a license signed by the pastor and the secretary of the church board.

75. The local deaconess shall work under the direction of the pastor at all times, and should be accorded respect and careful pastoral guidance in this holy calling for her very work's sake.

76. The license of the local deaconess may be renewed annually by the church board upon the recommendation of the pastor. The license may be suspended or revoked by the church

board, upon recommendation of the pastor, after giving her a fair hearing. [103 §§10, 26.]

77. The local deaconess, after serving for one year, may, upon nomination of the pastor, be recommended by the church board of the local church of which she is a member, to the District Assembly for district deaconess' license. [103 §14, 186.]

XII. The Local Preacher

78. Any member of the Church of the Nazarene, who feels called of God to do special work in preaching and conducting special meetings in the interest of salvation, when the call is evidenced by grace, gifts, and usefulness, after proper examination as to his personal experience of salvation, his knowledge of the doctrines of the Bible and the order of the church, may be licensed as a local preacher for one year by the church board of a local church having an elder as pastor, upon the recommendation of the pastor; or by the church board of a local church not having an elder as pastor, if the granting of license is recommended by the pastor and approved by the District Superintendent. He shall make a report to the local church at the annual church meeting. [37, 56, 103 §9.]

79. The church board shall issue to each local preacher a license signed by the pastor and the secretary of the church board.

80. The license of a local preacher may be renewed by the church board of a local church

having an elder as pastor, upon the recommendation of the pastor, or by the church board of a local church not having an elder as pastor, *provided* that this renewal of license is recommended by the pastor and approved by the District Superintendent. [103 §9.]

81. Local preachers shall pursue the course of study for local preachers and take examinations therein under the direction of the district board of examination. [155-158, 396.]

82. A local preacher, having served in that relation for at least one full year, and having passed the complete course of study for local preachers [395], may be recommended by the church board to the District Assembly for minister's license; and, if not received, he shall sustain his former relation. [103 §11, 202.]

XIII. The Stewards

83. The stewards of the local church shall be not fewer than three nor more than thirteen in number. They shall be elected by ballot, at the annual or a special church meeting, from among the members of the local church, to serve for the next church year and until their successors have been elected and qualified. [37, 57, 101.]

84. The stewards, under the direction of the church board, shall give special attention to raising money for the support of the pastor, that he may be free from secular care and anxiety, and may give himself wholly to the work of the ministry. [103 §6.]

85. The stewards shall provide the elements for the Lord's Supper, and, when requested by the pastor, may assist in the distribution of the same. [35 §2, 62 §10.]

86. The stewards may also co-operate with the deaconesses in caring for the needy and distressed. [73, 75, 186.]

87. A vacancy in the office of steward may be filled by the local church at a duly called church meeting. [54, 59.]

88. For faithfulness in the discharge of their duties the stewards shall be amenable to the local church. They shall make a report to the local church at the annual church meeting. [56.]

XIV. The Local Stewardship Committee

89. The stewards shall constitute the local stewardship committee, whose duty it shall be to promote the cause of Christian stewardship in the local church in co-operation with the pastor, the district stewardship committee, and the General Stewardship committee. [39, 154a, 296, 297.]

XV. The Trustees

90. The trustees of the local church shall be not fewer than three nor more than nine in number. They shall be elected from among the members of the Church of the Nazarene to serve for the next church year and until their successors have been elected and qualified. [37, 57, 101.]

91. Where the local church is not incorporated, or where the civil law requires it, or where for other reasons it is deemed best by the District Superintendent or the district advisory board, the trustees shall hold the title to church property and manage it as trustees of the local church. [164 §2.]

92. In all cases where the civil law requires a specific mode of election of church trustees, that mode shall be strictly followed. [52.]

93. Where no particular mode of election is required by civil law, the trustees shall be elected by ballot, at the annual meeting of the local church, or at a special meeting duly called for that purpose. [57, 59.]

94. A vacancy in the office of trustee may be filled by the local church at a duly called church meeting. [54, 59.]

95. For faithfulness to their trust the trustees shall be amenable to the local church. They shall report to the annual church meeting [56]. In the interim of annual church meetings, they shall make reports to the church board of which they are a part. [56, 98, 100a, 125, 126.]

XVI. Church Incorporation

96. In all places where the statutes will permit, the trustees shall have the local church incorporated. Where not inconsistent with civil law the articles of incorporation shall set forth the powers of the corporation and provide that the corporation shall be subject to the government of the Church of the Nazarene, as from

time to time authorized and declared in its *Manual* by the General Assembly of said church. All the property of this corporation shall be managed and controlled by the trustees subject to the approval of the local church. [163 §3, 284 §2.]

97. When a local church is incorporated, all property acquired shall be deeded directly to the church in its corporate name when it is possible to do so.

XVII. Property Restrictions

98. The real estate of the local church shall not be mortgaged to meet current expenses.

99. The local church may not purchase real estate encumbered by mortgage, nor sell, mortgage, exchange or otherwise dispose of real estate except by majority vote of the members present at an annual meeting, or at a special meeting duly called for that purpose, and except upon the written approval of the District Superintendent.

100. A local church contemplating the purchase of real estate, or the erection of a church building or parsonage, shall submit the proposition to the District Superintendent and the district board of church extension for their consideration and advice. [164 §4, 284 §2.]

100a. Trustees may not divert property from the use of the Church of the Nazarene. [125, 126.]

XVIII. The Church Board

101. Every local church shall have a church board, composed of the pastor, who shall be,

ex officio, chairman, the Sunday Bible school superintendents (except assistant superintendents), the presidents of the Nazarene young people's societies, the presidents of the local woman's missionary societies, the stewards, and the trustees of the local church. [37, 63, 83, 90, 116, 122.]

102. The church board shall have a regular meeting within the first ten days of each calendar month, and shall meet specially when called by the pastor, the District Superintendent, or the secretary when there is no pastor. [63, 139 §2, 104.]

103. The business of the church board shall be:

§1. To care for the interests of the local church and its work, not otherwise provided for, in harmony with the pastor. [64, 128, 308 §1.]

§2. To nominate to the local church, after having advised with the District Superintendent, any elder or licensed minister whom it may deem the proper person to become pastor; *provided*, the nomination be approved by the District Superintendent. [68, 139 §8.]

§3. To recommend to the local church, with the approval of the District Superintendent, that the call of the pastor be renewed for a term longer than one year. [71, 72.]

§4. To arrange for pastoral supply, after conference with the District Superintendent, until such time as a pastor shall be regularly called by the local church. [139 §6.]

§5. To recommend to the local church the pecuniary support the pastor should receive. [70.]

§6. To provide ways and means for the support of the pastor, the pastoral supply, or any other paid workers of the local church. [70, 84.]

§7. The church board shall, together with the pastor, according to plans adopted by the General Assembly and agreed to by the District Assembly, arrange for the raising of the apportionment of the general budget funds and the apportionment of the district budget funds made to the local church, and raise these apportionments. [34 §3, 62 §14, 103 §§1, 7, 123.]

§8. To give proper attention to the support of the District Superintendent and the General Superintendents, in accordance with the authorized plans.

§9. To license as local preacher, at its discretion, any person who has been recommended by the pastor; and to renew such license; as provided in 78, 80.

§10. To license as local deaconess, at its discretion, any person who has been recommended by the pastor; and to renew such license. [73, 76.]

§11. To recommend, at its discretion, upon nomination by the pastor, a local preacher to the District Assembly to be licensed as a licensed minister. [82, 202.]

§12. To recommend, at its discretion, upon nomination by the pastor, a licensed minister

to the District Assembly for renewal of license.
[204.]

§13. To recommend, at its discretion, upon nomination by the pastor, a licensed minister to the District Assembly for ordination. [133 §4, 211.]

§14. To recommend, at its discretion, upon nomination by the pastor, a local deaconess to the District Assembly to be licensed as a licensed deaconess. [77, 186.]

§15. To recommend, at its discretion, upon nomination by the pastor, a licensed deaconess to the District Assembly for renewal of license. [188.]

§16. To elect, upon nomination by the local church school board, the superintendent of the daily vacation Bible school, and the superintendent of the weekday Bible school. [110 §6.]

§17. To elect a person to be supervisor of the Junior society. [118 §2, 373 §3.]

§18. Before a local church school board has been provided in a newly organized local church, the church board and pastor shall appoint a Sunday Bible school superintendent, and shall perform the duties of a local church school board until such board has been regularly provided. [106.]

§19. To elect a secretary at the first regular meeting of the year, to serve until the close of the church year and until his successor has been elected and qualified. [55, 104 §§1-4.]

§20. To elect a treasurer at the first regular meeting of the year, to serve until the close of

the church year and until his successor has been elected and qualified. [105 §§1-5.]

§21. To cause careful account to be kept of all moneys received and disbursed by the local church, making report of the same at its regular monthly meetings, and to the annual meeting of the local church. [105 §3.]

§22. To establish, at its discretion, a system of probationary membership for the local church. [44.]

§23. To provide a church membership committee of not fewer than three persons. [47 §1.]

§24. The church board may remove the name of a nonresident church member from the church roll upon his failure to report to the pastor at least once in six months. [49 §1.]

§25. The church board may remove the name of a church member from the church roll who absents himself from all religious services of the church for six successive months without a reason deemed justifiable by the church board; *provided*, he has been visited and faithfully dealt with, when possible. [49 §2.]

§26. The church board may suspend or revoke the license of a local deaconess in harmony with 76.

§27. To recommend a licensed deaconess to the District Assembly for election as a consecrated deaconess. [191.]

§28. To appoint a trial committee of five in case written charges are pending against a church member. [303 §2.]

§29. To appoint an auditing committee which shall audit, at least annually, the financial records of the treasurer of the local church, the woman's foreign missionary society, the Nazarene young people's society, the Sunday Bible school, and any other financial records of the local church.

104. The duties of the secretary of the church board shall be:

§1. To record correctly and preserve faithfully the minutes of all church meetings and meetings of the church board, and do whatever else may pertain to his office.

§2. To present to the annual meeting of the local church an annual report of all the activities of the local church including statistics concerning the membership. [56.]

§3. To hold in trust all papers, records, and legal documents, including deeds, abstracts, insurance policies, pertaining to the local church, promptly turning over all papers, records, and other documents to his successor in office. [55.]

§4. To be the secretary of all annual and special church meetings; and to be custodian of the minutes and other papers of such annual and special church meetings. [55.]

105. The duties of the treasurer of the church board shall be:

§1. To receive all moneys not otherwise provided for, and disburse the same only on order of the church board. [64, 103 §21.]

§2. To make monthly remittances of all district funds to the district treasurer, and of all

general funds to the General Treasurer, except as otherwise provided. [62 §14.]

§3. To keep a correct book record of all funds received and disbursed. [103 §21.]

§4. To present a monthly financial report to the church board. [103 §21.]

§5. To present an annual financial report to the annual church meeting. [56, 103 §21.]

XIX. The Church School

DEFINITION AND OBJECTIVE

106. The church school is that department of the local church which promotes the Christian religious educational work of the local church, namely, the Sunday Bible school, the vacation Bible school, the weekday Bible school, the leadership training school, and such other schools and classes as may be classified under this heading, and shall be under the general supervision of the church school board and the direct care of the pastor.

107. The objective of the church school is:

(1) To teach the doctrines of Christianity and the standards of Christian behavior as revealed in the Bible, especially as interpreted by the Articles of Faith in the *Manual* of the Church of the Nazarene;

(2) To lay the foundation and begin the development of Christian character in young children;

(3) To seek the salvation of the unsaved and the entire sanctification of believers;

(4) To foster a progressive and continuous

development of Christ-like character, attitudes and habits;

(5) To lead to the discovery of the Christian philosophy of life, and the Biblical interpretation of the universe;

(6) To influence strongly in favor of church membership and to train for service in the same;

(7) To reach the largest possible number for Christ and the church.

This to be accomplished through the devout and diligent study and teaching of the Word of God—the Bible—and such other means as will contribute to this objective.

XX. The Church School Board

108, §1. Every local church shall have a church school board composed of the pastor, the Sunday Bible school superintendent, and from three to five persons elected by the annual church meeting to serve until the close of the next church year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The church school board shall have general supervision of the church school.

§2. The church school board shall have a chairman, a secretary, and such other officers as may be necessary. It shall hold regular monthly or quarterly meetings for the transaction of any business pertaining to church school work. Special meetings may be called by the pastor. The church school board shall give an annual report to the annual church meeting.

§3. The church school board shall elect or appoint other officers, supervisors of departments, and other workers, upon nomination by the Sunday Bible school superintendent and the pastor, as may be necessary.

§4. The duties of the church school board shall be:

(1) To organize or cause to be organized, in conjunction with the pastor, a Sunday Bible school in connection with the local church, and where possible one or more mission Bible schools, and have general supervision of the same.

(2) To organize, with the approval of the pastor, and supervise a vacation Bible school and a weekday Bible school, when practicable, and to appoint workers for them, and have general supervision of the same.

(3) To encourage Bible study, mission study, temperance study, and leadership training, and to organize and supervise classes for such study, and to appoint workers for them, and have general supervision of the same.

(4) To make surveys and studies of Christian religious educational needs of the local church and community, and lay plans to meet those needs as fully as possible.

(5) To nominate two or more persons for the office of Sunday Bible school superintendent in harmony with 110 §2.

(6) To disapprove the appointment of a teacher, or remove an officer, in harmony with 110 §5.

XXI. The Sunday Bible School

109, §1. The Sunday Bible school shall be under the general supervision of the church school board, the care of the pastor, and the immediate leadership of the Sunday Bible school superintendent.

§2. Each Sunday Bible school shall be organized and administered under bylaws adopted for it by the church school board; provided, that such bylaws shall be in harmony with the *Manual* of the Church of the Nazarene. For suggested bylaws see 374a.

§3. Each Sunday Bible school shall have a cabinet in which the administrative work of the school is vested. The cabinet shall be composed of the members of the church school board and the general officers of the Sunday Bible school.

In case it should be deemed advisable that there be both a church school board and a cabinet, the cabinet may be composed of the general officers of the Sunday Bible school, the departmental supervisors, and the teachers of the Sunday Bible school.

§4. There shall be three classes of members in the Sunday Bible school, namely, active, cradle roll, and home department.

Active members shall be persons enrolled in the regular school whose attendance at the Sunday sessions is expected.

Cradle roll members shall be children under four years of age enrolled in the cradle roll department.

Home department members shall be persons who are enrolled in the home department but who are unable to attend the regular Sunday sessions.

§5. Active Sunday Bible school enrolment shall be defined to mean the total number enrolled as active scholars.

Total Sunday Bible school enrolment shall include all active, all cradle roll, and all home department members.

110, §1. The superintendent of the Sunday Bible school shall be a member of the Church of the Nazarene, in the experience of entire sanctification, and in full sympathy with the doctrine and polity of the Church of the Nazarene. He shall be a member *ex officio* of the church school board, the church board, and the District Assembly. He shall submit an annual report to the annual church meeting, and a quarterly report to the church board.

§2. The Sunday Bible school superintendent shall be elected by ballot by the annual church meeting, from two or more nominations made by the church school board (the Sunday Bible school superintendent not being present when the nominees are selected) with the approval of the pastor. A vacancy in the office of Sunday Bible school superintendent shall be filled by the local church at a duly called church meeting.

§3. The other officers and teachers shall be professing Christians, exemplary in life, and in

full harmony with the doctrines and polity of the Church of the Nazarene.

§4. The teachers of the Sunday Bible school shall be nominated by the Sunday Bible school superintendent and appointed by the pastor. In the case of schools having departments, the nominations shall be made by the Sunday Bible school superintendent and the department supervisor of the department in which the teachers are to serve.

§5. The church school board shall have the right to disapprove the appointment of any teacher; and, in the case of properly proved unsoundness of doctrine, imprudent conduct or neglect of duty, to declare the office of any officer or teacher vacant by a two-thirds vote of all members of the board.

111. The church school year shall be the same as the church year as defined in 60.

At the close of the statistical year it shall be the duty of the pastor to supervise carefully the making of the annual statistical report of the Sunday Bible school and to forward it to the district secretary.

XXII. The Local Nazarene Young People's Society

112. Young people may be organized into a Nazarene young people's society, and auxiliary societies, for the spiritual benefit of the young people, co-operation in seeking the salvation of other young people, and the advancement of the work of the church.

113. The local organization of the young people shall be perfected in harmony with the

constitution of the local Nazarene young people's society as approved by the General Assembly.

114. These societies shall be in full subordination to the Church of the Nazarene, and may inaugurate no movement contrary to the judgment of the local church, or without the consent of the pastor. [63.]

115. The times and places of the meetings of such societies shall be chosen under the advice of the pastor and the church board. [63.]

116. The president of the local society, whose nomination has been approved by the pastor [63], shall be elected by the local society with the approval of the church board. He shall be a member, *ex officio*, of the church board, to which he shall make a monthly report [101]. He shall submit a report to the annual meeting of the local church [56].

117. Each local organization of the Nazarene Young People's Society shall be represented in the District Assembly by its president, of which District Assembly he shall be a member. He shall report the condition of the society to the District Assembly. [130.]

118, § 1. A high school Nazarene youth's (Hi-N.Y.) society may be organized under the supervision of the local Nazarene young people's society as an auxiliary thereof, in harmony with the constitution of the high school Nazarene youth's (Hi-N.Y.) society approved by the General Assembly. [373 §2.]

§2. A junior society may be organized under

the supervision of the local Nazarene young people's society as an auxiliary thereof, in harmony with the constitution of The Junior Society approved by the General Assembly. [103 §30, 373 §3.]

XXIII. Missionary Societies

119. In each local church there shall be one or more missionary societies, organized under the direction of the pastor, whose duty it shall be, by all means, to awaken and sustain interest in, and promote the support of, the sacred cause of missions—both home and foreign. [120, 121, 122, 123 §§1-7.]

The above paragraph shall be interpreted to mean that in each local church there shall be either a woman's missionary society, or a men's missionary society, or a church missionary society, or two or more of these organizations.

XXIV. The Local Woman's Foreign Missionary Society

120. Local organizations of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society may be formed in harmony with the constitution of such local societies approved by the General Assembly. [374 §1.]

121. The local woman's foreign missionary society shall be a constituent part of the local church and subject to the supervision and direction of the pastor and the church board. [374 §1.]

122. The president of the local society, whose nomination has been approved by the pastor, [63], shall be elected by the local society with the approval of the church board.

She shall be a member of the church board, and also a member of the District Assembly. She shall present a report to the annual meeting of the local church. [56, 101, 130.]

123. All funds raised by the local woman's foreign missionary society for the general interests of the Church of the Nazarene, except the relief and retirement fund and the general expense fund, shall be paid into the general budget through the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society channels to the credit of the local church to which this society is subsidiary until the general budget apportionments of the local church be paid in full for the year, after which all such funds may be devoted to foreign missions exclusively. [62 §14, 103 §7.]

§1. Funds for the support of general interests shall be raised in the following manner:

- (1) From the regular dues of the members;
- (2) From the monies raised from all life memberships;
- (3) From gifts and offerings designed for the general interests;
- (4) From the prayer and fasting league offerings.
- (5) From the thank offering which is an annual free-will offering.

§2. It is of vital importance that our women be impressed with the necessity of a fund over and above the dues, if they are to do a world-wide work for the Master. It is urged therefore that each member make a free-will of-

fering annually toward a fund which shall be known as a thank offering.

§3. No part of the above funds shall be used for local or district expenses and charitable purposes.

§4. The relief and retirement fund, to be held in trust by the treasurer of the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council to be used for the relief of sick, needy, and retired foreign missionaries, shall be raised (1) by placing of names on the memorial roll by the payment of \$25.00 for that special purpose, (2) by annual payments by members of ten cents each, and (3) by free-will gifts or offerings designed for the relief and retirement fund.

§5. Each member shall contribute fifteen cents annually for the general expense fund. This fund provides for the expense of printing tracts, literature, and other matter, and for the expense of the general officers in connection with their service for the Council.

§6. When the general budget apportionment of the local church has been paid in full for the year, opportunities may be given to make offerings for the support of foreign missionary work, such contributions to be known as specials.

XXV. Disorganization of Churches

124. When it seems clear to a District Superintendent that a local church organization should no longer continue as such, it may be disorganized by action and formal pronouncement of the Board of General Superintendents

on recommendation of the District Superintendent.

125. In case a local church becomes disorganized, any church property which shall exist may in no way be diverted to other purposes, but shall pass to the control of the District Assembly, for the use of the Church of the Nazarene at large, as the District Assembly shall direct; and trustees holding property for the disorganized local church shall sell or dispose of the same only on the order and under the direction of the appointed agent of the District Assembly, and turn the funds over to such agent. [90-100.]

126. No board of trustees may divert property from the use of the Church of the Nazarene. [90-100.]

XXVI. Withdrawal of Churches

127. No local church may withdraw as a body from the Church of the Nazarene, or in any way sever its relation thereto, except by provision of the General Assembly, and upon agreed conditions and plans.

XXVII. Prohibition on Financial Appeals

128, §1. It shall not be lawful for a local church, its officers or members, to send appeals to other local churches, their officers and members, to solicit money or financial assistance for their local church needs or for the interests that they may support.

It is *provided*, however, that such solicitation may be made to local churches and church

members located within the bounds of the Assembly District in which the solicitor is located, but on condition only that the solicitation be approved in writing by the District Superintendent and the district advisory board.

§2. Members of the Church of the Nazarene, who are not authorized local, district, or general officers of the Church, or who are not under appointment or officially recognized by the Department of Foreign Missions and the General Board, shall not solicit funds for missionary or kindred activities apart from the General Budget, from congregations of local churches, or from members of such churches.

CHAPTER II

THE DISTRICT ASSEMBLY

I. Bounds and Name

129. The General Assembly shall organize the membership of the church into District Assemblies.

The bounds and name of a church Assembly District shall be such as shall be declared by the General Assembly; or by the Assembly District involved, with the final approval of the General Superintendent or Superintendents having jurisdiction. [23.]

II. Membership and Time of Meeting

130. The District Assembly shall be composed of all the elected [210] and received [221] elders; all the licensed ministers [207];

the district secretary [143]; the district treasurer [148]; the chairman of the district church school board [173]; the president of the district Nazarene young people's society [178]; the president of the district woman's foreign missionary society [183]; the superintendent of each local Sunday Bible school [108]; the president of each local Nazarene young people's society [117]; the president of each local woman's foreign missionary society [122]; the eligible deaconesses [190, 194]; the eligible lay missionaries [281 §4a, 430]; the lay members of the district advisory board [153]; and the lay delegates from each local church in the Assembly District [23, 24, 25, 58, 131.]

131, §1. Local churches in districts of less than five thousand church members shall be entitled to representation in the District Assembly as follows: two lay delegates from each local church of fifty or fewer church members, and one additional lay delegate for each successive fifty church members and the final major part of fifty church members. [23, 58, 130.]

§2. Local churches in districts of five thousand or more church members shall be entitled to representation in the District Assembly as follows: one lay delegate from each local church of fifty or fewer church members, and one additional lay delegate for each successive fifty church members and the final major part of fifty church members. [23, 58, 130.]

132, §1. The District Assembly shall be held annually, at the time appointed by the General Superintendent having jurisdiction, and in the place designated by the preceding District Assembly or arranged for by the District Superintendent. [257 §3.]

§2. Prior to the convening of the District Assembly the General Superintendent having jurisdiction may appoint a nominating committee to serve during the District Assembly, which nominating committee may prepare nominations for the usual committees and offices in advance of the convening of the District Assembly. [257 §10.]

III. Business of the District Assembly

133. The business of the District Assembly [23] shall be:

§1. To hear reports from and consider the character of all pastors, evangelists, and other elders and licensed ministers, all deaconesses, and song evangelists. [66, 190, 194, 207, 215, 228, 239.]

§2. To license as licensed ministers, after careful examination, persons who have been recommended by church boards, and whom it may judge to be called to the ministry; and to renew such license, according to the requirements in 204. [82, 103 §§11-12, 202.]

§3. To license as licensed deaconesses, after careful examination, persons who have been recommended by church boards, and whom it may judge to be called to the office of deacon-

ess; and to renew such license. [77, 103 §§14-15, 186, 188.]

§4. To elect to the eldership persons whom it may judge to have fulfilled all the requirements for elders' orders. [103 §13, 210.]

§5. To recognize the orders of persons coming from other denominations, and whom it may judge qualified and desirable for place in the Church of the Nazarene. [218.]

§6. To receive into its membership, by transfer from other districts, elders, licensed ministers, and deaconesses, who have been properly recommended, and whom it may judge as desirable for place in the Assembly District. [196-199, 222-225.]

§7. To issue a transfer to elders, licensed ministers, and deaconesses, who desire to transfer to another Assembly District. [196, 197, 222, 223.]

§8. To commission elders and licensed ministers, who devote their time to evangelism, to serve as evangelists for one year. [226.]

§9. To commission persons whom it deems qualified to serve as song evangelists for one year. [238.]

§10. To elect, by two-thirds favorable vote, by ballot, an elder to the office of District Superintendent, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified. [137].

§11. To elect a district secretary, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District

Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified. [141.]

§12. To elect a district treasurer, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified. [146.]

§13. To elect, by ballot, two elders and two laymen to the district advisory board, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [150.]

§14. To elect a district board of examination, of five or more elders, to serve for four years and until their successors are elected and qualified. [155.]

§15. To elect a district board of foreign missions, of as many members as the District Assembly may choose, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [159.]

§16. To elect, at its discretion, a district board of education of five members, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [161.]

§17. To elect a district board of church extension of five members, including the District Superintendent, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [163.]

§18. To elect a district board of ministerial relief, of as many members as the District As-

sembly may choose, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [167.]

§19. To elect, at its discretion, a district board of social welfare of five members, including the District Superintendent, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [165.]

§20. To elect a district church school board in harmony with the procedure stated in 171, to serve until their successors are elected and qualified. [171, 172, 173, 174, 175.]

§21. To elect a district court of appeals, consisting of five elders, including the District Superintendent, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [257 §8, 308.]

§22. To elect annually, at its discretion, a district colporteur, upon the recommendation of the Department of Publication of the General Board. [169.]

§23. To elect, by ballot, in the annual session of the District Assembly immediately preceding the convening of the General Assembly, both ministerial and lay delegates to the General Assembly; *provided*, that no nominee for delegate shall be declared elected until after he has solemnly promised to attend faithfully all the meetings of the General Assembly from the opening to the closing, unless prevented by

some serious providence, such as sickness or death in his immediate family [245.] The District Assembly shall elect alternate delegates not exceeding the number of its delegates [24, 25, 26, 245.]

§24. To present to the General Assembly, through the district secretary, a full official journal for the preceding quadrennium, bound in permanent binding, for review and revision. [144 §8.]

§25. To consider and care for the entire work of the Church of the Nazarene within the bounds of the Assembly District. [309 §1.]

§26. To transact any other business pertaining to the work, not otherwise provided for, in harmony with the spirit and order of the Church of the Nazarene.

§27. To grant a retired relation to any minister in good standing who has reached the age of sixty-five years, at his request. [229, 230, 231.]

§28. To place in the retired relation, at its discretion, any minister in good standing who is disqualified for active ministerial labors because of physical disability or old age. [229, 230, 231.]

§29. To elect a district board of home missions, of as many members as the District Assembly may choose, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified; provided, that the District Assembly may order that the district advisory board may con-

stitute the district board of home missions, with additional members elected thereto at the discretion of the District Assembly. [160.]

§30. May authorize, where civil law permits, the district advisory board to incorporate, and to take hold and convey title to any district property. [154 §10.]

§31. May establish the Committee on Orders and Relations as a standing committee, empowering said committee to convene prior to the next District Assembly to consider all routine matters subject to its authority, which have been submitted to the district secretary.

IV. The District Assembly Journal

134, §1. The journal shall be the record of the regular proceedings of the District Assembly.

§2. The journal shall be signed by the presiding officer and the district secretary.

§3. The journal must be either written or typewritten manuscript, or printed, and substantially bound.

§4. Separate items of business shall be placed in separate paragraphs.

§5. Every secretary who edits the journal should be careful to present the same with a view to its examination by the General Assembly. [133 §24, 144 §8.]

§6. The full official journal for each quadrennium shall be bound in permanent binding for preservation in the District Assembly files. [144 §6.]

135. The District Assembly journal shall be arranged as far as possible according to the following Standard Table of Contents:

VIII. STATISTICAL

136. The list of pastoral arrangements should contain not only the assignment of pastors to local churches, but also all regular and special engagements entered into by ministerial and lay members of the District Assembly who are engaged in any line of denominational service that would entitle them to consideration if applying for assistance from the Department of Ministerial Relief of the General Board. [68, 69, 71, 257 §6, 154 §8, 285 §2.]

V. The District Superintendent

137. The District Superintendent, elected by the District Assembly, shall serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified. [133 §10.]

138. If a vacancy occur in the office of District Superintendent, for any cause, in the interim of sessions of the District Assembly, the General Superintendents, jointly and severally, may fill the vacancy. [257 §7.]

139. The duties of a District Superintendent shall be:

§1. To organize, recognize, and supervise local churches within the bounds of his Assembly District, subject to the approval of the General Superintendent having jurisdiction. [40, 216, 257 §5.]

§2. To visit the local churches in his Assembly District, at least once a year, and meet with the church board, at which time he shall preside, and consult with reference to spiritual,

financial, and pastoral matters, giving such helpful advice and assistance as he may deem proper. [102.]

§3. To have special supervision of all the missions of the Church of the Nazarene within the bounds of his Assembly District.

§4. To appoint someone to fill the vacancy when a vacancy occurs in the office of district secretary. [142.]

§5. To appoint someone to fill the vacancy when a vacancy occurs in the office of district treasurer. [147.]

§6. The District Superintendent may, with the consent of the church board, appoint a pastoral supply to fill a vacancy in the office of pastor until the next District Assembly. Such appointed pastoral supply shall be subject to removal by the District Superintendent, when his services are not satisfactory to the church board and the local church. [103 §4.]

§7. The District Superintendent may perform for a local church within the bounds of his Assembly District all the functions of pastor when that local church is without a pastor or pastoral supply.

§8. The District Superintendent shall advise with the church board concerning the nomination of an elder or a licensed minister to the pastorate of a local church and shall approve or disapprove such nomination, in harmony with 68. He shall approve or disapprove the renewal of the call of a pastor in harmony with 71.

§9. If for any reason the General Superin-

tendent having jurisdiction fails to be present or to appoint a representative to be present in his stead at the District Assembly, the District Superintendent shall call the District Assembly to order, and shall preside until other provision may be made by the District Assembly. [257 §3.]

§10. The District Superintendent may fill vacancies occurring in the district board of examination. [156.]

§11. The District Superintendent may preside at the annual, or a special, meeting of a local church, or appoint someone to represent him. [53.]

§12. The District Superintendent shall be a member, *ex officio*, of the district church school board, and of the district council of the district Nazarene young people's society. [171, 180.]

§13. The District Superintendent shall be, *ex officio*, chairman of the district advisory board.

§14. The District Superintendent shall be chairman of the district advisory council [185.]

§15. To approve or disapprove the granting of license to any member of the Church of the Nazarene who may request local preacher's license or renewal of local preacher's license from the church board of a local church not having an elder as pastor. [78, 80 §§1, 2.]

140. All official acts of the District Superintendent shall be subject to review and revision by the District Assembly, and subject to appeal as stated in 309 §1.

VI. The District Secretary

141. The district secretary, elected by the District Assembly, shall serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified. [133 §11.]

142. If the district secretary shall cease to serve, for any cause, in the interim of sessions of the District Assembly, the District Superintendent shall appoint someone to succeed him. [139 §4.]

143. The district secretary shall be a member, *ex officio*, of the District Assembly. [130.]

144. The duties of the district secretary shall be:

§1. To record correctly and preserve faithfully all minutes of the District Assembly.

§2. To record correctly and preserve all statistics of the district. [101 §3.]

§3. To forward all statistical charts to the General Church Secretary to be audited before their publication in the official journal. [267 §6.]

§4. He shall be custodian of all documents of the District Assembly, promptly turning over the same to his successor.

§5. The district secretary shall cause to be bound in permanent binding for district files the full official journal for each quadrennium. [134 §5.]

§6. The district secretary shall forward twenty-five copies of the printed journal of each District Assembly to General Headquarters for

distribution among the general officers and general boards of the Church of the Nazarene.

§7. To present to the General Assembly, for the District Assembly, the full official journal for the preceding quadrennium, bound in permanent binding. [133 §24, 134 §5.]

§8. He shall do whatever else may pertain to his office.

145. The district secretary may have as many assistants as the District Assembly shall elect.

VII. The District Treasurer

146. The district treasurer, elected by the District Assembly, shall serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified. [133 §12.]

147. If the district treasurer shall cease to serve, for any cause, in the interim of sessions of the District Assembly, the District Superintendent shall appoint someone to succeed him. [139 §5.]

148. The district treasurer shall be a member, *ex officio*, of the District Assembly. [130.]

149. The duties of the district treasurer shall be:

§1. To receive all such moneys from his district as may be designated by the General Assembly, or by the District Assembly, or as the needs of the Church of the Nazarene may require, and disburse the same according to direction.

§2. He shall render an itemized monthly report to the General Treasurer of all receipts and disbursements. [272 §7.]

§3. He shall keep a correct record of all moneys received and disbursed and shall render an annual report to the District Assembly, to which he shall be amenable.

VIII. The District Advisory Board

150. The district advisory board shall be composed of the District Superintendent, *ex officio*, and two elders and two laymen elected annually by ballot by the District Assembly, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [133 §13.]

151. A vacancy in the district advisory board may be filled by the remaining members thereof.

152. The District Superintendent shall be, *ex officio*, chairman of the district advisory board.

153. The two lay members of the district advisory board shall be, *ex officio*, members of the District Assembly. [130.]

154. The duties of the district advisory board shall be:

§1. To give information to and consult with the District Superintendent respecting the ministers and local churches of the Assembly District. [65.]

§2. To inform and advise with the General Superintendent regarding the pastoral arrangements for the coming year. [69, 257 §6.]

§3. The district advisory board may issue a transfer of membership to an elder, a licensed minister, or a deaconess, who desires to transfer to another District Assembly before the meeting of the District Assembly in which such person's membership is held. Such transfer may be accepted by the District Assembly to which presented. [133 §7, 197, 223.]

§4. The district advisory board may suspend the license of a licensed deaconess when it is required for the good of the church, after a conference with the church board of the local church of which the licensed deaconess is a member, and after giving her a fair hearing, and with the approval of the District Superintendent. [189.]

§5. To appoint an investigating committee consisting of two elders in case an accusation is filed against an elder or a licensed minister. [304 §1.]

§6. To select a trial court in case charges are made against an elder or licensed minister. [304 §3.]

§7. To incorporate, where civil law permits and when authorized by the District Assembly, in order to take, hold and convey title to any property belonging to the district. [133 §30.]

§8. To recommend to the Department of Ministerial Relief of the General Board the disbursement of funds for the temporal relief of aged ministers, and for the widows and orphans of ministers who have died in the work. [136, 229, 230, 231, 285.]

§9. In case a licensed or ordained minister presenting credentials from another evangelical denomination, shall, during the interim of sessions of the District Assembly, make application to unite with the Church of the Nazarene, his credentials shall be examined by the district advisory board. Without the favorable recommendation of the district advisory board, such applicant shall not be received into membership in the local church. [65a, 207a, 215a.]

IX. The District Stewardship Committee

154a. The members of the district advisory board shall constitute the district stewardship committee. It shall be the duty of the district stewardship committee to promote the cause of Christian stewardship in co-operation with the General Stewardship Committee. [39, 89, 296, 297.]

X. The District Board of Examination

155. The district board of examination shall be composed of five or more elders, elected by the District Assembly, to serve for a term of four years and until their successors are elected and qualified. [133 §14.]

156. Vacancies occurring in the district board of examinations, in the interim of sessions of the District Assembly, may be filled by the District Superintendent. [139 §10.]

157, §1. As soon as elected, the first member chosen shall call a meeting of all the members of the district board of examination (hereinafter called the board) for organization, as follows: The board shall elect from among its

members a permanent chairman and a permanent secretary, both of whom may be exempt from the direct work of examination, and shall faithfully do the work as herein provided.

§2. The chairman shall assign to the other members of the board the studies of the year in the course of study on which each member shall examine. Such assignments shall be for the entire term of the board, unless otherwise mutually arranged.

§3. The chairman shall attend all meetings of the board, unless providentially prevented, and shall oversee the work of the board each year. In case of necessary absence of the chairman, the secretary shall do his work, *pro tempore*.

§4. The secretary shall, at the expense of the District Assembly, provide a suitable record book of examinations, which shall be the property of the District Assembly.

§5. He shall enter therein the name and address of each candidate for examination, and the name of the local church recommending him, the date of licensing, the course of study pursued, and the record of examinations. The secretary shall provide and fill out suitable blanks, and present to each candidate a duplicate of his record as preserved in the records of the District Assembly.

158, §1. All examinations shall be held at the meeting place of the District Assembly on the day preceding the opening meeting, unless otherwise provided by the board.

§2. Any member of any class who fails to appear for examination as directed shall not be advanced in his studies by the District Assembly, unless his absence is satisfactorily explained in writing to the chairman, and he shall have arranged with his examiner for his examination in the studies of his year, and shall pledge to complete his entire work before the final examinations.

§3. All examinations shall be conducted in writing.

§4. The examiner shall furnish the candidate with a list of not fewer than ten questions for each study and book.

§5. All papers shall be marked on a scale of 100.

§6. An average of 75 shall be required on all studies as a condition of passing to the studies of the next year; *provided*, however, if any candidate fail to receive a grade of 70 on any study or book, he shall be conditioned on that study or book, and shall be required to pass an examination on that study or book before he may be permitted to take the examination for advanced work.

§7. On the completion of the examinations, the board shall report to the District Assembly the record of examinations, and make recommendations for election to the studies of the next year of such candidates as shall have satisfactorily passed the examinations.

§8. Candidates pursuing the course of study, who may be attending any of the recognized

schools of the Church of the Nazarene, and pursuing the same or similar studies as those which are in the course of study, may present a school record in lieu of examination, and, if satisfactory to the board, may be recommended for advancement in those studies without further examination.

XI. The District Board of Foreign Missions

159. The district board of foreign missions shall be composed of as many members as the District Assembly may choose, elected by the District Assembly, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [133 §15.]

The duties of the district board of foreign missions shall be:

To seek by all means—by the diffusion of missionary information, by the holding of local meetings and district conventions, by the employment of speakers who have the vision and spirit, and by any other contributive agency—to stir the people to holy zeal and devotion for, and liberality toward, the sacred cause of foreign missions.

XII. The District Board of Home Missions

160. The district board of home missions shall be composed of as many members as the District Assembly may choose, elected by the District Assembly, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified;

provided, that the district advisory board may constitute the district board of home missions, with additional members elected thereto at the discretion of the District Assembly. [133 §29.]

The duties of the district board of home missions shall be:

§1. To seek by all means—by the diffusion of home missionary information, by the holding of local meetings and district conventions, by the employment of speakers who have the vision and spirit, and by any other contributive agency—to stir the people to holy zeal and devotion for, and liberality toward, the sacred cause of home missions and evangelism.

§2. The district board of home missions, under direction of the District Assembly, and in co-operation with the District Superintendent, may have charge of all home mission work conducted by the Assembly District within its bounds.

XIII. The District Board of Education

161. The district board of education shall be composed of five members elected by the District Assembly, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [133 §16.]

162. The duty of the district board of education shall be to foster the cause of education as represented by the Church of the Nazarene, in co-operation with the Department of Education of the General Board. [287 §§1-14.]

XIV. The District Board of Church Extension

163. The district board of church extension shall be composed of five members, including the District Superintendent, elected by the District Assembly to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified.

[133 §17.]

164. The duties of the district board of church extension shall be:

§1. To advance the cause of building houses of worship and parsonages within the bounds of the Assembly District, in co-operation with the Department of Home Missions and Evangelism of the General Board. [284 §§1-3.]

§2. To verify and conserve the titles to church property. [284 §2.]

§3 To assist local churches to incorporate. [93, 96, 284 §2.]

§4. To consider propositions submitted by local churches relating to the purchase of real estate or the erection of church buildings or parsonages, and to advise them concerning the propositions submitted. [100.]

§5. To do whatever else the District Assembly may direct regarding the matter of church property.

XV. The District Board of Social Welfare

165. The district board of social welfare shall be composed of five members, including the District Superintendent, elected by the District Assembly, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and

until their successors are elected and qualified. [133 §19.]

166. The duty of the district board of social welfare shall be to foster the work of moral education, prevention, restoration, and general betterment, in connection with the Church of the Nazarene. [287 §13.]

XVI. The District Board of Ministerial Relief

167. The district board of ministerial relief shall be composed of as many members as the District Assembly may choose, elected by the District Assembly, to serve until the final adjournment of the next District Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [133 §18.]

168. The duty of the district board of ministerial relief shall be:

§1. To have full power to dispense local relief according to its judgment, subject to the approval of the District Assembly.

XVII. The District Colporteur

169. A district colporteur may be elected annually by the District Assembly upon the recommendation of the Department of Publication of the General Board, who shall labor under the jurisdiction of the District Superintendent and shall be amenable to the District Assembly. [133 §22.]

170. The district colporteur shall co-operate with the Department of Publication in the systematic distribution of gospel literature. [286 §2.]

XVIII. The District Church School Board

171. The district church school board shall be composed of the District Superintendent, *ex officio*, and six other members elected as follows: At the first election of the district church school board two members shall be elected to serve for a term of three years, two for a term of two years, and two for a term of one year. Thereafter, each year, two persons shall be elected by the District Assembly to serve for the full term of three years and until their successors are elected and qualified. [133 §20.]

172, §1. The district church school board shall organize by choosing a chairman, a vice chairman, a secretary, and a treasurer.

§2. There may also be appointed by the district church school board a director of religious education, a superintendent of leadership training, a superintendent of children's division, a superintendent of young people's division, a superintendent of adult division, a superintendent of vacation Bible schools, and a superintendent of weekday Bible schools. These officers may be appointed from among the members of the district church school board or otherwise, but they shall be amenable to that board.

§3. The district church school board shall hold a meeting immediately preceding or at the same time as the District Assembly to complete its work for the year, and to prepare a report to be presented to the District Assembly. Special meetings may be held whenever necessary.

173. The chairman of the district church school board shall be, *ex officio*, a member of the District Assembly. [130.]

174, §1. The district church school board shall arrange for an annual district church school convention to be held at some time during the year or immediately preceding the meeting of the District Assembly.

At this convention the superintendents of all the local schools are expected to be present and take part as opportunity affords. The convention program shall provide for special addresses, papers, discussions, and periods for general consultation relative to the district church school interests. [108 §1, 111 §6.]

§2. The Assembly District may be divided into groups with group leaders appointed by the district church school board who shall work under the supervision of that board. Group conventions should be held.

175. The duties of the district church school board, in harmony with the program of the Department of Church Schools of the General Board [288 §§1-2], shall be:

§1. To have full supervision of all church school interests of the Assembly District, not otherwise provided for.

§2. To conduct district and group conventions and leadership training schools.

3. To assist the Department of Church Schools of the General Board in securing information relating to district and local church school interests.

§4. To promote and encourage church school work throughout the Assembly District.

§5. To present an annual report to the District Assembly which shall include (1) a statement of the work accomplished by the district church school board during the past year. (2) a statement of the general condition of the church school work on the Assembly District, and (3) recommendations for the work for the ensuing year. [133 §26.]

§6. To recommend to the District Assembly the amount considered necessary to finance the district church school work for the ensuing year to be placed in the district budget, or to make other plans for raising the same. [133 §26.]

XIX. The District Nazarene Young People's Society

176. The district Nazarene young people's society shall be composed of the local Nazarene young people's societies of the Assembly District.

177. It shall be governed by the constitution of the district Nazarene young people's society approved by the General Assembly. [See constitution 373.]

178. The president of the district Nazarene young people's society shall be elected by its annual convention. When so elected and approved he shall be a member, *ex officio*, of the District Assembly. [130.]

179. The district convention of the Nazarene young people's society, which shall meet annually, shall be composed of the District

Superintendent, the pastors of local churches, district zone presidents, presidents of local societies, and two delegates from each local society of twenty-five or fewer members, including the total membership of senior and high school Nazarene youth's (Hi-N.Y.) societies, and one additional delegate for each successive twenty-five members and the final major part of twenty-five members. One delegate shall be appointed by the pastor of each local church not having a fully organized local Nazarene young people's society. [373 §4.]

180. The district council shall be composed of the officers of the district Nazarene young people's society, the District Superintendent, the chairmen of standing committees, and the district zone presidents; provided, that all district officers shall be active members of a local society within the bounds of the Assembly District.

XX. The District Woman's Foreign Missionary Society

181. The district woman's foreign missionary society shall be composed of the district executive officers, the presidents of all the local societies of the Assembly District, both woman's and young woman's, one delegate from each local society having ten members, and one additional delegate for each additional ten members. This society shall be auxiliary to the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council. [374 §2.]

182. The district woman's foreign missionary society shall be governed by the constitution of the district woman's foreign missionary society approved by the General Assembly. It shall be subject to the District Superintendent, the district advisory board, and the District Assembly. [374 §2.]

183. The president of the district woman's foreign missionary society shall be a member, *ex officio*, of the District Assembly. [130.]

184. There shall be an executive committee composed of the president, the two vice presidents, the corresponding secretary, the recording secretary, the treasurer, and the superintendent of study, and a superintendent of publicity of the district society. [374 §2.]

XXI. The District Advisory Council

185. The district boards shall form an advisory council over which the District Superintendent shall preside, said council to meet, if possible, once each six months for counsel and advice as to the best methods of forwarding the work of the Assembly District. [139 §14.]

CHAPTER III

THE DEACONESS

I. The Licensed Deaconess

186. A local deaconess in good standing in the Church of the Nazarene who feels divinely led to advance the cause of Christ by ministering to the sick and the needy, comforting the

sorrowing, praying with the dying and pointing them to the Savior, seeking the lost and wandering and endeavoring by all means to lead them to Jesus Christ and salvation, may be licensed as a licensed deaconess for one year by the District Assembly; *provided*, however, she (1) shall be at least twenty-one years of age, (2) shall have served as local deaconess in a satisfactory manner for at least one year, (3) shall have been recommended for such license by the church board of the local church of which she is a member, (4) shall have given evidence of ability, grace, and usefulness, (5) shall have passed a satisfactory examination before the district board of examination in Bible doctrine, in government of the Church of the Nazarene, and in domestic qualifications, and (6) shall declare her purpose to pursue immediately and faithfully the course of study prescribed for licensed deaconesses. [77, 103 §14, 133 §3.]

187. The General Superintendent having jurisdiction shall issue to each licensed deaconess a license signed by himself and the district secretary.

188. The credentials of a licensed deaconess may be renewed annually by the District Assembly, *provided*, renewal of license has been recommended by the church board of the local church of which she is a member. If the license be not renewed she shall no longer serve as deaconess. [103 §15.]

189. In the interim of sessions of the District Assembly the license of a licensed deaconess may, when it is required for the good of the church, be suspended until the next District Assembly by the district advisory board with the approval of the District Superintendent, after a conference with the church board of the local church of which the deaconess is a member, and after giving her a fair hearing. [154 §4.]

190. All licensed deaconesses who have passed at least one-half of the prescribed course of study for licensed deaconesses [397] shall be members of the District Assembly, *provided* they are in active service. [130, 133 §1.]

II. The Consecrated Deaconess

191. When a licensed deaconess shall have served as a licensed deaconess for two years, and shall have successfully passed in the prescribed course of study, upon recommendation of the church board of the local church of which she is a member, she may be elected to the office of consecrated deaconess by the District Assembly.

192. The candidate so elected shall be consecrated by the District Assembly with appropriate religious services, under the direction of the presiding General Superintendent.

193. The General Superintendent having jurisdiction shall issue to the deaconesses so consecrated a certificate of consecration signed by himself and the district secretary.

194. All consecrated deaconesses shall be

members of the District Assembly, *provided* they are in active service. [130, 133§ 1.]

195. After being elected and consecrated to the office of consecrated deaconess, the candidate may wear the prescribed deaconess garb. The deaconess garb shall consist of an all-black suit with white collar and cuffs or an all-white suit, with regulation bonnet adopted by the General Assembly of 1907.

III. The Transfers of Deaconesses

196. When a licensed or a consecrated deaconess desires to transfer to another District Assembly, a transfer of membership may be issued by vote of the District Assembly in which her membership is held, which transfer may be received by the District Assembly to which it is addressed. [133 §6, 7.]

197. When a licensed or a consecrated deaconess desires to transfer to another District Assembly before the meeting of the District Assembly in which her membership is held, a transfer of membership may be issued by the District Superintendent and the district advisory board, which transfer may be received by the District Assembly to which it is addressed. [133 §6, 154 §3.]

198. The transfer of a licensed deaconess shall be valid only when accompanied by a detailed record of her grades in the course of study for licensed deaconesses, properly certified by the secretary of the district board of examination of the issuing District Assembly. [224.]

199. All transfers shall be sent direct to the District Assembly to which addressed. The receiving District Assembly shall notify the issuing District Assembly of the reception of the transferred deaconess' membership. Until the transfer is received by a vote of the District Assembly to which addressed, the deaconess thus transferred shall be a member of the issuing District Assembly. Such transfer to be valid only until the close of the next session following date of issue of the District Assembly to which addressed. [133 §6, 225.]

IV. Restoration of Membership of Consecrated Deaconesses

200. If for any reason the name of a consecrated deaconess shall be removed from a District Assembly roll, such consecrated deaconess shall not be recognized by any other District Assembly without having secured the written consent of the District Assembly from the roll of which her name had been removed.

CHAPTER IV

THE MINISTER AND THE MINISTRY

I. Qualifications and Call of the Minister

200a, §1. The perpetuity and the efficiency of the Church of the Nazarene, largely, if not wholly, depend upon the spiritual qualifications, the character, and the manner of life of its ministers.

§2. The minister of Christ is to be in all things a pattern to the flock—in diligence,

earnestness, discretion, punctuality. "By pureness, by knowledge, by long suffering, by kindness, by the Holy Ghost, by love unfeigned, by the word of truth, by the power of God, by the armour of righteousness on the right hand and on the left" (2 Cor. 6: 6, 7).

§3. The minister of the gospel in the Church of the Nazarene must know that he has peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, and that he is sanctified wholly by the baptism with the Holy Spirit. He must have a deep sense of the fact that souls for whom Christ died are perishing, and that he is called of God to proclaim to them the glad tidings of salvation.

The minister must likewise have a deep sense of the necessity of believers' going on unto perfection and developing the Christian graces in practical living, that their "love may abound yet more and more in knowledge and in all judgment." He must have a strong appreciation of both salvation and Christian ethics.

§4. As our Lord called unto Him whom He would, and chose and ordained His twelve apostles "that they should be with him, and that he might send them forth to preach," so He still calls and sends forth messengers of the gospel. The Church, illuminated by the Holy Spirit, will recognize the Lord's call.

When the church discovers this divine call, the proper steps should be taken for its recognition and indorsement, and all suitable help should be given to open the way into the ministry.

§5. The minister must have gifts, as well as grace, for the work. He will have a thirst for knowledge, especially of the Word of God; sound judgment and good understanding; clear views concerning the plan of redemption and salvation as revealed in the Scriptures. Saints will be edified and sinners converted through his ministry. He must be an example in prayer.

§6. Any person sustaining a marriage relation contrary to that allowed as justifiable in the Special Rules 36 §§1-2, shall be ineligible to the office of the ministry in the Church of the Nazarene. [211, 218, 263 §11.]

201. While we recognize and insist that all believers have committed unto them a dispensation of the gospel which they are to minister unto all men, we also recognize and hold that the Head of the Church calls some to the more official and public work of the ministry.

II. The Licensed Minister

202. When there are members of the Church of the Nazarene who feel called to the ministry, they may be licensed as licensed ministers by the District Assembly and enrolled as members of the District Assembly; *provided*, they (1) have held local preacher's license for one full year; (2) have passed the complete course of study for local preachers; (3) have been recommended for such work by the church board of the local church of which they are members, to which recommendation shall be attached the "Questionnaire for Prospective Licensed Ministers" carefully filled out; (4)

have given evidence of grace, gifts, and usefulness; (5) have been carefully examined, under the direction of the District Assembly of the district within the bounds of which they hold their church membership, regarding their spiritual, intellectual, and other fitness for such work; (6) have promised to pursue immediately the course of study prescribed for licensed ministers and candidates for ordination; (7) and have had any disqualification, which may have been imposed by a District Assembly, removed by an explanation in writing by the District Superintendent and the district advisory board of the district where the disqualification was imposed. [82, 103 §11, 133 §2.]

203. Licensed ministers from other evangelical denominations, desiring to unite with the Church of the Nazarene, may be licensed as licensed ministers by the District Assembly; *provided*, they present the credentials issued to them by the denomination in which they formerly held their membership; and further *provided*, that they (1) have passed a course of study equivalent at least to the course of study prescribed by the Church of the Nazarene for local preachers; (2) have been recommended by the church board of the local church of the Nazarene of which they are members; (3) have given evidence of grace, gifts, and usefulness; (4) have been carefully examined, under the direction of the District Assembly regarding their spiritual, intellectual, and other

fitness for such work; and (5) have promised to pursue immediately the course of study prescribed for licensed ministers and candidates for ordination. [133 §5.]

204. Minister's license shall terminate with the close of the next District Assembly. It may be renewed by vote of the District Assembly; *provided*, (1) that the candidate for renewal shall file with the District Assembly the "Questionnaire for Prospective Ministers" carefully filled out; and *provided*, that the candidate shall have completed at least two subjects in the year's course of study required, not including subjects in the reading course, and has been recommended for the renewal of license by the church board of the local church of which he is a member. In case, however, he shall not have passed the course of study required, his license may be renewed by the District Assembly only upon his submitting a written explanation for this failure, which explanation shall be satisfactory to the Committee on Orders and Relations and approved by the General Superintendent presiding. [158 §§1-8, 67, 103 §12, 132 §2.]

205. The General Superintendent having jurisdiction shall issue to each licensed minister a minister's license signed by himself and the district secretary. [213, 219, 227, 240.]

206. Such licensed ministers shall be vested with authority to preach the Word; and, *provided*, they pass annually the required studies of the course of study, they shall be vested

with authority, only when acting as pastors, to administer the sacraments of baptism and the Lord's Supper in their own congregations, and to officiate at marriages where the laws of the state do not prohibit. [35 §2, 62 §3, 370.]

207. All licensed ministers shall hold their ministerial membership in the District Assembly, to which body they shall report annually. [66, 130, 133 §1.]

207a, §1. In case a licensed minister has united with the church membership or ministry of another denomination, his church membership and ministerial membership in the Church of the Nazarene, shall, because of that fact, immediately cease, and the District Assembly shall cause to be entered into its minute record the following statement: "Removed from the membership and ministry of the church of the Nazarene by uniting with another denomination." [49 §3, 215a §1.]

§2. In case a licensed minister shall, without the written approval of the district advisory board of the Assembly District in which he holds his ministerial membership or the written approval of the Board of General Superintendents, regularly conduct independent church activities which are not under the direction of the Church of the Nazarene, or be connected with the operating staff of an independent church or other religious group, his church membership and ministerial membership in the Church of the Nazarene, shall because of that fact, immediately cease, and the District As-

sembly shall cause to be entered into its minute record the following statement: "Removed from the membership and ministry of the Church of the Nazarene." [49 §5, 215a §2.]

207b. The licensed minister shall always show due regard for the united advice of the District Superintendent and the district advisory board. [65a.]

208. Any claim to participation by a licensed minister and/or his dependents, in any plan or fund that the church may have now or hereafter for the assistance or support of its disabled or aged ministers, shall be based only upon regular, fulltime, active service rendered by the minister in the pastoral or evangelistic office or other recognized relation, under the sanction of the District Assembly. This rule shall exclude part-time and occasional service from such participation. [217, 285 §2.]

III. The Ordained Minister

209. We recognize but one order of the official ministry—that of the eldership. This is a permanent order in the Church. The elder is to rule well in the Church, to preach the Word, to administer the sacraments of baptism and the Lord's Supper, and to solemnize matrimony, all in the name of and in subjection to Jesus Christ the great Head of the Church. [35 §2, 61, 62 §3, 370.]

210. Those who are called of God to this ministry, and who have fulfilled all the requirements of the church for the same, who have

been orderly passed in the full course of study prescribed for licensed ministers and candidates for ordination, and have been carefully considered and favorably reported upon by a committee appointed by the District Assembly, may be elected to elder's orders by two-thirds vote of the District Assembly; *provided*, they have been in the active ministry not less than two years. [130, 133 §4, 158 §§1-8, 216.]

211. A licensed minister who is serving in a pastorate, or is actively engaged as a commissioned evangelist, may be ordained to the eldership; *provided*, he has been in the active ministry not less than two years; and, *provided*, he has passed the full four years' course of study prescribed for licensed ministers and candidates for ordination, and has been recommended for ordination by the church board of the local church in which he holds his church membership; and, *provided*, any disqualification which may have been imposed by a District Assembly, has been removed in writing by the District Superintendent and the district advisory board of the District where the disqualification was imposed; and, *provided* further, that his marriage relationship does not render him ineligible to ordination. [103 §13, 263 §11, 395 §§1-4.]

212. The candidate thus elected shall be ordained by the laying on of the hands of the elders, and other religious exercises, under the direction of the presiding General Superintendent [257 §4.]

213. The General Superintendent having jurisdiction shall issue to the person so ordained a certificate of ordination signed by himself and the district secretary. [205, 219, 227, 240.]

214. All elders shall hold church membership in some local church. [67.]

215. All elders shall hold their ministerial membership in the District Assembly of the District wherein their church membership is held, to which body they shall report annually. Any elder, who for two consecutive years does not report to his District Assembly, either in person or by letter, shall, if the District Assembly so elect, cease to be a member thereof. [27, 66, 130, 133 §1.]

215a, §1. In case an ordained minister has united with the church membership or ministry of another denomination, his church membership and ministerial membership in the Church of the Nazarene, shall, because of that fact, immediately cease, and the District Assembly shall cause to be entered into its minute record the following statement: "Removed from the membership and ministry of the Church of the Nazarene by uniting with another denomination." [49 §3, 207a §1.]

§2. In case an ordained minister shall, without the written approval of the district advisory board of the Assembly District in which he holds his ministerial membership or the written approval of the Board of General Superintendents, regularly conduct independent church activities which are not under the direction

of the Church of the Nazarene, or be connected with the operating staff of an independent church or other religious group, his church membership and ministerial membership in the Church of the Nazarene shall, because of that fact, immediately cease, and the District Assembly shall cause to be entered into its minute record the following statement: "Removed from the membership and ministry of the Church of the Nazarene." [49 §5, 207a §2.]

215b. The elder shall always show due regard for the united advice of the District Superintendent and the district advisory board. [65a.]

216. An elder may organize a local church when authorized to do so by the District Superintendent or the General Superintendent having jurisdiction. [40, 139 §1, 257 §5.]

217. Any claim to participation by an elder and/or his dependents, in any plan or fund that the church may have now or hereafter for the assistance or support of its disabled or aged ministers, shall be based only upon regular, full-time, active service rendered by the elder in the pastoral or evangelistic office or other recognized relation, under the sanction of the District Assembly. This rule shall exclude part time and occasional service from such participation. [208, 285 §2.]

IV. The Recognition of Elder's Orders

218. Elders from other evangelical denominations, desiring to unite with the Church of

the Nazarene and presenting their ordination papers, may have their orders recognized by the District Assembly, after satisfactory examination as to personal experience and doctrine; *provided*, they have passed an examination in studies judged by the district board of examination to be the equivalent of studies required for ordination in the Church of the Nazarene; and *provided* that the candidate for recognition shall file with the District Assembly the "Questionnaire for Ordained Ministers Desiring to Join the Church of the Nazarene," carefully filled out; and, *provided* further, that the candidate's marriage relationship shall be in accordance with that required for ordination in the Church of the Nazarene. [36 §1-2 and §4, 200a §6, 211, 133 §5.]

219. The General Superintendent having jurisdiction shall issue to the elder so recognized a certificate of recognition signed by himself and the district secretary. [205, 213, 227, 240.]

220. When the orders of an elder from another church shall have been duly recognized, his credentials issued by said church shall be returned to him inscribed in writing or stamped across the face as follows:

Accredited by the District
 Assembly of the Church of the Nazarene
 this day of, 19.....,
 as the basis of new credentials.

..... General Superintendent.

..... District Secretary.

221. The elder so recognized shall have his name enrolled as a ministerial member of the District Assembly. [130, 133 §1.]

V. The Transfers of Ministers

222. When an elder or a licensed minister desires to transfer to another District Assembly, a transfer of ministerial membership may be issued by vote of the District Assembly in which his ministerial membership is held, which transfer may be received by the District Assembly to which it is addressed. [133 §7.]

223. When an elder or a licensed minister desires to transfer to another District Assembly before the meeting of the District Assembly in which his ministerial membership is held, a transfer of ministerial membership may be issued by the District Superintendent and the district advisory board, which transfer may be received by the District Assembly to which it is addressed. [133 §7, 154 §3.]

224. The transfer of a licensed minister shall be valid only when accompanied by a detailed record of his grades in the course of study for licensed ministers, properly certified by the secretary of the district board of examination of the issuing District Assembly. [198.]

225. All transfers shall be sent direct to the District Assembly to which addressed. The receiving District Assembly shall notify the issuing District Assembly of the reception of the transferred person's membership. Until the transfer is received by vote of the District As-

sembly to which addressed, the person thus transferred shall be a member of the issuing District Assembly. Such transfer to be valid only until the close of the next session following date of issue of the District Assembly to which addressed. [133 §6, 199.]

VI. The Evangelist

226. An elder, or a licensed minister who has completed at least one year of the course of study for licensed ministers, who devotes his time to evangelism, may, by two-thirds vote of the District Assembly, be commissioned to do the work of an evangelist. Such commission shall continue only until the close of the next District Assembly. [133 §8.]

227. The General Superintendent having jurisdiction shall issue to each commissioned evangelist an evangelist's commission signed by himself and the district secretary. [205, 213, 219, 240.]

228. The evangelist shall report annually to the District Assembly of which he is a member, and shall attend the District Assembly in person, unless he can give a satisfactory reason for his absence. Failing to report, his commission shall not be renewed. [133 §8.]

VII. The Retired Minister

229. A retired minister is one who has been placed in the retired relation by the District Assembly in which he holds his ministerial membership. [136, 154 §11.]

230, §1. Any minister who is in good standing and has reached the age of sixty-five years,

may request a retired relation, and, upon his request, shall be placed in the retired relation by his District Assembly. [133, §27.]

§2. Any minister who is in good standing, but who is disqualified by physical disability or old age from engaging in such active ministerial labors as will afford him sufficient income for support, may, upon recommendation of the committee on orders and relations, be placed in the retired relation by his District Assembly. [133 §28.]

231. Retirement shall not compel cessation from ministerial labors nor deprive of membership in the District Assembly. [130, 215.]

231a. As a condition to receiving, or continuing to receive, financial assistance from the Department of Ministerial Relief, it shall be required that the minister applying for such assistance be placed in the retired relation by his District Assembly, after having passed his sixty-fifth birthday.

VIII. The Restoration of Church Membership of Ministers

232. Any minister who is expelled or withdraws under charges may reunite with the Church of the Nazarene only with the consent of the District Assembly of the Assembly District from which he withdrew or was expelled.

IX. The Restoration of District Assembly Membership of Elders

233. If for any reason the name of an elder shall be removed from a District Assembly roll, such elder shall not be recognized in any other

District Assembly without having secured the written consent of the District Assembly from the roll of which his name had been removed.

234. When an elder has been deprived of his credentials by expulsion or other disciplinary action, or has surrendered his credentials for any reason, such credentials shall be sent to the General Church Secretary to be filed and preserved, subject to the order of his District Assembly. [267 §5.]

235. When an elder in good standing surrenders his credentials for any reason, such surrendered credentials may, at any subsequent time, be restored to the elder upon order of the District Assembly to which they were surrendered; *provided*, that the restoration of his credentials shall have been recommended by the local church of which he is a member and by the District Superintendent and the district advisory board.

236. When an elder has been deprived of his credentials by expulsion or other disciplinary action, or has surrendered his credentials, except as provided in 235, his District Assembly may restore such credentials at any future time, *provided*, (1) the elder shall have given satisfactory evidence of amendment of life and conduct; and (2) the church board of the local church of which he is a member shall recommend the restoration of his credentials and the District Superintendent and the district advisory board shall endorse that recommendation: *provided*, however, that in case of a ques-

tion of adultery or other sex immorality, his credentials shall not be restored in less than two years from the date of their surrender, and then only with the additional written approval of the Board of General Superintendents.

237. In case the credentials of an elder have been lost, mutilated or destroyed, a duplicate certificate of ordination may be issued; *provided*, the signature of the General Superintendent and the district secretary who signed the original certificate may be obtained; and further *provided*, that the elder is in good standing and the issuance of a duplicate certificate is requested by vote of the District Assembly of which he is a member.

In case the signature of the General Superintendent or of the district secretary who signed the original certificate cannot be obtained for the duplicate certificate, the District Assembly in which the elder holds his ministerial membership may adopt a resolution granting to him a certificate of recognition; *provided*, that the resolution so adopted should state fully the reason or reasons for granting a certificate of recognition instead of a duplicate certificate of ordination; and further *provided*, that the following statement, signed by the presiding General Superintendent and the district secretary, shall be inscribed in writing or printing or both writing and printing on the reverse side thereof:

This certificate is given to take the place of former certificate of ordination given to

[Name], on the day of [Month], A. D. 19...., by the [Ordaining organization], at which date ..he was ordained and h... former ordination certificate was signed by and

The former certificate was [Lost—mutilated—destroyed].

..... General Superintendent.

..... District Secretary.

CHAPTER V

THE SONG EVANGELIST

238. When there are members of the Church of the Nazarene who feel called to the special ministry of song evangelism, they may be commissioned as song evangelists for one year by the District Assembly; *provided*, they (1) have been recommended for such work by the church board of the local church of which they are members; (2) give evidence of grace, gifts, and usefulness; (3) have had at least one year of experience in song evangelism; (4) have had not less than one year of vocal study under an accredited teacher; (5) are regularly engaged as song evangelists; (6) have been carefully examined, under the direction of the District Assembly of the Assembly District within the bounds of which they hold their church membership, regarding their spiritual, intellectual, and other fitness for such work. [133 §9.]

239. All song evangelists shall report annually to the District Assembly from which they receive their commissions. [133 §1.]

240. The General Superintendent having jurisdiction shall issue to each song evangelist a song evangelist's commission signed by himself and the district secretary. [205, 213, 219, 227.]

CHAPTER VI

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

I. Functions and Organization

241. The General Assembly is the supreme doctrine-expressing and law-making and elective authority of the Church of the Nazarene, subject to the provisions of the Church Constitution. [24-32.]

242. The General Assembly shall be presided over by the General Superintendents, jointly and severally. [29.]

243. The General Assembly shall elect its other officers and organize itself for the transaction of its business according to its wisdom and pleasure. [30.]

II. Membership of the General Assembly

244. The General Assembly shall be composed of ministerial and lay delegates in equal numbers, elected thereto by the District Assemblies of the Church of the Nazarene; of the General Superintendents Emeritus and Retired; of the General Superintendents; of the General

Church Secretary; of the General Treasurer; of the Editor of the *Herald of Holiness*; of the Editor-in-Chief of church school periodicals; of the Foreign Missions Secretary; of the General Secretary of the General Nazarene Young People's Society; of the General President of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society; of the superintendents of each foreign mission field or district, or one representative therefrom nominated by the district council and elected by the Department of Foreign Missions, or, in the absence of such nomination, the representative to be elected by the Department of Foreign Missions. [24, 25, 26, 133 §23, 245; 260; 256; 265; 270; 253 §11, 286 §4; 253 §12, 286 §5; 293; 296.]

245. Assembly Districts shall be entitled to representation in the General Assembly as follows: two elders and two laymen from each Assembly District of five hundred or fewer church members, and one additional elder and one additional layman for each successive one thousand church members and the final major part of one thousand church members. [24, 25, 26, 133 §23.]

245a, §1. The right of a ministerial delegate-elect to the General Assembly to represent the District Assembly electing him, shall be vacated in case that, prior to the convening of the General Assembly, he shall accept a pastoral charge or the office of District Superintendent on another Assembly District.

§2. The right of a lay delegate-elect to the General Assembly to represent the District

Assembly electing him, shall be vacated in case that, prior to the convening of the General Assembly, he shall remove his church membership to some local church on another Assembly District.

III. The Time and Place of Meeting

246. The General Assembly shall meet in the month of June, every fourth year from the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and twenty-eight, at such time and place as shall be determined by the General Superintendents and a commission of four persons chosen by the Board of General Superintendents. The General Superintendents and said commission shall also have power, in case of an emergency, to change the time and place of the meeting of the General Assembly.

247. The General Assembly shall open on Sunday with a full day of devotional and inspirational services. Provision shall be made for the orderly and careful transaction of business, and for such services at the close of the session as it may order. The General Assembly shall fix the time at which its session shall adjourn. [27.]

IV. Special Sessions

248. The Board of General Superintendents, or a majority thereof, by and with the written consent of two-thirds of all the District Superintendents, shall have power to call a special session of the General Assembly in case of an emergency, the time and place thereof to be determined by the General Superintendents

and a commission chosen by the Board of General Superintendents.

249. In case of a special session of the General Assembly, the delegates and alternates to the last preceding General Assembly, or their duly elected and qualified successors, shall serve as delegates and alternates to the special session. [24, 25, 26, 133 §23.]

V. General Assembly Entertainment Committee

250. The General Church Secretary, the General Treasurer, and three persons appointed by the Board of General Superintendents at least one year before the convening of the General Assembly, shall constitute the General Assembly entertainment committee.

251. The General Assembly entertainment committee shall have authority to arrange all necessary details regarding offices, exhibits and space, entertainment and meals, and whatever else may be needful to contribute to the comfort, convenience, and efficiency of the General Assembly, and enter into contracts necessary to provide the same.

252. The General Assembly entertainment committee with the General Superintendents shall formulate a program for the General Assembly, including anniversaries for each of the general interests; a communion service; and other religious services for the first three days of the General Assembly or until a committee on public worship shall have been appointed; all of which program shall be subject to approval by the General Assembly.

VI. Business of General Assembly

253. The business of the General Assembly, subject to Part Three, Article IV, Section 9, of the Church Constitution, shall be:

§1. To elect, by a two-thirds vote of its members present and voting, as many General Superintendents as it may deem necessary, who shall hold office until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified; *provided*, that no person shall be elected to the office of General Superintendent who has not attained to the age of thirty-five years, or who has reached the age of seventy years. [28, 255.]

§2. To elect a General Superintendent to the *emeritus* relation, when deemed advisable; *provided*, he shall have become disabled or shall have reached his seventieth birthday; and shall have served as an active General Superintendent for three or more successive quadrenniums. It is hereby understood that election to the *emeritus* relation is of life tenure. [260.]

§2a. To place in the retired relation a General Superintendent who has attained to the age of seventy years, or who, in the judgment of the General Assembly, has become disqualified by physical disability, or by old age, or by any other disqualification so as to prevent him from caring adequately for the work of the General Superintendency; and *provided* that he has served in the office of General

Superintendent for a reasonable term of years.
[260.]

§2b. To fix a suitable retirement pension for each General Superintendent emeritus and each retired General Superintendent. [426.]

§3. To elect a General Church Secretary, as provided in §12, herein, who shall hold office until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified. [264, 400.]

§4. To elect a General Treasurer, as provided in §12, herein, who shall hold office until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified. [269, 402.]

§5. To elect a General Board, as provided in 275 §§1-6, to serve until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [273, 275 §§1-6, 276, 405.]

§6. To elect a General Board of Foreign Missions, a General Board of Home Missions and Evangelism, a General Board of Church Extension, a General Board of Ministerial Relief, a General Orphanage Board, and a General Board of Education, each having five members, to hold office until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [281 §7, 283 §6, 284 §4, 285 §4, 289, 287 §15.]

§7. To elect seven persons to be members of the Nazarene Publishing House, a corporation, to serve until the final adjournment of the next

General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [286 §8.]

§8. To elect an Editor-in-Chief of church school periodicals, as provided in §12, herein, who shall serve until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified. He shall be an *ex officio* member of the General Assembly. [244, 286 §§5-5b, 404.]

§9. To elect a General Court of Appeals, consisting of five elders, to serve until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [31, 309 §1, 409.]

§10. To elect a Book Committee of three members, to serve until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [286 §3, 412.]

§11. To elect an Editor of the *Herald of Holiness*, as provided in §12, herein, who shall serve until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified. He shall be an *ex officio* member of the General Assembly. [286 §4-4a, 403.]

§12. The General Assembly shall have a Committee on Special Nominations composed as follows: The General Assembly Committee on Nominations shall select as many persons as there are General Superintendents, who jointly with the Board of General Superintendents shall constitute the Committee on Special Nominations. The Committee on Spe-

cial Nominations shall nominate to the General Assembly three persons for each of the following offices: General Church Secretary, General Treasurer, Editor of *Herald of Holiness*, and Editor-in-Chief of church school periodicals; from which nominations the General Assembly shall elect one person to each office. [253 §§3, 4, 8, 11.]

§13. To do anything else, in harmony with the Holy Scriptures, that wisdom may dictate for the general welfare of the Church of the Nazarene and the holy cause of Christ, subject to the Church Constitution. [32.]

VII. The General Superintendents

254. The General Superintendents, elected by the General Assembly, shall serve until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [244, 253 §1.]

255. A General Superintendent shall hold no other general office in the church during his term of office as General Superintendent. [258.]

256. The General Superintendents shall be members, *ex officio*, of the General Assembly. [244.]

257. The duties of the General Superintendents shall be:

§1. To have general supervision of the Church of the Nazarene, subject to the law and order as adopted by the General Assembly.

§2. To preside over the General Assembly and over the General Board of the Church of the Nazarene, jointly and severally. [280 §2.]

§3. A General Superintendent shall preside over each District Assembly; or, should he be hindered, shall make suitable arrangements for such presidency. [132, 139 §9.]

§4. To ordain, or appoint others to ordain, in connection with the elders present, those who have been duly elected to be elders. [212.]

§5. The General Superintendent having jurisdiction may organize local churches or recognize the local churches already organized, after consulting with the District Superintendent, wherever there may seem to be need and providential openings. He may appoint pastors to have charge of such local churches until such time as pastors may be duly elected. [40, 139 §1, 216.]

§6. The General Superintendent presiding over a District Assembly, the District Superintendent, and the district advisory board, in concurrence with the delegates of local churches, shall appoint pastors over such local churches as have not regularly called pastors. [69, 136, 154 §2.]

§7. The General Superintendents, jointly and severally, may appoint District Superintendents over Assembly Districts where vacancies occur. [138.]

§8. The General Superintendent having jurisdiction shall appoint an elder to fill a vacancy that may occur in a district court of appeals in the interim of sessions of the District Assembly. [133 §21.]

§9. The General Superintendent having jurisdiction may preside at the annual, or a special, meeting of a local church, or appoint someone to represent him. [53.]

§10. The General Superintendent having jurisdiction, may, prior to the convening of the District Assembly, appoint a nominating committee to serve during the annual session of the District Assembly. [See 132 §2.]

258. The General Superintendents shall not be members of any of the general boards of the Church of the Nazarene. [255.]

259. All official acts of the General Superintendents shall be subject to review and revision by the General Assembly.

VIII. General Superintendent Emeritus and Retired General Provisions

260. The General Superintendent Emeritus and the Retired General Superintendent shall be members *ex officio* of the General Assembly.

A General Superintendent who has been elected to the emeritus relation or placed in the retired relation shall not be a member of the Board of General Superintendents, and shall be relieved of all official responsibility. [253 §§2-2b.]

IX. The Board of General Superintendents

261. The General Superintendents shall organize as a board, and arrange for and assign to the members thereof the particular work over which they shall have special jurisdiction.

262, §1. If a vacancy occur, by death or otherwise, in the Board of General Superintendents, in the interim of sessions of the General Assembly, the General Church Secretary shall at once notify all District Superintendents of the Church of the Nazarene, who shall, by two-thirds vote of all, elect some elder of the Church of the Nazarene to fill the vacancy and to perform the duties of General Superintendent until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly; *provided*, the question of calling for an election to fill the vacancy shall be decided by the Board of General Superintendents. [267 §7.]

§2. The General Church Secretary shall report the result of the vote to the Board of General Superintendents, which shall announce the same to the Church of the Nazarene through the *Herald of Holiness*. [267 §7.]

263, The duties of the Board of General Superintendents shall be:

§1. To have supervision of the missionary work of the Church of the Nazarene in all foreign fields. Each field shall be visited by at least two different General Superintendents in each quadrennium. The Board of General Superintendents shall assign to the members thereof the particular fields for visitation. They shall approve or disapprove all nominations made by the Department of Foreign Missions to the General Board of the Church of the Nazarene for appointment as foreign missionaries. [281 §§1-4.]

§2. To have supervision of all general boards and departments thereof. The policies and plans adopted by any board or department shall have the approval of the Board of General Superintendents. [281 §1, 283 §1, 284 §1, 285 §1, 286 §1, 287 §1, 288 §1, 290, 291, 294.]

§3. The Board of General Superintendents, with the General Board, is authorized and empowered to apportion the general budget to the several Assembly Districts in harmony with 280 §9.

§4. To make nominations to the General Board for the filling of any vacancy that may occur in the following offices during the interim of sessions of the General Assembly: General Church Secretary, General Treasurer, editor of *Herald of Holiness*, Editor-in-Chief of church school periodicals. [280 §20.]

§5. To fill vacancies that may occur in the membership of the General Court of Appeals in the interim of sessions of the General Assembly. [289, 309 §1, 409.]

§6. To approve the appointments and elections made by the General Board of the Church of the Nazarene in filling vacancies that may occur in its membership. [277.]

§7. To fill vacancies, upon nominations made by the remaining members thereof, in the following corporate bodies, namely, General Board of Foreign Missions, General Board of Home Missions and Evangelism, General Board of Church Extension, General Orphanage

Board, General Board of Ministerial Relief, General Board of Education, and the Nazarene Publishing House. [281 §7, 283 §6, 284 §4, 289, 406, 285 §4, 286 §8, 287 §15.]

§8. To appoint one of the General Superintendents to serve on the General Council of the General Nazarene Young People's Society. [373 §5.]

§9. The Board of General Superintendents and the Department of Education shall arrange courses of study for local preachers, licensed ministers, and licensed deaconesses. [287 §14, 395, 396, 397.]

§10. The Board of General Superintendents shall be the authority for the interpretation of the law and doctrine of the Church of the Nazarene, and the meaning and force of all provisions of the *Manual*, subject to an appeal to the General Assembly. [309 §4.]

§11. The Board of General Superintendents shall have discretionary power in the ordaining of divorced persons to the office of elder in the Church of the Nazarene, *provided* such divorced persons have scriptural grounds for divorce.

§12. The Board of General Superintendents shall have authority to do anything else in the service of the Church of the Nazarene, not otherwise provided for, according to the dictates of its wisdom, in harmony with our general church order, and subject to the Church Constitution.

X. The General Church Secretary

264. The General Church Secretary, elected by the General Assembly, as hereinafter provided, [253 §12], shall serve until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified [244, 253 §2, 421.]

265. The General Church Secretary shall be a member, *ex officio*, of the General Assembly. [244.]

266. If in the interim of sessions of the General Assembly, a vacancy should occur in the office of General Church Secretary for any cause, it shall be filled by the General Board, upon nomination by the Board of General Superintendents. [253 §4, 280. §20.]

266a. The General Church Secretary shall be amenable to the Board of General Superintendents and the General Board.

267. The duties of the General Church Secretary shall be:

§1. To record correctly and preserve the journal of the proceedings of the General Assembly.

§2. To record correctly and preserve all general statistics of the Church of the Nazarene.

§3. To preserve all documents belonging to the General Assembly, promptly delivering the same to his successor.

§4. To preserve carefully, in permanent form, all decisions rendered by the General Court of Appeals. [309 §7.]

§5. To file and preserve all surrendered credentials of ministers and deliver them only on proper order made by the District Assembly of the Assembly District from which they were received. [234.]

§6. To audit Assembly District statistical charts for publication in harmony with 144 §3.

§7. To do faithfully whatever else may be necessary for the fulfillment of his office. [262 §§1, 2.]

§8. The General Church Secretary shall be the custodian of, and hold in trust, such legal documents as belong to the general church.

§9. The General Church Secretary, in conjunction with the General Superintendents, shall, prior to the opening of the General Assembly, prepare all necessary forms, including *Rules of Order*, *Manual Abridgment* for revision, and other things necessary for expediting the work of the General Assembly. The expense incurred shall be provided for out of the General Assembly expense fund.

§10. The General Church Secretary is authorized to collect available historic material relating to the rise and development of our denomination, and shall be the custodian of all such records and material.

268. The General Church Secretary may have as many assistants for his work as the General Assembly shall elect, or, in the interim of sessions of the General Assembly, the Board of General Superintendents may appoint.

XI. The General Treasurer

269. The General Treasurer, elected by the General Assembly, as hereinafter provided, [253 §12], shall serve until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified. [244, 253 §3, 421.]

270. The General Treasurer shall be a member, *ex officio*, of the General Assembly. [244.]

271. If, in the interim of sessions of the General Assembly, a vacancy should occur in the office of General Treasurer for any cause, it shall be filled by the General Board, upon nomination by the Board of General Superintendents. [253 §4, 280 §20.]

271a. The General Treasurer shall be amenable to the Board of General Superintendents and the General Board.

272. The duties of the General Treasurer shall be:

§1. To have the custody of all funds belonging to the general interests of the Church of the Nazarene.

§2. To receive, and disburse on order, the funds of the Department of Foreign Missions, the Department of Home Missions and Evangelism, the Department of Publication, the Department of Ministerial Relief, the Department of Education, and the Department of Church Schools, and such other funds as properly belong to the General Board, or to any of its departments; the General Superintendents' fund; the general contingent fund; the General As-

sembly expense fund; and other general benevolent church funds; and the funds of the General Nazarene Young People's Society. [273, 274.]

§3. To give bond for the faithful performance of his duties, in a reliable surety company, in a good and sufficient sum, as the General Board may direct.

§4. To furnish such reports to the Boards and departments, for whose funds he may be custodian, as may be required by them.

§5. To furnish to the General Board an annual report of all the finances of the Church of the Nazarene, including investments. [280 §9.]

§6. To safeguard annuity funds invested in real estate by proper insurance policies and to provide against the lapsing of such policies.

§7. To secure monthly reports of receipts and disbursements from all schools, orphanages, rescue homes, and other institutions of the Church of the Nazarene. [149 §2.]

XII. The General Board

273. The General Board of the Church of the Nazarene shall be composed of members who shall be elected by ballot by the General Assembly from among the persons nominated as provided in 275 §§1-6. [253 §5.]

274, §1. The General Church Secretary shall be, *ex officio*, secretary of the General Board. [264.]

§2. The General Treasurer of the Church of the Nazarene shall be *ex officio*, treasurer of

the General Board and also of the departments thereof. [269.]

275, §1. The delegations representing the Assembly Districts of each geographical zone in the United States shall nominate to the General Assembly twice the number of elders and laymen, who are to be elected from each zone on the following basis of representation: one elder and one layman from each zone of twenty-five thousand members or less and for each additional twenty-five thousand members or the major fraction thereof an additional elder and layman, except that no district shall have more than one nominee until each district of the zone has been represented by a nomination. Those elected by the General Assembly by ballot as herein provided shall be members of the General Board. [253 §5, 360-365.]

§2. The delegations representing the British Isles-Canadian Zone shall nominate to the General Assembly four elders, two of which number shall be elected by the General Assembly by ballot to be members of the General Board. It is *provided however*, that only one of these two members shall be in attendance officially at any meeting of the General Board. [253 §5, 366.]

§3. The General Council of the General Nazarene Young People's Society shall nominate to the General Assembly two members of the General Council, and one of the persons so nominated shall, if acceptable, be elected by

the General Assembly to serve on the General Board. [292.]

§4. The General Assembly committee on education shall nominate to the General Assembly two persons, and one of the persons so nominated shall, if acceptable, be elected by the General Assembly to serve on the General Board.

§5. The Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council shall nominate to the General Assembly two members of the General Council, and one of the persons so nominated shall, if acceptable, be elected by the General Assembly to serve on the General Board. [295.]

§6. The General Assembly committee on church schools shall nominate to the General Assembly two persons, and one of the persons so nominated shall, if acceptable, be elected by the General Assembly to serve on the General Board.

276. The members of the General Board shall hold office until the final adjournment of the next regular General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [253 §5.]

277. Vacancies occurring in the membership of the General Board, and also the departments thereof, shall be filled by the remaining members of the General Board, subject to the approval of the Board of General Superintendents. [263 §6.]

278. The General Board of the Church of the Nazarene shall have the following depart-

ments, which are hereby established, membership on which departments shall be as provided by vote of the General Board.

1. Department of Foreign Missions
2. Department of Home Missions and Evangelism
3. Department of Ministerial Relief
4. Department of Publication
5. Department of Education
6. Department of Church Schools

279. All business transacted by said departments shall be subject to the approval of the General Board as hereinafter provided. [281 §1, 283 §1, 284 §1, 285 §1, 286 §1, 287 §1, 288 §1.]

POWER AND DUTIES OF THE GENERAL BOARD

280, §1. The General Board shall promote the financial and material affairs of all the departments of the Church of the Nazarene, subject to such instructions as may be given by the General Assembly; it shall co-ordinate, correlate and unify the plans and activities of the several constituent departments so that a unified policy may be established by and in all the activities of the Church of the Nazarene; it shall have the power to direct the auditing of the accounts of all departments and institutions relating to or associated with the Church of the Nazarene, with a view to securing such uniformity of method and completeness of form as shall be most efficient; and it shall be an advisory body in the business and administra-

tive affairs of the several departments of the General Board and of all the organizations and institutions that are a part of, related to or associated with this denomination, and these departments, organizations, and institutions shall give due consideration to the advice and recommendations of the General Board.

§1a. The General Board shall have power to buy, own, hold, manage, mortgage, sell and convey and donate, or otherwise acquire, encumber, and dispose of both real and personal property, sold, devised, bequeathed, donated or otherwise conveyed to it in trust for any lawful purpose, and to execute such trust; to borrow and to loan money in the execution of its lawful purposes.

§2. The General Board shall meet before or immediately following the final adjournment of the General Assembly and shall organize by electing officers and committees, and members to departments as required by its articles of incorporation and bylaws, to serve until the next annual meeting of the General Board and until their successors are elected and qualified. The General Superintendents, jointly and severally, shall preside over the meetings of the General Board. [257 §2.]

§3. The General Board shall meet in annual session, on the second Tuesday of January, at Kansas City, Missouri; *provided*, however, that the hour, date, and place of the annual meeting may, by resolution adopted at any reg-

ular or special meeting, be changed to suit the best interests of the General Board and its departments. [299.]

§4. Special meetings of the General Board may be called by the chairman, the president, or the secretary.

§5. The General Board shall choose a finance committee consisting of one member from each department. Each department shall have the right to nominate one of its members as a member of the finance committee. The finance committee shall have charge of the proper investment of trust funds. The General Board shall refer to this committee all budget askings for the ensuing year submitted from the several departments, upon which askings this committee shall report with its recommendations. This committee shall perform any other work assigned to it by the General Board. It shall keep accurate minutes of all its meetings and submit them to the General Board for approval.

§6. The General Board shall at its annual meeting receive from each of its departments a detailed report of its activities for the past year including a financial report, together with a more or less detailed statement of the proposed activities and expenditures as its budget for the ensuing year; from these statements and the statement from the General Treasurer it shall determine the amount to be allotted from the general budget to each department and fund; *provided*, however, that the General

Board shall have authority to increase or diminish the amount asked for any department or fund.

§7. When the general budget with its proposed allotment to each department shall have been agreed upon, it shall be submitted to the Board of General Superintendents for its consideration and suggestions before final adoption by the General Board. The Board of General Superintendents may suggest changes in the proposed general budget and make recommendations in writing before the final adjournment of the General Board, and the General Board shall give due consideration to such suggestions and recommendations.

§8. The general budget shall be the grand total of all department budgets and other funds to be raised by the whole denomination for the support, maintenance, and promotion of its general activities.

§9. When the total amount of the general budget has been fixed for the next fiscal year by the General Board, the General Board and the Board of General Superintendents are authorized and empowered to apportion the general budget to the several Assembly Districts on a basis of equity to both the district and general interests affected. [263 §3.]

§10. The General Treasurer shall annually present to the General Board a detailed financial report of receipts and disbursements of all funds of which he has been custodian during the past year, including trust funds and in-

vestments, together with a detailed statement of the proposed expenditures for the ensuing year of funds not included in the budgets of departments of the General Board. The General Treasurer shall be responsible to the General Board for the faithful performance of his duties. [272 §§3, 5.]

§11. Each department shall meet before or immediately following the final adjournment of the General Assembly and organize by choosing a department chairman, a vice chairman, and a recording secretary. The officers shall serve in the usual capacity of their respective offices. Department committees may be provided at the pleasure of each department.

§12. Each department shall meet as many days prior to the meeting of the General Board as may be necessary to transact its business. Each department may hold special meetings when called by the chairman or by the recording secretary.

§13. Each department shall meet separately for the purpose of considering the business pertaining to that department. It shall formulate its plans and policies, prepare its budget, and submit a comprehensive report of the business transacted for the information and approval of the General Board. Any department on request shall furnish to the General Board any other information required.

§14. Each department shall file with the secretary of the General Board complete minutes of each meeting of the department.

§15. Each department may employ such help as it may deem necessary, provided it keeps within its disbursing budget.

§16. Each department shall prepare a report of all work done during the preceding four years, including funds received from all sources and the amounts and purposes for which disbursed, and a program of activities for the next succeeding quadrennium, and this report when approved shall become a part of the report of the General Board to the General Assembly.

§17. No department, organization or institution that is a part of, related to or associated with the Church of the Nazarene, should issue annuity bonds, life notes or other similar financial contracts contrary to the advice of the General Board.

§18. The General Board shall elect annually three persons residing within convenient distance of Kansas City, Missouri, to serve as members-at-large on the General Stewardship Committee for one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. [297.]

§19. The General Board shall elect annually a stewardship secretary to serve on the General Stewardship Committee for one year and until his successor is elected and qualified. [297.]

§20. The General Board, during the interim of sessions of the General Assembly, shall fill, upon nomination by the Board of General Superintendents, any vacancy which may occur in the following offices: General Church

Secretary, General Treasurer, Editor of *Herald of Holiness*, Editor-in-Chief of church school periodicals. [163 §4, 266, 271, 286 §§4, 5.]

§21. The General Board shall elect by ballot from one or more nominations submitted by the Department of Foreign Missions jointly with the Board of General Superintendents, one person to be Foreign Missions Secretary, to serve until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified; unless he is removed from such office for cause by a two-thirds vote of all members of the General Board, and with the written approval of the Board of General Superintendents. [244, 281 §3a.]

The General Board shall fix the salary of the Foreign Missions Secretary.

§22. The General Board shall elect by ballot from one or more nominations submitted by the Department of Publication jointly with the Board of General Superintendents, a manager of the Nazarene Publishing House, to serve until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until his successor is elected and qualified; unless he is removed from such office for cause by a two-thirds vote of all members of the General Board, and with the written approval of the Board of General Superintendents. [286 §6.]

The General Board shall fix the salary of the manager of the Nazarene Publishing House.

THE DEPARTMENT OF FOREIGN MISSIONS

281, §1. The Department of Foreign Missions shall perform the work of diffusing Christianity more generally by supporting, maintaining and promoting missionary activity and evangelism by the Church of the Nazarene in foreign mission territory.

It shall supervise and administer the work of organizing, maintaining and supporting churches, mission schools, dispensaries, hospitals, and orphanages, and providing them with proper buildings, equipment and workers; and do whatever else may be proper and necessary for the welfare and progress of foreign missionary work, subject to the approval of the General Board and the Board of General Superintendents. [279, 263 §§1, 2.]

§2. The Department of Foreign Missions shall prepare an annual detailed report of its activities for the past year including a financial report, together with a more or less detailed statement of its proposed activities and expenditures as its budget for the ensuing year, and submit the same to the General Board at its annual meeting for approval; *provided*, however, that no budget shall be in excess of the goal set by the General Assembly for this department.

§2a. The Department of Foreign Missions shall approve or disapprove the members-elect of the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council elected according to the Constitution

of the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council. [294, 374 §4.]

§3. Foreign mission territory shall consist of those countries considered advisable by the General Board for foreign missionary work.

§3a. The Foreign Missions Secretary, elected according to 280 §21, shall give his undivided attention to such duties as properly belong to his office, and in such manner as the interests of the Church of the Nazarene may require in agreement with the Bylaws of the General Board and the policies adopted by the Department of Foreign Missions and the General Board. [244.]

§4. Missionaries to foreign mission territory, both lay and ministerial, shall be appointed and commissioned by the General Board from nominations made by the Department of Foreign Missions; *provided*, however, that all such nominations shall have been duly approved in writing by the Board of General Superintendents. [263 §1.]

§4a. All lay missionaries appointed and commissioned by the General Board shall, by virtue thereof, be members of the District Assembly of their choice. [130, 430.]

§5. The Woman's General Missionary Council shall be an auxiliary of the Department of Foreign Missions and subject to its direction.

§6. The Department of Foreign Missions shall have supervision of the sanitarium and hospital work of the Church of the Nazarene.

Such work to be recognized must meet the following requirements:

(1) A first aid course, to be offered in connection with any of our schools under the following requirements: the course to consist of at least five hours work per week, under the direction of a registered nurse (R.N.) or a doctor of medicine (M. D.).

(2) A training school for nurses to be offered in connection with any of our schools under the following requirements: a general hospital, sanitarium, or infirmary having at least twenty beds; having a governing board of directors or trustees; having a dean or president of staff who is a doctor of medicine (M. D.); having a superintendent and head nurse, each of whom must be a registered nurse (R. N.). Each member of the governing board and each officer must be in the experience of entire sanctification.

§7. The General Board of Foreign Missions, a corporation of Kansas City, Missouri, shall be composed of five members elected by the General Assembly, who shall hold office until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. Vacancies therein shall be filled by the Board of General Superintendents from nominations made by the remaining members of the corporation. [253 §6.]

§8. (1) It shall be the duty of the Department of Foreign Missions to nominate five persons to the General Board to be members of the

Commission on Foreign Missionary Study Literature, and the persons so nominated shall, if acceptable, be elected by the General Board to serve on the commission. The foreign missions secretary, elected to that office by the General Board, shall be a member *ex officio* of the Commission.

(2) Nominations to the Commission shall be selected in the following manner: Two nominees shall be selected by the Department of Foreign Missions, one by the Executive Committee of the Woman's General Missionary Council, one by the Department of Church Schools, and one by the General Council of the General Nazarene Young People's Society; and these nominations shall be submitted to the General Board by the Department of Foreign Missions.

(3) The duties of the Commission on Foreign Missionary Study Literature shall be to authorize, supervise and correlate all foreign missionary study programs and material for the Church of the Nazarene, including study courses, missionary themes, topics and lines of study, to be used in whole or in part by any department or auxiliary. In case any phase of this study literature is not found adaptable to any department, that department may provide such additional study material as shall be approved by the Commission.

§9. (1) The compilation of rules and regulations to govern our foreign missionaries, native home missionaries, foreign mission fields,

foreign missionary districts, native local churches, and native church members, shall be known as the *Foreign Missionary Policy*.

(2) The *Foreign Missionary Policy* shall be adopted by the General Board and shall be subject to amendment from time to time by the General Board.

(3) Native local churches and foreign missionary districts may be organized in harmony with the *Foreign Missionary Policy* and shall be subject to the provisions and requirements of said *Policy*.

(4) Native church members, and licensed and ordained native ministers, shall be subject to the provisions and requirements of the *Foreign Missionary Policy* until the foreign missionary field or district shall have been organized into a regular Assembly District.

(5) In case a foreign missionary district and the native local churches thereof shall become wholly self-supporting and shall be deemed by the District Superintendent and the mission council to be capable of functioning as regular local churches and a regular Assembly District, the procedure shall be as follows:

The District Superintendent and the mission council shall petition the General Board and the Board of General Superintendents for authorization to effect such organization in agreement with the Church Constitution and the *Manual*. Upon the issuance of such authorization the District Superintendent, or some one appointed by the Board of General Superin-

tendents, shall effect the proper organization. Local churches so organized, and Assembly Districts so constituted, shall thereafter in all respects be subject to and governed by the provisions of the Church Constitution and the *Manual*.

THE DEPARTMENT OF HOME MISSIONS AND EVANGELISM

282. The Department of Home Missions and Evangelism shall function clearly in the two distinct divisions of its work, namely, home missions, and church extension.

HOME MISSIONS

283, §1. This department, in the division of home missions, shall perform the work of diffusing Christianity more generally by supporting, maintaining and promoting all phases of church work and missionary activity conducted by the Church of the Nazarene in the home mission territory, with the exception of the Mexicans in the Southwest, including work among foreign speaking people and others not cared for by regular pastors, and in all home mission districts, and all work among English speaking peoples in whatever country carried on subject to the approval of the General Board and the Board of General Superintendents. [279, 263 §2.]

§2. It shall be the duty of this department, in the division of home missions, to supervise and manage the work of evangelistic campaigns; organize churches and otherwise extend

Christianity and the Church of the Nazarene in home mission territory.

§3. It shall be the duty of this department, in the division of home missions, to promote an aggressive evangelism throughout the Church of the Nazarene and to co-operate in every way with the General Superintendents, the District Superintendents, the pastors and the evangelists in the work of evangelism; to inspire members of our local churches to zeal in soul winning through intercessory prayer, personal evangelism and the distribution of gospel literature.

§4. (1) An Assembly District having not more than five hundred members may become a home mission district by majority vote of the District Assembly and at the discretion of the General Board.

(2) The District Superintendent of such home mission district shall be nominated by the Board of General Superintendents and elected by vote of the District Assembly. In case the nomination be rejected by the vote of the District Assembly, the General Superintendent presiding shall continue submitting nominations until there is an election by vote of the District Assembly.

(3) An Assembly District having five hundred members, and fewer than six hundred members, may be eligible to consideration for help from the Department of Home Missions and Evangelism in its division of home missions.

(4) All requests for grants of home mission funds shall be accompanied by reasons therefor, and shall be filed in writing with the Home Missions Secretary of the Department of Home Missions and Evangelism. Such requests shall be submitted to the Board of General Superintendents for review. No appropriation shall be made by the Department of Home Missions and Evangelism without the written approval of the Board of General Superintendents.

(5) The distribution of home missionary funds, whether to work among foreigners in the homeland, or to home missionary activities in recognized Assembly Districts, shall be made through the district advisory board of the Assembly District in which the work is being conducted, with the exception of the duly organized Mexican border work.

§5. This department, in its division of home missions, shall prepare an annual detailed report of its activities for the past year including a financial report, together with a more or less detailed statement of its proposed activities and expenditures as its budget for the ensuing year, and submit the same to the General Board at its annual meeting for approval; *provided*, however, that no budget shall be in excess of the goal set by the General Assembly for this division of work.

§6. The General Board of Home Missions and Evangelism, a corporation of Kansas City, Missouri, shall be composed of five members elected by the General Assembly, who shall

hold office until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. Vacancies therein shall be filled by the Board of General Superintendents from nominations made by the remaining members of the corporation. [253 §6.]

CHURCH EXTENSION

284, §1. This department, in the division of church extension, shall perform the work of promoting the cause of providing and constructing suitable church buildings for local congregations of the Church of the Nazarene, and of suitable parsonages for the use of its pastors, subject to the approval of the General Board and the Board of General Superintendents. [279, 263 §2.]

§2. It shall be the duty of this department, in the division of church extension, to devise means by which funds may be secured, held and managed for its purpose; to make loans from its loan funds and grants from its gift funds under regulations approved by the General Board; to give careful study to proposed church locations and building sites and to make such recommendations therein as it may deem advisable; to furnish such assistance in devising building plans and to supply such architectural service as its facilities and means may provide; to assist local churches in raising funds for new buildings and for liquidating indebtedness on church property; and to assist local churches

to incorporate and establish valid titles to church property. [100, 164 §§1-3.]

§3. This department, in its division of church extension, shall prepare an annual detailed report of its activities for the past year including a financial report, together with a more or less detailed statement of its proposed activities and expenditures as its budget for the ensuing year, and submit the same to the General Board at its annual meeting for approval; *provided*, however, that no budget shall be in excess of the goal set by the General Assembly for this division of work.

§4. The General Board of Church Extension, a corporation of Kansas City, Missouri, shall be composed of five members elected by the General Assembly, who shall hold office until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. Vacancies therein shall be filled by the Board of General Superintendents from nominations made by the remaining members of the corporation. [253 §6.]

THE DEPARTMENT OF MINISTERIAL RELIEF

285, §1. The Department of Ministerial Relief shall perform the work of providing for the temporal support of disabled ministers, aged ministers and their needy dependents, and the widows and orphans of ministers of the Church of the Nazarene, subject to the approval of the General Board and the Board of General Superintendents. [279, 263 §2.]

§2. It shall be the duty of this department to devise means by which funds may be secured, held, and managed for its purposes, to make appropriations from its funds for the aid of needy and disabled ministers and the needy and disabled members of the ministers' families, under regulations approved by the General Board; to carry out such plans for funds, relief, support, and pensions, as may be authorized by the General Assembly or by the General Board; to control, manage and supervise such old people's homes as may be established or approved by the General Assembly or by the General Board. [136, 154 §11.]

§3. The Department of Ministerial Relief shall prepare an annual detailed report of its activities for the past year including a financial report, together with a more or less detailed statement of the proposed activities and expenditures as its budget for the ensuing year, and submit the same to the General Board at its annual meeting for approval; *provided*, however, that no budget shall be in excess of the goal set by the General Assembly for this department.

§4. The General Board of Ministerial Relief, a corporation of Kansas City, Missouri, shall be composed of five members elected by the General Assembly, who shall hold office until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. Vacancies therein shall be filled by the Board of General Superintendents from

nominations made by the remaining members of the corporation. [253 §6.]

THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLICATION

286, §1. The Department of Publication shall perform the work of spreading Christianity, by the publication, sale and distribution of moral and religious literature, subject to the approval of the General Board and the Board of General Superintendents. [279, 263 §2.]

§2. This department shall have the general supervision and management of all publications affecting the interests of the Church of the Nazarene, except as herein otherwise limited; it shall conduct a systematic distribution of Bibles, books, tracts, and gospel literature; and it shall provide such literature and other materials as may be deemed necessary for the interests of the denomination. [170.]

§3. No book or tract shall be published with the sanction of the Church of the Nazarene or the Nazarene Publishing House, or have the imprint of the Nazarene Publishing House, unless approved in writing by the Book Committee, and by it recommended as suitable to promote Christianity and the Church of the Nazarene. [253 §10, 412.]

§4. The Editor of the *Herald of Holiness* shall perform such duties as generally belong to the editorial office, and in such a manner as the interests of the Church of the Nazarene may require and in harmony with the editorial policy agreed upon between the Editor and the Department of Publication; *provided*, however,

that in matters of denominational polity and doctrine he shall be governed by the recommendation of the Board of General Superintendents. [253 §11, 421.]

He shall be amenable to the Board of General Superintendents and the General Board.

If, in the interim of sessions of the General Assembly, a vacancy should occur in the editorship of the *Herald of Holiness*, it shall be filled by the General Board, upon nomination by the Board of General Superintendents. [263 §4, 280 §20.]

§5. The Editor-in-Chief of church school periodicals shall perform such duties as generally belong to that office, in such a manner as the interests of the Church of the Nazarene may require, and in harmony with the editorial policy agreed upon between the Editor-in-Chief of church school periodicals and the Department of Publication; *provided*, however, that in matters of denominational polity and doctrine he shall be governed by the recommendations of the Board of General Superintendents. [253 §12, 421.]

He shall be amenable to the Board of General Superintendents and the General Board.

If, in the interim of sessions of the General Assembly, a vacancy should occur in the editorship of the church school periodicals, it shall be filled by the General Board, upon nomination by the Board of General Superintendents. [280 §20.]

§6. The manager of the Nazarene Publishing House, elected according to 280 §22, shall conduct the business of the Nazarene Publishing House in agreement with the Bylaws of the General Board and the policies adopted by the Department of Publication and the Board of General Superintendents.

§7. The Department of Publication shall prepare an annual detailed report of its activities for the past year including a financial report, together with a more or less detailed statement of its proposed activities and expenditures as its budget for the ensuing year, and submit the same to the General Board at its annual meeting for approval; *provided*, however, that no budget shall be in excess of the goal set by the General Assembly for this department. Upon the basis of such reports and statements the Department of Publication shall determine and reserve that portion of the net profits of the Nazarene Publishing House for the preceding year necessary to meet its financial obligations and finance its business of the current year. The entire balance of the net profits, if any, shall be applied to the benevolent work of the Church of the Nazarene as directed by the General Assembly.

§8. The Nazarene Publishing House, a corporation of Kansas City, Missouri, shall be composed of seven members elected by the General Assembly, who shall hold office until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. Vacancies therein shall be filled

by the Board of General Superintendents from nominations made by the remaining members of the corporation. [253 §7.]

THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

286a. The membership of the Department of Education shall be so composed that not more than one-third of its members shall be executives in the schools and colleges of the Church of the Nazarene.

287, §1. The Department of Education shall perform the work of promoting the cause of education, subject to the approval of the General Board and the Board of General Superintendents. [279, 263 §2.]

§2. It shall sustain an advisory relationship to all educational institutions now and hereafter related to or associated with the Church of the Nazarene in matters of courses of study, of buildings, location, general business and administrative policy.

§3. It may recommend to the General Board and to the Board of General Superintendents, and to the trustees of the schools affected thereby, that two or more schools be merged or otherwise disposed of, whenever in its judgment the highest educational interests of the denomination will be conserved by so doing.

§4. The schools and colleges now and hereby recognized as under the auspices of the Church of the Nazarene, and the zones for educational purposes sanctioned by the General Assembly are:

- (1) Eastern Nazarene College, Eastern Zone [352.]
- (2) Trevecca Nazarene College, Southeast Zone [353.]
- (3) Olivet Nazarene College, Central Zone [354.]
- (4) Bethany-Peniel College, West Central Zone [355.]
- (5) Pasadena College, Southwest Zone [356.]
- (6) Northwest Nazarene College, Northwest Zone [357.]
- (7) Canadian Nazarene College, Canadian Nazarene College Zone [359.]
- (8) Samaritan Hospital School of Nursing

§5. It shall be the duty of this department to awaken proper interest in education; to encourage the schools and colleges to attain higher standards and greater efficiency; to determine the number of schools and colleges that may receive financial support from this department; and to declare their classification and standards, and the supporting territory of each. [162.]

§6. Each educational institution shall prepare an annual detailed report of its activities during the past year, including a financial report duly audited by a public accountant, and a detailed statement of its proposed activities and expenditures together with a statement of probable income, as its budget for the ensuing year, and shall forward this report to the Department of Education.

§7. The Department of Education shall prepare an annual report of (1) its own activities for the past year, including a financial statement, and (2) a general report of the activities and finances of each educational institution, together with (3) a more or less detailed statement of the proposed activities and expenditures as its budget for the ensuing year of the department, and also (4) a more or less detailed statement of the proposed activities and expenditures as its budget for the ensuing year of each school or college, and (5) of the amount proposed to be allotted to each institution, and submit the same to the General Board at its annual meeting for approval; *provided*, however, that no budget shall be in excess of the goal set by the General Assembly.

§8. The Department of Education shall create and maintain an educational fund for the expense of the department and the promotion of its work, and also for the purpose of assisting the educational institutions under its supervision. It shall receive such funds as may be contributed to it for educational purposes through gifts and donations, or through the general budget funds of the church, and shall annually appropriate to each educational institution such an amount as the department may determine for the purpose of assisting such institutions to meet their current operating expenses. The department shall also have power to administer any and all other funds, gifts, donations, or bequests that may be committed

to it for educational purposes; and to solicit and create special funds for scholarships, endowment or other purposes of the department, and to administer these funds under such rules and regulations as it may adopt.

§9. The Department of Education shall make such recommendations to the management of each educational institution as in its judgment will serve to increase its efficiency.

§10. The Department of Education shall determine, and at least quadrennially advise the minimum requirements to be maintained for admission, for graduation, for promotion to baccalaureate or other degrees in the educational institutions recognized by the Church of the Nazarene. The requirements thus established shall provide in all cases for the historical, literary, practical, and devotional study of the Bible.

§11. No educational institution shall employ or retain permanently in its employment any faculty member who is not in full accord with the doctrine of, and in the experience of, entire sanctification, and who is not in full agreement and sympathy with the Bible doctrines and usages held by the Church of the Nazarene as set forth in the Church Constitution and the *Manual* of government of said church.

§12. No educational institution of the Church of the Nazarene shall hereafter be established or receive support from the funds of the department without its plans and organization

having first been submitted to the Department of Education for approval; and no institution shall continue to receive regular support unless its educational standards, plan of organization, and financial methods are approved by the Department of Education.

§13. The Department of Education shall have charge of all matters pertaining to general moral education. This department shall provide that a brief course in moral education be given annually in schools under the supervision of the Church of the Nazarene, and that as many local churches as possible be reached with moral instruction. [166.]

§14. The Department of Education, in conjunction with the Board of General Superintendents, shall arrange courses of study for local preachers, licensed ministers, and licensed deaconesses. [263 §9, 395, 396, 397.]

§15. The General Board of Education, a corporation of Kansas City, Missouri, shall be composed of five members elected by the General Assembly, who shall hold office until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. Vacancies therein shall be filled by the Board of General Superintendents from nominations made by the remaining members of the corporation. [253 §6.]

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH SCHOOLS

288, §1. The Department of Church Schools shall perform the work of promoting Christian religious education and the training of church

school workers in the local churches of the Church of the Nazarene. It shall have full supervision of the work of the church school in harmony with the doctrines of the Church of the Nazarene and the program of the General Assembly and the General Board of the Church of the Nazarene, subject to the approval of the General Board and the Board of General Superintendents. [111 §§1-8, 279, 263 §2.]

§2. The Department of Church Schools shall promote the organization and work of Sunday Bible schools, vacation Bible schools and week-day Bible schools, and provide courses of study and lesson helps therefor; shall promote interest in Bible study and mission study and provide materials for the same; shall arrange for such expressional activities as are in harmony with the spirit and teaching of the Church of the Nazarene; shall promote the work of leadership training, provide courses of study, texts and instructions for the same, and shall issue certificates of graduation; shall arrange for correspondence work, local classes, and standard institutions and schools; shall arrange for and conduct, and shall assist district church school boards in arranging and conducting, conventions and leadership training institutes and schools; shall provide standards of efficiency; shall arrange for the publishing of such papers, periodicals and pamphlets as may be needed for the successful prosecution of these objects, and employ the necessary office and field workers.

§3. The Department of Church Schools shall prepare an annual detailed report of its activities for the past year, including a financial report, together with a more or less detailed statement of its proposed activities and expenditures as its budget for the ensuing year, and submit the same to the General Board at its annual meeting for approval; *provided*, however, that no budget shall be in excess of the goal set by the General Assembly for this department.

§4. The Department of Church Schools shall recommend to the General Board an amount to be placed in the general budget for the purpose of carrying on the work of this department, the same to be within the limits of any goal that may be set by the General Assembly for this department. All actual disbursements shall not exceed the amount received for this department.

XIII. The General Orphanage Board

289. The General Orphanage Board, consisting of five members, shall be elected by the General Assembly, to serve until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. [253 §6, 263 §7, 406.]

290. The General Orphanage Board shall have charge of the orphanage interests of the Church of the Nazarene subject to the approval of the General Assembly and the Board of General Superintendents. [263 §2.]

XIV. The General Nazarene Young People's Society

291. The General Nazarene Young People's Society shall be composed of all district and local Nazarene young people's societies.

It shall be governed by the constitution of the General Nazarene Young People's Society approved by the General Assembly. [See Constitution 373 §5.]

292. The General Nazarene Young People's Society shall be represented on the General Board of the Church of the Nazarene by one member elected thereto by the General Assembly from nominations made by the General Council of the General Nazarene Young People's Society [275 §3.]

293. There shall be a General Quadrennial Convention which shall meet at a time fixed by the General Council in consultation with the Board of General Superintendents. The General Quadrennial Convention shall be composed of the members of the General Council, and of two delegates elected by each district Nazarene young people's society convention for each two hundred fifty or fewer active members, and one additional delegate for each successive two hundred fifty active members and the final major part of two hundred fifty active members. Assembly Districts not having district N.Y.P.S. organizations may elect delegates to the General Convention on the above basis at the last preceding District Assembly; *provided*, such delegates must be active members of the Nazarene Young People's Society; and *pro-*

vided, further, that delegates to the General Convention shall be, at the time of the General Convention, members of the Assembly District from which they were elected.

The General Convention shall elect a General Secretary who shall be, *ex officio*, a member of the General Assembly. [244.]

XV. The Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council

294. The Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council shall be composed of sixteen members elected according to the Constitution of the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council and approved by the Department of Foreign Missions. [281 §2a, 374 §4.]

The Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council shall be governed by the Constitution of the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council ~~and approved by the General Assembly.~~ This organization shall be auxiliary to the Department of Foreign Missions and subject to its direction. [374 §3.]

295. The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society shall be represented on the General Board by one member elected thereto by the General Assembly from nominations made by the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council [275 §5.]

296. There shall be a Quadrennial Convention held under the direction of the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council, at the same time as, or immediately preceding, the regular meeting of the General Assembly. This

Convention shall elect the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council of ~~twenty-three~~ members, which election shall be subject to the approval of the General Assembly. The Convention shall elect a General President who shall be a member *ex officio* of the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council and also a member *ex officio* of the General Assembly.

XVI. The General Stewardship Committee

297, §1. There shall be a General Stewardship Committee composed of the executive secretary of each of the departments of the General Board, the General Secretary of the General Nazarene Young People's Society, the Manager of the Nazarene Publishing House, the Editor of the *Herald of Holiness*, the Editor-in-Chief of church school periodicals, the General Church Secretary, the General Treasurer, a Stewardship Secretary elected by the General Board, and the three members at large residing within convenient distance of Kansas City, Missouri, elected by the General Board. [280 §§18, 19.]

The General Stewardship Committee shall promote the whole cause of Christian stewardship in the Church of the Nazarene, subject to the approval of the General Board and the Board of General Superintendents. [39, 89, 154a.]

§2. The duties of the General Stewardship Committee shall be:

- (1) To promote and raise the general budget.
- (2) To have charge of financial publicity.
- (3) To secure endowments, annuities and other funds.
- (4) To promote financial campaigns and provide inspirational speakers.
- (5) To arrange stewardship campaigns for the purpose of presenting to the entire membership of the Church of the Nazarene the claims of Christian Stewardship.
- (6) To prepare promotional and stewardship literature.
- (7) To collect and disseminate information designed to promote interest in the work of the Kingdom of God.
- (8) To co-operate with the several departments of the General Board in promoting their work.
- (9) To do any other work that the General Board may direct.
- (10) To keep accurate minutes of all its meetings and submit a comprehensive report of its work to the annual meeting of the General Board.

XVII. The Organization of General Boards

298. The general boards shall have their bylaws and policies published immediately after the General Assembly, and copies of these shall be kept on hand at Headquarters for those desiring them.

XVIII. The Annual Meetings of General Boards

299. The annual meetings of all the general boards of the Church of the Nazarene shall be held at the same time and the same place, in order that all their work, plans, and efforts may be fully correlated. [280 §§3, 11, 12, 13, 289.]

XIX. The Fiscal Year

300. The fiscal year for all general interests of the Church of the Nazarene shall close on April 30th of each year.

CHAPTER I

DISCIPLINE OF A CHURCH MEMBER

301. The object of church discipline is not the punishment of offenders, but the vindication of the truth, the purification of the church, the warning of the careless, and the reformation and salvation of the guilty.

302. Members of the Church of the Nazarene who do violence to the General and Special Rules [20, 34, 39], which are set forth in the *Manual*, should be dealt with kindly, yet faithfully, according to the grievousness of their offenses.

303, §1. In case a member of the Church of the Nazarene be accused of unchristian conduct, the pastor shall appoint an investigating committee [62 §17], of not less than three nor more than five members. Such committee shall carefully examine into the accusation, which shall be in writing, signed by the accuser or accusers, and shall confer with the accused person. In case it finds that there are grounds for the accusation, a reasonable time shall be given for repentance and reformation.

§2. If it seem necessary, the investigating committee shall prepare and sign charges, and the accused shall be brought before a trial committee of five (not including any member of the investigating committee), appointed by the church board, which trial committee shall have authority to try the case and ascertain the guilt or innocence of the accused. [103 §28.] The trial shall be conducted according to the Rules of Procedure authorized and published

by the General Court of Appeals. If the accused be found guilty, such findings shall have the effect of expelling the person accused from membership in the Church of the Nazarene.

§3. An appeal from the decision of the trial committee may be made to the district court of appeals within twenty days, and its decision shall be final. [32 (3).]

DISCIPLINE OF A MINISTER

304, §1. In case an elder or a licensed minister be accused of unchristian or imprudent conduct, or of promulgating doctrines out of harmony with the doctrinal statement of the Church of the Nazarene, or serious laxity in the enforcement of our General Rules [20] and covenant vows [369], the district advisory board [154 §5] shall appoint an investigating committee of two elders, which shall carefully examine into the accusation and confer with the accused person. The accusation shall be in writing, signed by the accuser or accusers. If the committee finds that there are probable grounds for charges, a reasonable time shall be given for repentance and reformation. The investigating committee shall report its findings to the district advisory board, either that there seem no sufficient grounds for charges, or that there are probable grounds for charges; the members of the committee or any two elders, may sign charges against the accused.

§2. Written charges with specifications may be presented against an elder or licensed minister by any church board with the consent of the

District Superintendent, unless the District Superintendent is the subject of such charges, in which event a majority of the other members of the district advisory board may give their consent.

§3. When charges are filed the accused minister shall be tried before a court of five elders of the Church of the Nazarene selected by the district advisory board [154 §6] of the District in which the accused has his membership; or by the district advisory board of the District in which the offense is alleged to have been committed when a minister is charged with moral irregularity.

§4. In case it shall be impossible for all the members of the court to agree on a verdict or judgment, they shall declare a mistrial and notify the district advisory board, which shall at once proceed as before to select a court to try the case.

§5. In case an elder or licensed minister so accused shall be found guilty by unanimous decision of the trial court, judgment shall be pronounced by the court in accordance with the offense. Such judgment may take the form of expulsion from the membership and ministry of the Church of the Nazarene, or that of suspension for a limited time from its membership and/or ministry, or other discipline in keeping with the offense.

§6. If the investigating committee report that there are probable grounds for charges, the procedure in disciplining the accused shall be

according to the Rules of Procedure adopted and published by the General Court of Appeals, as hereinafter provided.

RULES OF PROCEDURE

305. The General Court of Appeals shall adopt Rules of Procedure governing the trial of a layman or minister, together with Rules of Procedure governing the appeal of either a layman or minister. The appeal of a layman shall be to the district court of appeals [32 §3], and that of a minister shall be to the General Court of Appeals. [32 §3.] Such rules shall be printed and sold by the Nazarene Publishing House. These rules shall invariably control in the trial or appeal of any case herein provided for.

APPEAL FROM TRIAL

306. Upon conviction by a trial court as provided in this chapter, a minister so convicted shall have the right of appeal from the judgment of the trial court within thirty days, and he shall not be deprived of this right because of inability to obtain access to the record of the case. The General Court of Appeals shall have the right to make any order necessary to obtain the record of the proceedings. [32 §3.]

307. When an elder or licensed minister has been convicted by a trial court of imprudent or unchristian conduct, or of promulgating doctrines out of harmony with the doctrinal statement of the Church of the Nazarene, he shall thereupon be suspended from all ministerial

activities until such time as he shall be granted a new trial or reinstated by order of the General Court of Appeals.

DISTRICT COURT OF APPEALS

308. The district court of appeals shall be composed of the District Superintendent, *ex officio*, and four elders elected thereto by the District Assembly. [133 §21.] This court shall have jurisdiction to hear complaints and appeals of members of any local church within an Assembly District, concerning any action of a local church [51, 59] or church board. [103 §§1-29.] Due notice must be given within twenty days of the action complained of or appealed from, to the local church or to the church board concerning whose action the complaint or appeal is made. The court is authorized to approve, modify or reverse such action, and its decision, which must be in writing, shall be final. The district court of appeals shall also have jurisdiction to hear and determine all appeals by laymen from decisions of trial committees of local churches, and may affirm, modify or reverse such judgments and order a new trial. Such appeals shall be governed by the Rules of Procedure adopted and published by the General Court of Appeals.

GENERAL COURT OF APPEALS

309, §1. The General Court of Appeals shall be composed of five elders elected by the General Assembly [253 §9], and shall have jurisdiction as follows: (1) To hear all appeals that

are brought before it from the judgments of trial courts concerning ministers. (2) To hear all complaints and appeals concerning the action of District Assemblies [133 §§1-31] affecting the interests of ministers amenable to such Assemblies. (3) To hear complaints and appeals concerning the action of District Superintendents [139, §§1-15] in matters affecting the interests of ministers.

§2. In all such cases due notice of such complaint or appeal must have been given within thirty days by the person appealing, to the District Assembly or District Superintendent whose action is complained of or appealed from.

§3. This court is authorized to affirm, modify or reverse such judgment or action, and its decision, which must be in writing, shall be final.

§4. This court, when called upon by the General Assembly or by the Board of General Superintendents, to give its construction of the meaning and force of any provision of this Manual, shall promptly comply with such request, giving its opinion in writing, and the construction thus placed by it upon the provision in question shall be authoritative.

§5. The publication [263 §10] of the opinions and decisions of the General Court of Appeals shall be left to the discretion of the said court, after consultation with the Board of General Superintendents.

§6. The General Court of Appeals shall prepare detailed Rules of Procedure governing the

trial of a layman or minister, and the proceedings in the courts of appeal. It shall prepare blank forms for charges and specifications, and these forms, together with printed Rules of Procedure, herein provided for, shall be kept on sale by the Nazarene Publishing House.

§7. Within thirty days after the rendition of any final order or decree, the General Court of Appeals shall file a true copy thereof with the General Church Secretary, and he shall keep all such decisions in permanent form. [267 §7.]

GUARANTY OF RIGHTS

309a. Guaranty of rights.

I.

The right to a fair and impartial trial of a layman or minister accused of misconduct according to 303 or 304 of this *Manual*, shall not be denied.

II.

A layman or minister who has been convicted by a trial court shall not be denied the right of appeal, and this the accused shall always have as a matter of right.

III.

No charges shall be considered against a layman or minister unless such charges are signed by two reputable persons who are at the time members in good standing in the Church of the Nazarene.

IV.

The testimony of any witness against an accused person shall not be received or considered

in evidence at any trial unless such testimony be given under oath or affirmation.

V.

A person who is accused shall always have the right to be represented by counsel of his or her own choosing, provided such counsel shall be a member in good standing in the Church of the Nazarene; and provided further, that in case of the trial of a minister such counsel shall be an ordained minister of the Church of the Nazarene.

VI.

Every accused person shall have the right to meet his or her accusers face to face, and to cross-examine the witnesses against the accused. All witnesses shall testify in person or by deposition.

VII.

When a person is brought to trial on written charges as provided in this chapter, such person shall always have the right to defend himself or herself and to introduce witnesses in defense, subject to the Rules of Procedure adopted and published by the General Court of Appeals.

CHAPTER I

ASSEMBLY DISTRICTS

310. ABILENE DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Texas north of the thirty-second parallel and west of the ninety-seventh meridian, with the addition of that portion of Denton county east of said ninety-seventh meridian.

311. ALABAMA DISTRICT shall include the state of Alabama and that portion of the state of Florida west of the Apalachicola and the Chattahoochee rivers.

312. ALBANY DISTRICT shall include all that part of the state of New York north of and including Delaware, Green, and Columbia counties.

313. ALBERTA DISTRICT shall include the province of Alberta, Canada, and that portion of the province of British Columbia, Canada, east of the Rocky mountains.

314. ARIZONA DISTRICT shall include the state of Arizona.

315. ARKANSAS DISTRICT shall include the state of Arkansas.

315a. BRITISH COLUMBIA DISTRICT shall include that portion of the province of British Columbia west of the Rocky Mountains.

316. BRITISH ISLES DISTRICT shall include England, Scotland, Ireland, and Wales.

317. CHICAGO CENTRAL DISTRICT shall include the state of Illinois.

318. COLORADO DISTRICT shall include the state of Colorado.

319. DALLAS DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Texas east of the ninety-seventh meridian, with the exception of that portion of Denton county east of said meridian.

320. EASTERN OKLAHOMA DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Oklahoma east of the following line: the Santa Fe railway from the Red river in a northerly direction to Oklahoma City, not including Oklahoma City and other towns and cities thereon; the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railway from Oklahoma City in a northerly direction to the Arkansas river, including the towns and cities thereon except Oklahoma City; thence the Arkansas river to the Kansas state line.

321. FLORIDA DISTRICT shall include the state of Florida except that portion of the state west of the Apalachicola and the Chattahoochee rivers.

322. GEORGIA DISTRICT shall include the state of Georgia, and the state of South Carolina except that portion lying east of the Peedee river, namely, the counties of Marlboro, Dillon, Marion and Horry.

323. IDAHO-OREGON-UTAH DISTRICT shall include the state of Utah, and that portion of the state of Idaho south of the Salmon river; and that portion of the state of Oregon embracing

the following counties, namely, Wallowa, Union, Baker, Grant, Harney, Malheur.

324. INDIANAPOLIS DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Indiana south of the fortieth parallel of latitude.

325. IOWA DISTRICT shall include the state of Iowa.

326. KANSAS DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Kansas lying west of the east boundaries of the following counties, namely, Marshall, Pottawatomie, Wabaunsee, Lyon, Greenwood, Elk, and Chautauqua.

327. KANSAS CITY DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Kansas lying east of the west boundaries of the following counties, namely, Nemaha, Jackson, Shawnee, Osage, Coffey, Woodson, Wilson and Montgomery; and that portion of the state of Missouri lying west of the easterly boundaries of the counties of Mercer, Grundy, Livingston, Carrol, Saline, Pettis, Morgan, Camden, Laclede, Wright, Douglass, and Ozark.

328. KENTUCKY DISTRICT shall include the state of Kentucky.

329. LOUISIANA DISTRICT shall include the state of Louisiana.

330. MANITOBA - SASKATCHEWAN DISTRICT shall include the provinces of Manitoba and Saskatchewan, Canada.

330a. MARITIME DISTRICT shall include the Maritime Provinces of Canada^a, namely, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island; and also Newfoundland.

331. MICHIGAN DISTRICT shall include all that portion of the state of Michigan known as the Lower (Southern) Peninsula.

331a. MINNESOTA DISTRICT shall include the state of Minnesota.

332. MISSISSIPPI DISTRICT shall include the state of Mississippi.

333. MISSOURI DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Missouri lying east of the westerly boundaries of the counties of Putnam, Sullivan, Linn, Charitan, Howard, Cooper, Moniteau, Miller, Pulaski, Texas, and Howell.

334. NEBRASKA DISTRICT shall include the state of Nebraska.

335. NEW ENGLAND DISTRICT shall include the states of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island; that portion of the state of Connecticut east of a line running north from Bridgeport, Connecticut, excluding Bridgeport, to the Massachusetts line.

336. NEW MEXICO DISTRICT shall include the state of New Mexico; and that portion of the state of Texas west of the one hundred third meridian.

337. NEW YORK DISTRICT shall include that part of the state of New York which lies south of the southern boundary of Delaware, Greene, and Columbia counties; that portion of the state of New Jersey north of Boundbrook, N. J.; and that portion of the state of Connecticut west of a line running north from Bridgeport, Conn., including Bridgeport, to the Massachusetts line.

338. NORTH DAKOTA DISTRICT shall include the state of North Dakota.

339. NORTH PACIFIC DISTRICT shall include that portion of the states of Washington and Oregon west of the Cascade mountains; and the counties of Klamath and Lake in Oregon, east of the Cascade mountains.

340. NORTHERN CALIFORNIA DISTRICT shall include the state of Nevada; that portion of the state of California north of the Northern boundaries of San Luis Obispo, Kern, and San Bernardino counties, with the addition of that portion of Kern county north of the Tehachipi mountains.

341. NORTHERN INDIANA DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Indiana north of the fortieth parallel of latitude.

342. NORTHWEST DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Washington east of the Cascade mountains; that portion of the state of Idaho north of the Salmon river; and the following counties in the state of Oregon, namely, Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Morrow, Umatilla, Jefferson, Wheeler, Des Chutes, and Crook.

343. OHIO DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Ohio lying west of a line running south from Cleveland to Belpre, Ohio, excepting Cleveland.

343a. ONTARIO DISTRICT shall include the Province of Ontario, Canada.

344. PITTSBURGH DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Ohio east of a line running south from Cleveland to Belpre, Ohio, including Cleveland; that portion of the state of Pennsylvania west of the Allegheny mountains.

345. ROCKY MOUNTAIN DISTRICT shall include the states of Montana and Wyoming.

346. SAN ANTONIO DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Texas lying between the ninety-seventh meridian and the one hundred third meridian, south of the thirty-second parallel.

346a. SOUTH DAKOTA DISTRICT shall include the state of South Dakota.

347. SOUTHEAST ATLANTIC DISTRICT shall include the state of North Carolina; and the state of Virginia, except that portion of the state lying east of the Chesapeake Bay, namely, the counties of Accomac and Northampton, and further excepting that portion of the state bordering upon the District of Columbia, namely, the counties of Fairfax and Arlington; and that portion of the state of South Carolina lying east of the Peedee river, namely, the counties of Marlboro, Dillon, Marion, and Horry.

348. SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of California south of the northern boundaries of San Luis Obispo, Kern, and San Bernardino counties with the exception of that portion of Kern county north of the Tehachipi mountains.

349. TENNESSEE DISTRICT shall include the state of Tennessee.

350. WASHINGTON - PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Pennsylvania east of the Allegheny mountains; the states of Delaware and Maryland; that portion of the state of Virginia lying east of the Chesapeake Bay, namely, the counties of Accomac and Northampton, and also the counties of Fairfax and Arlington; the District of Columbia; that portion of New Jersey south of Boundbrook; that portion of West Virginia, namely, the counties of Jefferson, Berkeley, Morgan, Hampshire, Mineral, Grant, Hardy, and Pendleton.

351. WESTERN OKLAHOMA DISTRICT shall include that portion of the state of Oklahoma west of the following line: the Santa Fe railway from the Red river in a northerly direction to Oklahoma City, including Oklahoma City and other towns and cities thereon; the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railway from Oklahoma City in a northerly direction to the Arkansas river, not including the towns and cities thereon; thence the Arkansas river to the Kansas state line.

351a. WEST VIRGINIA DISTRICT shall include the state of West Virginia.

352. WISCONSIN DISTRICT shall include the state of Wisconsin and all that portion of the state of Michigan known as the Upper (Northern) Peninsula.

CHAPTER II

EDUCATIONAL ZONES

I. For College Purposes

353. *Eastern Zone* shall include the Assembly Districts of Ontario, British Isles, New England, New York, Washington-Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Maritime, and Albany; also the province of Quebec, Canada.

354. *Southeast Zone* shall include the Assembly Districts of Southeast Atlantic, Georgia, Florida, Kentucky, West Virginia, Tennessee, Alabama, and Mississippi.

355. *Central Zone* shall include the Assembly Districts of Chicago Central, Northern Indiana, Indianapolis, Ohio, Michigan, Wisconsin, Missouri, and Iowa.

356. *West Central Zone* shall include the Assembly Districts of Arkansas, Dallas, Abilene, San Antonio, Eastern Oklahoma, Western Oklahoma, Louisiana, Kansas, Kansas City, and Nebraska.

357. *Southwest Zone* shall include the Assembly Districts of Arizona, Southern California, Northern California, Colorado, and New Mexico.

358. *Northwest Zone* shall include the Assembly Districts of Northwest, Idaho-Oregon-Utah, Rocky Mountain, North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, and North Pacific.

359. *Canadian Nazarene College Zone* shall include the four provinces of Western Canada,

namely, British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba.

CHAPTER III

GEOGRAPHICAL ZONES

360. EASTERN ZONE shall include the Assembly Districts of New England, Maritime, New York, Washington-Philadelphia, and Pittsburgh; also the Province of Quebec, Canada.

361. SOUTHEAST ZONE shall include the Assembly Districts of Southeast Atlantic, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Tennessee, Kentucky, and West Virginia.

362. CENTRAL ZONE shall include the Assembly Districts of Chicago Central, Northern Indiana, Indianapolis, Ohio, Michigan, Wisconsin, Missouri, and Iowa.

363. SOUTHERN ZONE shall include the Assembly Districts of Arkansas, Dallas, Abilene, San Antonio, Eastern Oklahoma, Western Oklahoma, Kansas City, Kansas, and Nebraska.

364. SOUTHWEST ZONE shall include the Assembly Districts of Arizona, Northern California, Southern California, Colorado, and New Mexico.

365. NORTHWEST ZONE shall include the Assembly Districts of North Pacific, Northwest, Idaho-Oregon-Utah, Rocky Mountain, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Minnesota.

366. BRITISH ISLES-CANADIAN ZONE shall include the Assembly Districts of British Isles, Alberta, Manitoba-Saskatchewan, Ontario, and British Columbia.

CHAPTER I

THE SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

367. I. The Baptism of Believers

Dearly Beloved: Believing that God has given you forgiveness of sins, and spiritual life through Christ Jesus our Lord and Savior, and that you are thus graciously prepared to receive Christian baptism, as declarative of your saving faith and covenant of obedience, you will now give avowals of your belief and purpose.

Do you believe in God, the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, His only begotten Son, our Lord? that He was conceived by the Holy Ghost, born of the Virgin Mary? that He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, dead, and buried? that the third day He rose from the dead? that He ascended into heaven, and sitteth at the right hand of God the Father Almighty, and from thence shall come again to judge the quick and the dead? and

Do you believe in the Holy Ghost? the Church of God? the communion of saints? the remission of sins? the resurrection of the body? and the life everlasting?

Answer: All this I steadfastly believe.

Will you be baptized in this faith?

Answer: I will.

Do you renounce the devil and all his works? the vain pomp and glory of the world, with all covetous desires of the flesh and of the mind?

Answer: I renounce them all.

Will you then obediently keep God's holy will and commandments, and walk in the same all the days of your life?

Answer: I will.

[The minister, asking the name, shall say]:

A. B., I baptize thee in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. *Amen.*

368. II. The Baptism of Infants

Dearly Beloved: Baptism is the external seal of the new covenant of grace.

In presenting this child for Christian baptism, you must remember that it is your part and duty to see that he be taught, as soon as he shall be able to learn, the nature and the end of this holy sacrament. You shall call upon him to give reverent attendance upon appointed means of grace; see that he is taught the truth of God as contained in the Holy Scriptures, and help him, as you may be able, in the way of life.

[The minister may then ask the friends of the child to name the child, and baptize it, saying]:

I baptize thee in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. *Amen.*

[The minister may offer prayer, the congregation uniting in the Lord's Prayer.]

368a. III. The Dedication or Consecration of Children

[The following form is provided for use in those cases where the parents or guardians do not care to have children baptized but simply dedicated or consecrated.]

[When the sponsors have presented themselves with the child (or children) before the minister at his call, the minister shall say]:

“Then were brought unto him little children, that he should put his hands on them, and pray: and the disciples rebuked them. But Jesus said, Suffer little children, and forbid them not, to come unto me: for of such is the kingdom of heaven. Verily I say unto you, Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child, he shall not enter therein. And he took them up in his arms, put his hands upon them, and blessed them.”

In presenting this child for dedication (or consecration), you not only signify your faith in the Christian religion, but also your desire that he (or she) may early know and follow the will of God, may live and die a Christian, and come unto everlasting blessedness.

In order to attain this holy end it will be your duty, as parents (or guardians) to teach him (or her) early the fear of the Lord; to watch over his (or her) education, that he (or she) be not led astray; to direct his (or her) youthful mind to the Holy Scriptures, and his (or her) feet to the sanctuary; to restrain him (or her) from evil associates and habits; and, as much as in you lies, to bring him (or her) up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

Will you endeavor to do so by the help of God? If so, answer, "I will."

[The minister shall then dedicate the child, repeating the full name of the child, and saying]:

Our Loving Heavenly Father, we do here and now dedicate (or consecrate) [naming the child] unto Thee, praying that he (or she) may be endued with heavenly virtues, taught by Thy Holy Spirit, nourished by Thy Word, kept by divine grace, and everlastingly rewarded through Thine eternal mercies. In the name of the Father, and the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.

[Then may the minister offer the following prayer, or may use extemporary prayer.]

Wilt thou be pleased, O God, to grant unto this child an understanding mind; may thy providence lead him (her) through the dangers, temptations and ignorance of youth; may he (she) never run into folly nor the evils of unbridled appetites; may he (she) be led to serve thee faithfully, so that, when he (she) has glorified thee in his (her) generation and served thy cause on earth, he (she) may be received into thine eternal kingdom. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Benediction 2 Corinthians 13:14.

CHAPTER II

369. THE RECEPTION OF CHURCH MEMBERS

Dearly Beloved: The privileges and blessings which we have in association together in the

Church of Jesus Christ are very sacred and precious. There is in it such hallowed fellowship as can not otherwise be known.

There is such helpfulness with brotherly watchcare and counsel as can be found only in the Church.

There is the godly care of pastors, with the teachings of the Word, and the helpful inspiration of social worship. And there is co-operation in service, accomplishing that which can not otherwise be done. It is necessary that we be of one mind and heart. The doctrines upon which the Church rests as essential to Christian experience are brief. We believe in God the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost; we especially emphasize the deity of Jesus Christ and the personality of the Holy Spirit; that man is born in sin; that he needs the work of the Holy Spirit in regeneration; that, after the work of regeneration, there is the further work of heart-cleansing, or entire sanctification, which is effected by the Holy Ghost. And to each of these works of grace the Holy Spirit gives witness. We believe in eternal destiny, with its rewards and punishments.

Do you heartily believe these truths?

Do you take Jesus Christ as your Savior, and do you realize that He saves you now?

Desiring to unite with the Church of the Nazarene, do you covenant to give yourself to the fellowship and work of God in connection with it, as set forth in the General Rules and

Special Rules of the Church of the Nazarene? to endeavor in every way to glorify God, by a humble walk, godly conversation, and holy service; devotedly giving of your means; faithful attendance upon the means of grace; and, abstaining from all evil, seek earnestly to perfect holiness of heart and life in the fear of the Lord?

[These questions being satisfactorily answered, the persons may be received. The minister, taking them by the hand, shall say]:

I welcome you into this church, to its sacred fellowship, duties, and privileges. May the great Head of the Church bless and keep you, and enable you to be faithful in all good works.

CHAPTER III

370. THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER

[The administration of the Lord's Supper may be introduced by an appropriate sermon or a suitable address, and the reading of 1 Corinthians 11:23-29, Luke 22:14-20, or some other appropriate passage. Let the minister give the following invitation]:

The Lord himself ordained this Holy Sacrament. He commanded His disciples to partake of the bread and wine, emblems of His broken body and shed blood. This is His table. The feast is for His disciples. Let all those who have with true repentance forsaken their sins, and have believed in Christ unto salvation, draw near and take these emblems, and, by faith, partake of the life of Jesus Christ, to your soul's comfort and joy. Let us remember

that it is the memorial of the death and passion of our Lord; also a token of His coming again. Let us not forget that we are one, at one table with the Lord.

[The minister, with the congregation, kneeling, may offer prayer of confession and supplication, with the following prayer of consecration]:

Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, who of Thy tender mercy didst give Thine only Son, Jesus Christ, to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption; hear us, O merciful Father, we most humbly beseech Thee, and grant that we, receiving these Thy creatures of bread and wine, according to Thy Son, our Savior Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of His death and passion, may be made partakers of the benefits of His sacrificial death; who in the same night that He was betrayed, took bread and when He had given thanks, He broke it and gave it to His disciples, saying, Take, eat, this is my body, which is broken for you; do this in remembrance of me.

Likewise, after supper, He took the cup, and when He had given thanks, He gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of this, for this is my blood of the New Testament, which is shed for you and for many, for the remission of sins; do this, as oft as ye shall drink it, in remembrance of me. *Amen.*

[Then may the minister, himself partaking, with the assistance of any other ministers present, and when necessary, of the stewards, administer the Communion to the people.]

[If there be those who can not kneel, let them receive it sitting or standing. While the bread is being distributed, let the minister say]:

The body of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was broken for thee, preserve thee blameless, unto everlasting life. Take and eat this, in remembrance that Christ died for thee.

[As the cup is being passed, let the minister say]:

The blood of our Lord Jesus Christ, which was shed for thee, preserve thee blameless unto everlasting life. Drink this, in remembrance that Christ's blood was shed for thee, and be thankful.

[The Lord's Prayer with extempore prayer of thanksgiving.]

CHAPTER IV

371. MATRIMONY

[At the day and time appointed for the solemnization of matrimony, the persons to be married—having been qualified according to law—standing together, the man on the right hand and the woman on the left, the minister shall say]:

Dearly Beloved: We are gathered together here in the sight of God, and in the presence of these witnesses, to join together this man and this woman in holy matrimony, which is an honorable estate, instituted of God in the time of man's innocency, signifying unto us the mystical union that exists between Christ and His Church; which holy estate Christ adorned and beautified with His presence and first miracle that He wrought, in Cana of Galilee, and is commended of St. Paul to be honorable among all men; and therefore is not by any to be en-

tered into unadvisedly; but reverently, discreetly, and in the fear of God.

Into which holy estate these persons present come now to be joined. Therefore, if any can show just cause why they may not lawfully be joined together, let him now speak, or else for ever hold his peace.

[And also speaking unto the persons that are to be married, the minister shall say]:

I require and charge you both, that if either of you know any impediment why you may not be lawfully joined together in matrimony, you do now confess it; for be ye well assured that so many as are coupled together otherwise than God's Word doth allow, are not joined together by God, neither is their matrimony lawful.

[If no impediment be alleged, then shall the minister say unto the man]:

Wilt thou have this woman to be thy wedded wife, to live together after God's ordinance in the holy estate of matrimony? Wilt thou love her, comfort her, honor and keep her, in sickness and in health; and, forsaking all others, keep thee only unto her, so long as ye both shall live?

[The man shall answer]:

I will.

[Then shall the minister say unto the woman]:

Wilt thou have this man to be thy wedded husband, to live together after God's ordinance in the holy estate of matrimony? Wilt thou love, honor, and keep him in sickness and in health;

and forsaking all others, keep thee only unto him, so long as ye both shall live?

[The woman shall answer]:

I will.

[Then shall the minister pray thus]:

O Eternal God, Creator and Preserver of all mankind, Giver of all spiritual grace, the Author of everlasting life, send Thy blessing upon these Thy servants, this man and this woman, whom we bless in Thy name; that, as Isaac and Rebecca lived faithfully together, so these persons may surely perform and keep the vow and covenant between them made, and may ever remain in perfect love and peace together, and live according to Thy laws: through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

[Then shall the minister join their right hands together, and say]:

Forasmuch as this man and this woman have consented together in holy wedlock, and have witnessed the same before God and this company, and have declared the same by joining of hands, I pronounce that they are husband and wife together, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Those whom God hath joined together let no man put asunder. *Amen.*

[And the minister shall add his blessing]:

God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, bless, preserve, and keep you; the Lord mercifully with His favor look upon you, and so fill you with all spiritual benediction and grace,

that ye may so live together in this life that in the world to come ye may have life everlasting. *Amen.*

[Then may the minister offer the following prayer, or may use extemporary prayer]:

O God of Abraham, God of Isaac, God of Jacob, bless this man and this woman, and sow the seed of eternal life in their hearts, that whatsoever in the Holy Word they shall profitably learn, they may indeed fulfill the same. Look, O Lord, mercifully on them from heaven, and bless them; as Thou didst send Thy blessing upon Abraham and Sarah, to their great comfort, so vouchsafe to send Thy blessing upon this man and this woman, that they, obeying Thy will, and always being in safety under Thy protection, may abide in Thy love unto their lives' end, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Almighty God, who at the beginning didst create our first parents, Adam and Eve, and didst sanctify and join them together in marriage, pour upon these persons the riches of Thy grace, sanctify and bless them, that they may please Thee, both in body and soul, and live together in holy love unto their lives' end. *Amen.*

CHAPTER V

372. THE BURIAL SERVICE

[At the home, or at the church, let suitable services be held, consisting of appropriate hymns, prayers, and reading of the Scriptures, together with a brief sermon or address suited to the occasion.]

[After the coffin is lowered in the grave, let the minister say]:

We come hither to lay all that was mortal of our dear friend in this new-made sepulcher. He is not here. His absence occasions our coming hither today. This is but the house in which he lived. While he abode in it, it was alive. But he has gone, and the house is silent and lifeless. As it was taken from the earth, so it will go back and mingle with its kindred elements. We can do no other than to bring it hither, and laying it back upon the bosom of mother earth, say: Earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust. Despite the shadow and sorrow caused by his absence, we recognize the immortality of the soul; that through Christ we have hope of eternal life in heaven. Also that these mortal bodies shall come forth to the final awards of eternity.

Our Father which art in heaven, Hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done in earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil: for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever. *Amen.*

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Ghost, be with you all. *Amen.*

CHAPTER I

373. CONSTITUTIONS FOR NAZARENE YOUNG PEOPLE'S SOCIETIES

§1. Local Nazarene Young People's Society

ARTICLE I. *Name*

The society shall be called the Nazarene Young People's Society of the Church of the Nazarene.

ARTICLE II. *Object*

The object of the society shall be to build up its membership in Christian experience and in holy character, and to instruct them in the doctrines of the church, and to bring about the salvation of other young people. The activities of this society shall be distinctively religious and spiritual.

ARTICLE III. *Membership*

Section 1. Members of this society shall be divided into three classes: active, associate, and honorary.

Sec. 2. Active members shall be young people who are members of the Church of the Nazarene and who sign the pledge for active members.

PLEDGE FOR ACTIVE MEMBERS

Realizing my duty to God and His church, I promise by His grace to seek the New Testament standard of heart purity; to strive always to live consistently for my Master; to make it the rule of my life to read the Bible and pray daily; to attend faithfully all services of the N. Y. P. S.; and to take an active part in the service as opportunity is afforded me.

Sec. 3. Associate members shall be young people not members of the Church of the Nazarene who give testimony to the saving grace of Jesus Christ, and who are of good moral character, and who sign the pledge for associate members.

PLEDGE FOR ASSOCIATE MEMBERS

Desiring to become affiliated with the N. Y. P. S. as an associate member, I accept the moral standards of the Church of the Nazarene as my rule for conduct, and, I promise to attend faithfully the services of the society, to do my best to advance its interests and to take part in its activities as opportunity is afforded me.

Sec. 4. Honorary members shall be older members of the Church of the Nazarene who desire to be affiliated with the society and who shall be elected as honorary members by the society.

Sec. 5. Only active members shall vote in the business meetings of the society, and only active members shall hold office and serve as chairmen of standing committees. Associate members shall have the privilege of holding membership on the committees but only to a minority extent.

ARTICLE IV. *Auxiliary Organizations*

Junior and Hi-N. Y. (junior high school and senior high school age) societies may be organized as auxiliary organizations to this society. (These auxiliary societies are to be organized under the constitutions recommended in the *Manual*.)

ARTICLE V. *Officers*

The officers of this society shall be a president, a vice president, a recording secretary, a corresponding secretary, and a treasurer.

ARTICLE VI. *Executive Council*

The executive council of this society shall consist of the officers, the pastor, the chairmen of standing committees, the supervisors of auxiliary societies, and presidents of auxiliary societies.

ARTICLE VII. *Committees*

This society may have such standing committees as are necessary for properly conducting its work.

ARTICLE VIII. Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of all the members present and voting at the General Convention of the Nazarene Young People's Society and by the approval of the General Assembly.

§2. Hi-N.Y. Society**ARTICLE I. Name**

This society shall be called the Hi-N. Y. (high school Nazarene youth's) society of the Church of the Nazarene.

ARTICLE II. Object

The object of the Hi-N. Y. society shall be to deepen the spiritual life of its members, to build them up in Christian character, to engage them in Bible instruction, to enlist them in all forms of Christian service for the development of leadership, and to bring about the salvation of other young people.

ARTICLE III. Membership

Section 1. Membership in this society shall be divided into two classes: active and associate.

Sec. 2. Active members may be young people of junior and senior high school age who are members of the Church of the Nazarene and who sign the pledge for active members. [See note*,]

Sec. 3. Associate members shall be young people of high school age of good moral character who give testimony of the saving grace of Jesus Christ, and who sign the pledge for associate members. [See note*.]

Sec. 4. All members shall have the privilege of voting, but only active members shall hold office and serve as chairmen of standing committees.

Those active members 14 years old and over shall participate in all the business meetings of the N.Y.P.S.

*[NOTE.—Printed constitutions and bylaws for local societies and constitutions for Hi-N.Y. and Junior societies may be obtained from General Nazarene Young People's Society, 2923 Troost Avenue, Kansas, City, Missouri.]

and in all other matters pertaining to the general administration of the local Nazarene young people's society.

Sec. 5. Associate members shall have the privilege of holding membership on the committees of the society, but only to a minority extent.

ARTICLE IV. *Officers*

Section 1. The officers of this society shall consist of a supervisor, a president, a vice president, a secretary and a treasurer.

Sec. 2. The officers and the chairmen of the standing committees shall constitute the Hi-N. Y. executive council.

Sec. 3. The Hi-N. Y. supervisor shall be nominated by the Hi-N. Y. council in conference with the pastor, and shall be elected by the executive council of the Nazarene young people's society, of which he shall be a member.

Sec. 4. The officers shall be elected semi-annually by the members of the society. The president shall be nominated by a nominating committee of which the pastor shall be a member, and shall be elected by majority vote of the members present and voting by ballot.

Sec. 5. Any officer, with the exception of the supervisor, may be removed by a majority vote of the Hi-N. Y. executive council.

ARTICLE V. *Duties of Officers*

Section 1. The Hi-N. Y. supervisor shall have general oversight of the society in its several activities. He shall be *ex officio* member of all committees, and shall render a report of the activities of the society to the regular business meetings of the executive council of the Nazarene young people's society.

Sec. 2. The President shall preside over all business meetings of the society. He shall prepare a report of the activities of the society for the regular business meeting of the executive council of the Nazarene young people's society, of which council he shall be a member.

Sec. 3. The vice president shall co-operate with the president in every way to carry out the work of the society, and in the absence of the president shall perform his duties in office.

Sec. 4. The secretary shall keep a record of all proceedings in the business meetings of the society and the meetings of the Hi-N. Y. executive council. He shall keep a complete and accurate record of the membership of the society, and attend to the correspondence of the society.

Sec. 5. The treasurer shall have charge of and disburse all moneys of the society, keeping a correct account of the same. He shall render a report to the monthly meeting of the Hi-N. Y. executive council.

ARTICLE VI. *Committees*

Section 1. The society may have the following committees: devotional, missionary, membership, evangelistic, educational, and such other committees as may be desired.

Sec. 2. The devotional committee, together with the supervisor, shall have general oversight of the weekly devotional meetings of the society, and may help the leaders plan the meetings, using generally the topics in *The Young People's Journal*.

Sec. 3. The missionary committee shall have charge of the missionary work of the society, arranging for a missionary service at least once each quarter.

Sec. 4. The membership committee shall be on the lookout for new members, reporting to the society those persons acceptable for membership; shall encourage attendance upon all meetings; and shall look after and visit the sick and absent members of the society.

Sec. 5. The evangelistic committee shall have charge of and arrange for all special evangelistic meetings of the society.

Sec. 6. The educational committee shall enlist all members of the society in the daily Bible reading course and supervise all the educational work of the society.

ARTICLE VII. *Meetings*

Section 1. The regular devotional and business meetings of the society shall be held on dates fixed by the society.

Sec. 2. The Hi-N. Y. executive council shall have a monthly business meeting at which time reports are to be given by each officer and the chairman of each committee.

Sec. 3. The first semi-annual meeting for the election of officers shall be held within thirty days preceding the District Assembly. Due notice of these meetings must be given at the regular devotional meetings of the society.

Sec. 4. Special meetings of the society may be called by the supervisor or the president at such times as may be necessary.

Sec. 5. At all business meetings of this society members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII. *Amendments*

This constitution shall not be altered except by a two-thirds vote of all members present and voting at a meeting called for that purpose. Such alterations must have the approval of the supervisor and the executive council of the Nazarene young people's society.

§3. *The Junior Society*

ARTICLE I. *Name*

This society shall be called The Junior Society of the Church of the Nazarene.

ARTICLE II. *Object*

The object of this society shall be the development of its members along spiritual lines through the encouragement of Bible reading, public prayers and testimony, instruction in the simpler forms of Bible study and in missionary education to help them get a vision of the world's needs and of their part in carrying out our Lord's command: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

ARTICLE III. *Membership*

The membership of this society shall be composed of boys and girls under high school age who desire to join the society.

ARTICLE IV. *Officers*

Section 1. The officers of this society shall consist of a supervisor, a president, a vice president, a secretary, and a treasurer.

Sec. 2. The officers and the chairmen of the standing committees shall constitute the junior executive council with the supervisor as *ex officio* chairman.

Sec. 3. The junior supervisor shall be elected by the church board. He or she shall be an *ex officio* member of the executive council of the local Nazarene young people's society.

Sec. 4. The officers shall be elected quarterly by the members of the society under the direction of the supervisor.

ARTICLE V. *Duties of the Officers*

Section 1. The junior supervisor shall have general oversight of all the activities of the society, arranging for and helping to execute all programs of the society, generally basing the program upon the topics provided for *The Junior Society*. He or she shall be *ex officio* member of all committees and shall render a report of the activities of the society to the regular business meetings of the executive council of the local Nazarene young people's society.

Sec. 2. The president shall, in co-operation with the supervisor, have oversight of the business of the society.

Sec. 3. The vice president shall be ready to assist the president in any work of the society, and in his absence may perform his duties in office.

Sec. 4. The secretary shall keep a complete list of all members and their addresses, and a correct record of all regular and special meetings of the society. He shall conduct all correspondence of the society, and see that each meeting is properly announced.

Sec. 5. The treasurer shall collect all moneys of the society, keep an account of the same, and make an itemized monthly report to the society.

ARTICLE VI. *Committees*

Committees may be ordered at the discretion of the supervisor.

ARTICLE VII. *Meetings*

Section 1. Devotional meetings of the society shall be held on each day.

Sec. 2. The first devotional meeting of the month shall be a missionary meeting of which the local woman's missionary society, in co-operation with the supervisor, shall have charge. Special projects suggested by the Woman's General Missionary Council may be presented, and all finances raised for these projects must be paid by the treasurer to the treasurer of the local woman's missionary society.

Sec. 3. Business meetings of the society shall be held on dates fixed by the society.

ARTICLE VIII. *Amendments*

This constitution may be altered by two-thirds vote of the members of the executive council of the local Nazarene young people's society present and voting at any regular or special business meeting, such changes having been recommended by the junior supervisor and the pastor, and with the approval of the executive committee of the local woman's missionary society.

§4. **District Nazarene Young People's Society**

ARTICLE I. *Membership*

All local Nazarene young people's societies within the boundaries of District shall be members of the District Nazarene young people's society.

ARTICLE II. *Convention*

Section 1. There shall be an annual district convention of the Nazarene young people's society at which reports shall be received from the district officers and committee chairmen, zone presidents, and presidents of local societies; and any business pertaining to the district Nazarene young people's society may be transacted.

Sec. 2. The district convention shall be composed of the officers of the district Nazarene young people's society, the District Superintendent, district zone presidents, pastors of local churches, presidents of local societies, and two delegates from each local society of twenty-five or fewer members (including total membership of senior and Hi-N. Y. societies), and one additional delegate for each successive twenty-five members and final major part of twenty-five members.

Sec. 3. One delegate may be appointed by the pastor of each local church not having a fully organized Nazarene young people's society.

ARTICLE III. *Officers*

At the annual district convention there shall be elected by ballot the following district officers: a president, a first vice president, a second vice president, a third vice president, a secretary and a treasurer, to serve until the close of the following annual district convention and until their successors are elected and qualified.

All district officers shall be active members of a local society within the bounds of the district.

ARTICLE IV. *Committees*

At the annual district convention there shall be ordered the following standing committees: missionary, evangelistic, stewardship, and literature. These committees shall be appointed by the district officers in consultation with the District Superintendent.

ARTICLE V. *District Council*

Section 1. The district council shall be composed of the officers of the district Nazarene young people's

society, the District Superintendent, the chairman of standing committees, and the district zone presidents.

Sec. 2. The district council shall fill any vacancy that may occur in the district council between annual conventions.

ARTICLE VI. *District Zones*

The annual district convention may order the district divided into zones.

ARTICLE VII. *Amendments*

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of all the members present and voting at the General Convention of the Nazarene Young People's Society and the approval of the General Assembly.

*[NOTE.—Printed constitutions and bylaws for district and district zone societies may be obtained from General Nazarene Young People's Society, 2923 Troost Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri.]

§5. **General Nazarene Young People's Society**

ARTICLE I. *Membership*

All district and local Nazarene young people's societies shall constitute the General Nazarene Young People's Society.

ARTICLE II. *Convention*

Section 1. There shall be a General Quadrennial Convention of the Nazarene Young People's Society. The length of this convention and the time it shall convene shall be decided upon by the General Council in consultation with the Board of General Superintendents.

Sec. 2. The General Council shall announce the time and place of the General Convention at least ninety days previous to such convention.

Sec. 3. The General Convention shall be composed of the members of the General Council, and two delegates elected by each district Nazarene young people's convention for each two hundred fifty or fewer active

members, and one additional delegate for each successive two hundred fifty active members and the final major fraction of two hundred fifty active members.

Sec. 4. Assembly Districts not having a district N. Y. P. S. organization may elect delegates to the General Convention at the last preceding District Assembly on the same basis as in Article II, Section 3, hereof. Such delegates shall be active members of the Nazarene young people's society.

Sec. 5. Delegates to the General Convention shall be, at the time of the General Convention, members of the Assembly District from which they were elected.

ARTICLE III. *General Council*

Section 1. The General Convention shall elect by majority vote by ballot a general president, a general secretary, and one member from each of the six educational zones in the United States and one member as a representative of Canada and the British Isles, all seven of whom shall be active members of the N. Y. P. S. under forty years of age at the time of their election): all of whom shall constitute a General Council, to serve until the close of the following General Quadrennial Convention or until their successors are elected and qualified.

Sec. 2. One General Superintendent shall be appointed by the Board of General Superintendents as *ex officio* member of the General Council to serve for the quadrennium. The work of said Council shall be subject to the sanction of the Board of General Superintendents.

Sec. 3. The General Council shall nominate to the General Assembly two members of the Council, one of which shall be elected by the General Assembly to serve as a member of the General Board of the Church of the Nazarene as a representative of the Nazarene Young People's Society.

Sec. 4. The General Council, in consultation with the Board of General Superintendents, shall fill any vacancy that may occur in the council between General Conventions.

Sec. 5. The duties of the General Council shall be defined by the bylaws adopted by the General Convention.

ARTICLE IV. *Amendments*

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting at a General Convention of the Nazarene Young People's Society and the approval of the General Assembly.

CHAPTER II

374. CONSTITUTION FOR WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETIES

§1. Local Woman's Foreign Missionary Society

ARTICLE I. *Name*

This organization shall be called the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the church, and shall be auxiliary to the District Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the District of the Church of the Nazarene. This society shall be a constituent part of the local church with which it is connected and subject to the supervision of the pastor and the church board.

In churches where it is so desired chapters may be formed within the W.F.M.S. Each of these chapters shall have a chairman, vice-chairman, secretary, superintendent of study, and treasurer. These chapters, meeting in joint session, shall elect the officers of the W.F.M.S., and the officers so elected shall have general oversight of the entire society. The W.F.M.S. President shall represent the society on the church board and the W.F.M.S. Treasurers shall forward all funds to the District W.F.M.S. Treasurer.

ARTICLE II. *Object*

The object of this society shall be to enlist the women, young women and children of the church in active missionary service, in united prayer, and in the study of

the salvation needs of the world; to promote a wider knowledge of the mission fields of the Church of the Nazarene; and to raise funds as elsewhere provided for in this Constitution.

ARTICLE III. *Membership*

The membership shall be divided into three classes as follows:

Section 1. ACTIVE MEMBERS. Any woman who is a member of the Church of the Nazarene may become an active member of this society by giving prayer and service and paying dues.

Sec. 2. ASSOCIATE MEMBERS. Any member of the Church of the Nazarene who desires to do so may become an associate member by paying regular dues. They may take part in the devotional exercises and the mission study. Associate members may not vote or hold office.

Sec. 3. HONORARY MEMBERS. Any person not a member of the Church of the Nazarene, but in sympathy with the object of this society and desiring to do missionary work through this organization and the Church of the Nazarene, may become an honorary member by paying regular dues. Honorary members may not vote or hold office.

ARTICLE IV. *Life Membership*

Life Membership shall be conferred upon a member, whether active or associate, by the payment of \$25.00. An Honorary Life Membership shall be conferred upon any person by the payment of \$100.00. Those who hold life memberships are not exempt from the payment of regular dues. The amounts paid for all life memberships must be raised for this purpose only.

ARTICLE V. *Officers*

The officers of this society shall be a president; two vice-presidents; a corresponding secretary; a recording secretary; a treasurer; a superintendent of study; and a superintendent of publicity to be elected by ballot annually by the members of the society. These officers shall constitute an executive committee.

ARTICLE VI. Meetings

There shall be one or more meetings for business, missionary study and prayer, held each month. The last regular monthly meeting prior to the annual District Assembly shall be the annual meeting of this society, at which officers shall be elected for the ensuing year. These officers shall be installed at the first regular monthly meeting following the District Assembly.

ARTICLE VII. Funds

All funds raised by the local W.F.M.S. for the general interests of the Church of the Nazarene, except the Relief and Retirement Fund and the General Expense Fund, shall be paid into the General Budget through W.F.M.S. channels to the credit of the local church to which this society is subsidiary, until the General Budget apportionment of the local church be paid in full for the year, after which all such funds may be devoted to foreign missions exclusively.

Funds for the support of general interests shall be raised in the following manner: 1. From the regular dues of the members; 2. From money raised for all life memberships; 3. From gifts and offerings designated for general interests; 4. From the Prayer and Fasting League; 5. From the Thank Offering which is an annual freewill offering.

These funds must be raised by using the plans given under the different departments of our organization. Since our church is strictly opposed to our engaging in any form of merchandising, we, as a W.F.M.S. must insist that our women do not engage in the sale of merchandise or foods in the name of the W.F.M.S.

No part of the above funds shall be used for local or district expense or charitable purposes.

ARTICLE VIII. Relief and Retirement Fund.

The Relief and Retirement Fund, to be held in trust by the treasurer of the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council and to be used for the relief of sick, needy, or retired foreign missionaries, shall be raised by: 1. Placing of names on the memorial roll

by the payment of \$25.00 for that special purpose; 2. By annual payments by members of ten cents each; 3. By freewill offerings or gifts designated for the Relief and Retirement Fund.

ARTICLE IX. *General Expense Fund*

Each member shall contribute fifteen cents annually for the General Expense Fund. This fund provides for the expenses of the General Officers in connection with their services for the Council and also for Council supplies.

ARTICLE X. *Specials*

Opportunity shall be given to make offerings for the support of the foreign missionary work, such contributions to be known as specials. These offerings must be in addition to General Budget apportionments and for specials approved by the Department of Foreign Missions.

ARTICLE XI. *Amendments*

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any Quadrennial Convention of the W.F.M.S. subject to the approval of the Department of Foreign Missions.

§2. *Young Woman's Foreign Missionary Society*

ARTICLE I. *Name*

This organization shall be called the Young Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the church, and shall be auxiliary to the District Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the District of the Church of the Nazarene. This society shall be a constituent part of the local church with which it is connected and subject to the supervision of the pastor and of the church board.

ARTICLE II. *Object*

The object of this society shall be to enlist the young women of the church in active missionary service, in united prayer; and in the study of the salvation needs of the world; to promote a wider knowledge of the

mission fields of the Church of the Nazarene, and to raise funds as elsewhere provided for in this Constitution.

ARTICLE III. *Membership*

Age for membership in the society shall be from 14 to 32. Where the church is large enough there shall be provision made for a Teen Age chapter between the ages of 14 and 18.

The membership shall be divided into three classes, as follows:

Section 1. ACTIVE MEMBERS. Any young woman who is a member of the Church of the Nazarene may become an active member of this society by giving prayer and service and paying dues. Those in the Teen Age group may be active members by paying dues or giving a freewill offering.

Sec. 2. ASSOCIATE MEMBERS. Any young person who is a member of the Church of the Nazarene who desires to do so may become an associate member by paying the regular dues. They may take part in the devotional exercises and the mission study. Associate members may not vote or hold office.

Sec. 3. HONORARY MEMBERS. Any young person not a member of the Church of the Nazarene, but in sympathy with the object of this society and desiring to do missionary work through this organization and the Church of the Nazarene may become an honorary member by paying the regular dues. Honorary members may not vote or hold office.

ARTICLE IV. *Life Membership*

Life membership shall be conferred upon a member of the Teen Age group, whether active or associate, by the payment of \$15.00; upon a member of the older group, whether active or associate, by the payment of \$25.00.

Honorary Life Membership shall be conferred upon a member of the Teen Age group, whether active or associate, by the payment of \$50.00; upon a member of the older group, whether active or associate, by the payment of \$100.00.

Those who hold life memberships are not exempt from the payment of regular dues. The amounts paid for all life memberships must be raised for that purpose only.

ARTICLE V. *Officers*

The officers of this society shall be a president, a vice president, a corresponding secretary, a recording secretary, a treasurer, a superintendent of study, and a superintendent of publicity, to be elected by ballot annually by the members of the society. These officers shall constitute an executive committee.

ARTICLE VI. *Meetings*

This society shall hold one or more meetings each month for the transaction of business, for the study of missionary work, and for united prayer.

The last regular monthly meeting prior to the annual District Assembly shall be the annual meeting of this society, at which officers shall be elected for the ensuing year.

The newly elected officers shall be installed at the first regular monthly meeting following the District Assembly.

ARTICLE VII. *Funds*

All funds raised by the local Y.W.F.M.S. for the general interests of the Church of the Nazarene, except the Relief and Retirement fund and the general expense Fund, shall be paid into the General Budget through Y.W.F.M.S. channels to the credit of the local church to which this society is subsidiary, until the General Budget apportionment of the local church be paid in full for the year, after which all such funds may be devoted to foreign missions exclusively.

Funds for the support of general interests shall be raised in the following manner:

1. From the regular dues of the members.
2. From monies raised for all life memberships.
3. From gifts and offerings designated for the general interests.

4. From the Prayer and Fasting League.
5. From the Thank Offering which is an annual free-will offering.

No part of the above funds shall be used for local or district expenses or charitable purposes.

ARTICLE VIII. *Relief and Retirement Fund.*

The Relief and Retirement Fund to be held in trust by the treasurer of the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council, and to be used for the relief of sick, needy or retired foreign missionaries, shall be raised by (1) The placing of names on the memorial roll upon the payment of \$15.00 for a member of the Teen Age group, and \$25.00 for a member of the older group, for that special purpose. (2) By annual payments by members of 10 cents each. (3) By freewill offerings or gifts designated for the Relief and Retirement Fund.

ARTICLE IX. *General and District Expense Funds*

Section 1. Each member shall contribute fifteen cents annually for the General Expense Fund. This fund provides for the expense of the General Officers in connection with their service for the Council, and for Council supplies.

Sec. 2. DISTRICT EXPENSE. Each member shall contribute annually to the District Expense Fund, the amount to be determined by each district. This fund shall be kept separate for the use of the Y.W.F.M.S. for its own expense.

ARTICLE X. *Specials*

Opportunity shall be given to make offerings for the support of the foreign missionary work, such contributions to be known as specials. These offerings must be in addition to General Budget apportionments, and for specials approved by the Department of Foreign Missions.

ARTICLE XI. *Representation in the District W.F.M.S. Annual Meeting*

This society shall be represented in the District W.F.M.S. annual meeting by the president, one delegate for

every 10 active members or less, and an additional delegate for each additional 10 active members or major fraction thereof; and by the members of the District Y.W.F.M.S. Committee. In the absence of the president, the vice president may take her place.

ARTICLE XII. *District Committee*

When a district has six or more Y.W.F.M.S. Societies, there shall be elected, subject to the approval of the Annual District W.F.M.S. meeting, five officers: a president, a vice president, a secretary, a superintendent of study, and a superintendent of publicity, who shall constitute the District Y.W.F.M.S. Committee. These officers shall be elected by ballot annually by the Y.W.F.M.S. representatives in the District Annual Meeting. They shall have, with the co-operation of the first vice president of the Woman's District Foreign Missionary Society, supervision of the work.

ARTICLE XIII. *Amendments*

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any Quadrennial Convention of the W.F.M.S. subject to the approval of the Department of Foreign Missions.

§3. *District Woman's Foreign Missionary Society*

ARTICLE I. *Name*

This organization shall be called the District Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and shall be auxiliary to the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council of the Church of the Nazarene. This society shall be under the supervision of the District Superintendent, the district advisory board, and the District Assembly.

ARTICLE II. *Object*

The object of this society shall be to awaken interest in the sacred cause of missions by: 1. Organizing local woman's foreign missionary societies; 2. Holding missionary conventions; 3. Planning for systematic mission study and circulation of missionary literature; 4. Pro-

moting interest in Christian stewardship and in regular and generous contributions; 5. Encouraging the women to earnest, believing prayer; and 6. The intelligent and godly supervising of the work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society in the district.

ARTICLE III. *Annual Meeting*

The annual meeting shall be held primarily for the purpose of hearing complete reports of what has been accomplished during the year; to elect by ballot the District Officers and departmental secretaries; to unite in prayer for the work; and to make aggressive plans for its enlargement. At this time if there are six or more organized Y.W.F.M.S. in the District, there shall be elected, subject to the approval of the District W.F.M.S. annual meeting, five officers, a president, a vice president, a secretary, a superintendent of study, and a superintendent of publicity, who shall constitute the District Y.W.F.M.S. Committee. These officers shall be elected by ballot annually by the Y.W.F.M.S. representatives in the District annual meeting. They shall have, with the co-operation of the first vice president of the Woman's District Foreign Missionary Society, supervision of the work.

ARTICLE IV. *Membership*

The District W. F. M. Society shall be composed of the following members: the District Executive Committee; the presidents (or vice presidents if the president is unable to attend) of all local societies, both W. F. M. and Y. W. F. M. Societies; one delegate from each of the organizations having an active membership of 10 or less, and an additional delegate for each additional ten active members (or major fraction thereof); the second vice president of societies having a junior society; the District Y.W.F.M.S. Committee; and General Council members holding church membership in the district.

ARTICLE V. *Officers*

The officers of this society shall be a president, two vice presidents a corresponding secretary, a recording

secretary, a treasurer, a superintendent of study, and a superintendent of publicity. These officers shall be elected by ballot at the annual session of the Woman's District Foreign Missionary Society, and shall constitute the executive committee.

ARTICLE VI. *Amendments*

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of any Quadrennial Convention of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, subject to the approval of the Department of Foreign Missions.

§4. **Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council**

ARTICLE I. *Name*

This organization shall be called the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council of the Church of the Nazarene, an auxiliary to the Department of Foreign Missions.

ARTICLE II. *Object*

The object of this Council shall be to plan and encourage the work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society throughout the church of the Nazarene.

ARTICLE III. *Membership*

The Council is to consist of 16 members elected by the Quadrennial Convention and approved by the Department of Foreign Missions. Of these fourteen shall be elected from the United States, one from the British Isles and one from Canada.

ARTICLE IV. *Meetings*

The Council shall meet annually during the time of the General Board sessions to transact business. Seven shall constitute a quorum. For this meeting the expense of the Council shall be provided. In the case of the British Isles District, special provision shall be made by the Council and prevailing conditions.

ARTICLE V. *Quadrennial Convention*

Section 1. There shall be a Quadrennial Convention, the time and place to be decided upon by the General Council in consultation with the Department of Foreign Missions

Sec. 2. MEMBERS. This Convention shall be composed of the following members: Members of the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council; the presidents, first vice-presidents and second vice presidents of the District W.F.M. Societies; the presidents of the District Y.W.F.M. Committees; one delegate from each district of 500 or fewer active members; and one additional delegate for each 500 (or major part thereof) active members in the W.F.M.S.; one Y.W.F.M.S. delegate for each district of 500 or fewer active members of the Y.W.F.M.S.; and one additional delegate for each 500 (or major part thereof) active members of the Y.W.F.M.S. When the president of the district is not able to attend, one of the vice presidents of the district according to their order may take her place. When the president of the District Y.W.F.M.S. Committee is unable to attend, one of the District Committee may be elected to take her place. Other vacancies in the delegation may be filled by elected delegates and alternates. The Presidents of the foreign W.F.M.S. Districts are members of the Convention. If the president is unable to attend, an alternate may take her place.

All of the above elections must take place at the last annual District Convention preceding the Quadrennial Convention. (No other method of election may be substituted.)

Sec. 3. (a) Election of Council. Nominations: The nominating committee shall consist of one woman from each of the Educational zones and shall present three times the number of names required for the election of the Council. Each District W.F.M.S. shall have the privilege of recommending one name to the nominating committee, said committee to supply other necessary names.

(b) The Convention shall elect by a majority vote, by ballot, a Council of sixteen women, fourteen from the United States; one from the British Isles and one from Canada. This election shall be approved by the Department of Foreign Missions.

ARTICLE VI. *Officers*

Section 1. The General President shall be elected by ballot by the Quadrennial Convention. She shall by virtue of her office, be a member of the Council.

Sec. 2. When the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council shall have been elected for the ensuing four years, it shall elect from its own members the following officers by ballot. An executive vice president; a first vice president; a second vice president; a secretary; a treasurer; a superintendent of study; and a superintendent of publicity. These officers together with the General President shall constitute an executive committee, five of whom shall form a quorum. They shall hold office until the final adjournment of the next General Assembly and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Council shall also elect the secretaries of their various departments, and the chairmen of such standing committees as it shall deem necessary.

ARTICLE VII. *Vacancies*

Section 1. Should a vacancy occur in the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council during the quadrennium, the vacancy shall be filled by majority vote of the members of the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council, and approved by the Department of Foreign Missions.

Sec. 2. Should a vacancy occur in the Executive Committee during the Quadrennium, the vacancy shall be filled by majority vote of the members of the Woman's General Foreign Missionary Council. But, only members of the said Council are eligible to office on the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VIII. *Representation on the General Board*

The Council shall nominate to the Department of Foreign Missions two members of the Council, one of whom shall be elected by the General Assembly to serve in the Department of Foreign Missions and on the General Board until the final adjournment of the next regular General Assembly and until her successor is elected and qualified.

ARTICLE IX. *Amendments*

This Constitution may be amended by two-thirds vote of any Quadrennial Convention of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society subject to the approval of the Department of Foreign Missions.

CHAPTER III

SUNDAY BIBLE SCHOOLS

374a. *Bylaws of the Sunday Bible School*

NOTE.—These bylaws are entirely suggestive and are to be arranged to meet the needs of the local school by the church school board.

ARTICLE I. *Membership*

Section 1. Membership in the Sunday Bible school of the Church of the Nazarene is open to all who desire the help and association this school offers and who consent to become members under the provisions of the Manual and these bylaws. Membership shall be classified according to 109, §4, of the *Manual*.

Sec. 2. All persons eligible to active membership will be considered visitors the first session of the school they attend. If they are present the next Sunday and declare their willingness to attend with some degree of regularity their names may be placed on the roll as active members. Those coming from other Nazarene Sunday Bible schools may be enrolled at once. Cradle roll members and home department members shall be enrolled by the supervisors of the respective departments.

Sec. 3. Active members may be dropped from the roll whenever they have absented themselves from the class sessions six consecutive times without a reasonable excuse. Cradle roll members shall be confined to homes of the community where help can be rendered, and should be transferred promptly to active membership when the proper time is reached—the fourth birthday or shortly thereafter.

ARTICLE II. *Classes and Departments*

Section 1. For the teaching work and certain group activities the Sunday Bible school shall be divided into classes on the basis of age and other conditions. Each class shall be under the care of a competent teacher suited to the group age.

Note: For greater efficiency in the teaching work and the promoting of the school interests it is quite desirable, when the school is of sufficient size, that it shall be departmentized with the department supervisors and councils. The Department of Church Schools will furnish full instructions for properly departmentizing the school and adjusting the bylaws.

Note: Each class of sufficient age should undertake some definite Christian service. Training for service is a part of our objective. To do this efficiently there should be a simple class organization. The Department of Church Schools will furnish plans for this class organization.

ARTICLE III. *Officers and their Duties*

Section 1. The officers of the Sunday Bible school shall be a superintendent, an assistant superintendent, a secretary and a treasurer, and such other officers as may be needed. These shall be elected by the church school board, according to the *Manual*, paragraph 108.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the superintendent (a) to administer the affairs of the school according to the provisions of the *Manual* and the bylaws; (b) to counsel with the teachers relative to their work; (c) to give an annual report to the annual church meeting; (d) to attend the District Assembly; (3) to co-operate with the district church school board and Department of Church Schools in the promotion of the church school work.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the assistant superintendent to co-operate with the superintendent in the promotion of the best interest of the school, and in the absence of the superintendent to perform the administrative duties belonging to his office.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the secretary (a) to keep an accurate record of the enrollment of the entire school (regular enrollment cards should be used), the record of attendance, absentees, visitors, and such other items as may be required; (b) to keep correct minutes of all meetings of the Sunday Bible school cabinet; (c) and to fill out and forward promptly all statistical and informational blanks requested by the pastor, the district church school board and the Department of Church Schools.

Sec. 5. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive all funds raised by the Sunday Bible school and disburse the same as directed by the cabinet in harmony with the general rules laid down by the church school board. He shall keep an accurate account of all finances and make a monthly, detailed report to the cabinet and a quarterly report to the church school board of all receipts, expenditures and obligations. He shall, in co-operation with the officers and teachers, endeavor to impart proper instruction relative to Christian stewardship.

NOTE—In the small school one person may serve as Secretary-Treasurer.

In the larger schools there may be two or more assistant superintendents, and these may be made heads of certain promotional work—membership, missionary, temperance, etc.

Also, it is well to have a librarian whose duty will be (a) to have charge of all Sunday Bible school literature, books and periodicals and direct their proper distribution; (b) to promote and have charge of a worker's library; (c) to create through the school an appreciation for wholesome literature and encourage the reading of the same.

A music committee with the following duties may be profitable: (a) to have general charge of the music of the school; (b) to see that proper persons are selected to lead the singing and play the musical instruments; (c) to see that proper song books are provided for each department; (d) to create throughout the school an appreciation for wholesome music in Christian worship and character building; (e) to organize and promote such ensemble work as may be desirable and helpful.

In case the school is departmentized the following should be added :

It shall be the duty of the Department Supervisor (a) to have immediate supervision of his department, in harmony with the *Manual* and the bylaws of the Sunday Bible school; (b) to attend all cabinet meetings, and to preside at all meetings of the department council; (c) with the superintendent to nominate to the pastor such teachers as may be needed, and provide such other officers and helpers as may be required for the most efficient work of the department; and (d) to co-operate with the pastor and superintendent in their plans for the general advancement of the school.

ARTICLE IV. *Administration and Supervision*

Section 1. This school is an organic part of the local church, and of the local church educational program. It is under the general supervision of the church school board, the care of the pastor, and the immediate leadership of the Sunday Bible school superintendent.

Sec. 2. There shall be a Sunday Bible school cabinet in which the administrative work of the school is vested. The cabinet shall consist of the church school board and the general officers of the Sunday Bible school, or, the general officers of the Sunday Bible school, the department supervisor, and teachers. This cabinet is the executive body of the school and shall meet regularly on the day of each week (or month, with the pastor presiding. This cabinet shall consider (a) the general interests of the school and lay and execute plans for the realization of these interests; and (b) recommend to the church school board such matters as should have its consideration.

Sec. 3. A general Sunday Bible school conference shall be held the day of each quarter, with the pastor presiding. This conference shall consist of the church school board, the Sunday Bible school cabinet, and the department councils. This will not be a meeting for the transaction of business, but for inspiration, study and discussion. General policies may be formed and conclusions drawn to be passed on to the proper executive body for official action and execution. A well arranged program must be provided for each conference meeting.

ARTICLE V. *Amendments*

These bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the church school board at any regular meeting, or at a meeting especially called for this purpose, the proposed change having been proposed at least one week prior to the time of the meeting; and provided, that such change shall not conflict with any legislation contained in the Manual of the Church of the Nazarene.

CHAPTER III

GENERAL ASSEMBLY REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS

413. Relating to Communism

Resolved, that the Church of the Nazarene in the Ninth General Assembly asserts unequivocally its stand against the world wide menace of communism, and affirms the necessity for Christian citizenship and patriotism in this age when the foundations of human society and government are seriously threatened by the forces of atheistic political radicalism. [Adopted by General Assembly, 1936.]

414. Relating to Annuities

That our general boards and institutions be prohibited from using annuity gifts until such have become the valid property by the death of the annuitant, and that such annuity gifts be carefully invested in funds usually accepted as trust funds by the courts of our land. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1923.]

415. Relating to Debt

That no institution incur any debt on the strength of pledges, and that pledges be not counted as assets until actually paid. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1923.]

416. Relating to Credentials of General Assembly Delegates

§1. That it is illegal to seat visitors not regularly elected as alternates in the place of delegates not present. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1919.]

§2. That these [visitors] not being elected alternates cannot be seated. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1923.]

§3. That since Rev. has transferred from his former Assembly District and his transfer has been accepted, he has lost all rights of membership in his former Assembly District, and would therefore be ineligible to be seated as a delegate from the Assembly District in which he formerly held his membership. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1928.]

§4. Regarding those chosen by the district advisory boards and General Assembly delegations from Arizona, Northern California, Kentucky, Georgia, Michigan, Rocky Mountain, Manitoba-Saskatchewan, and Northwest Districts to be members of this General Assembly, it is the opinion of your Committee on Credentials that their methods of selection contravene the principles laid down by the 1919 General Assembly and restated by subsequent General Assembly sessions, as recorded in 408, §1, of the 1928 *Manual*; and also a violation of the requirements of the 1928 *Manual*,

129 §23, and 230, for the choosing of General Assembly delegates. Your Committee deems such methods of selection of delegates to the General Assembly as illegal and therefore recommends that the above be not seated. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1932.]

§5. Your committee was asked to rule as to "what action should be taken when an elder is elected to the General Assembly but before the convening of the Assembly the same elected elder transferred and is received to another district. Is he still qualified to act as delegate to the General Assembly from the District which he left?"

In accordance with the action taken by the Seventh General Assembly (Journal 98, §220, and referred to in *Manual* of 1932, 416, §3) your committee rules that such elder is ineligible to be seated in the assembly as a representative of the district which he left. [Adopted by the General Assembly of 1936.]

417. Relating to Athletics in Nazarene Colleges

We recommend that it be definitely provided that schools and colleges of the Church of the Nazarene engage only in intra-mural athletics. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1940.]

417a. Relating to Dramatics in Schools and Colleges

Whereas, There is danger in the excessive use of dramatical productions in our schools and colleges; be it

Resolved, That this practice be carefully restricted and greater emphasis be placed on the spiritual exercise that leads to sound Christian experience. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1940.]

418. Relating to Judiciary Actions

§1. Has the district advisory board the right to transfer a member of the District Assembly to another denomination?

Ans. The district advisory board has no authority to transfer a member of the District Assembly to another denomination.

§2. (a) Does a District Superintendent have the right to give his written approval to the sale of church property without the consent of the district advisory board?

(b) Does he need the consent of the district advisory board?

Ans. (a) The District Superintendent does have the right to give his written approval of the sale of church property without the approval of the district advisory board.

(b) He does not need the consent of the district advisory board.

§3. Relating to General Rules 20 §2 (7) "membership in or fellowship with oathbound, secret orders or fraternities."

(a) Does this mean that the Church of the Nazarene will not permit its members to hold their former insurance in this class of orders providing that the fees are paid for this purpose only and there is no fellowship with the organization?

(b) Does a church have the right to maintain the membership of a person when he holds membership in a secret order solely for the purpose of keeping his insurance while it bars from membership other persons because they are members of the same order?

Ans. (a) (b) According to 20, §2 (7) of our *Manual*, one cannot be a member of the Church of the Nazarene while holding membership in an oathbound, secret order.

§4. A woman marries a man who had been previously married and unscripturally divorced. Would she be barred from membership in the Church of the Nazarene providing her own individual case met the requirements for membership?

Ans. Such a person as that referred to would be barred from membership in the Church of the Nazarene.

§5. General Rules 20 §2 (3) relating to "the use of tobacco in any of its forms, or the trafficking therein."

Does this prohibit church membership in the Church of the Nazarene to a person who is employed in a store, either as clerk or manager, where among other things he is obliged to sell tobacco?

Ans. There is a distinction between trafficking as the owner of a business and selling as a clerk; and therefore, we would not interpret the selling as a clerk as violating the letter of the *Manual*.

§6. At a church meeting called for the purpose of voting on the recall of a pastor, is it legal to count the votes of members not present at the time of such voting?

Ans. It would be illegal to count the votes of members not present when voting on the recall of a pastor.

§7. If a licensed minister meet all the requirements for the renewal of his license according to 204, is the District Assembly obliged to renew such license?

Ans. A District Assembly is not under obligation according to 204 to renew said license.

§8. A church has a debt on its property. It elects a finance committee of three who are members of the church board with instructions to receive and disburse all money which applies to the church debt. Has the church the right to make this committee custodian of that part of the church funds and to receive and disburse the same independent of the regularly elected church treasurer?

Ans. The church does have such a right.

§9. A pastor resigns. The District Superintendent calls the church board together to consider the appointment of a man to fill the vacancy until the next District Assembly. He finds that the church board had previously held a meeting and elected a man for the pastorate for the remainder of the District Assembly year, and also had called him for the year following. Is the church acting within its rights?

Ans. The church was not acting within its rights.

§10. In case a District Superintendent and pastor fail to investigate charges filed against a minister in their Assembly District as directed in 304 §§1, 2 of the *Manual*, does this incriminate the District Superintendent or the pastor for failure to make this investigation?

Ans. A District Superintendent would be incriminated if he failed to investigate written accusations against a minister in his Assembly District. The fact of his amenability to his District Assembly is evidence that he will be subject to charges for failing to discharge his official duty. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1928.]

§11. Is a vote naming an office merely, and not a person—an elder—for ministerial delegate to the General Assembly legal? The conclusion reached should apply to a layman as well as a ministerial nominee.

Ans. It is our opinion that, in interpretation of Part III, Article IV, Section 2, of our Constitution, the naming of an office does not constitute a legal ballot for either ministerial or lay delegate to the General Assembly.

§12. Your Committee [on Judiciary] reports on Memorial No. 301, concerning the constitutionality of an age limit for voting, that it is our opinion that the setting by this General Assembly of an age limit for voting is not contrary to our Constitution. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1932.]

§13. Clarify the status of an elder who may be dropped from the local membership roll on account of absence of over a six-month period, which is unsatisfactorily explained, and the non-support of the church during this period. If a local church drops his name from the roll, what is his Assembly relationship?

Ans. It is the opinion of the Committee on Judiciary that the dropping of an elder from the church roll of which he is a member, under the conditions mentioned, cannot affect his status as a member of his Assembly District. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1940.]

419. Relating to Public Bathing Places

Resolved, That this General Assembly go on record as being unqualifiedly opposed to our people's patronizing promiscuous public bathing places. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1928.]

420. Relating to Appointment of Pastors for Small Churches

That this General Assembly advise the appointment of pastors for churches that have been organized for less than two years, or that have less than twenty-five voting members, or that pay less than ten dollars per week, by the General Superintendent, the District Superintendent, and the district advisory board with the consent of the delegates at the District Assembly. In case of a vacancy in the pastorate in such churches in the interim between District Assemblies, such should be filled by the appointment of the District Superintendent. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1936.]

421. Relating to Parliamentary Procedure

We recommend the adoption of Robert's Rules of Order and Neely's Parliamentary Practice when no definite method of parliamentary procedure is indicated in the *Manual*. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1940.]

422 Relating to Our Financial Policy

First. We recommend that the General Assembly continue the budget system of general finances.

It is our opinion, however, that the primary essential of success in this regard is the full co-operation of every department of the church. Therefore

Second. We recommend that all general funds raised by each department of each local church, including the woman's foreign missionary society, after its fixed items of relief and retirement and general contingent have been excepted, shall be paid into the general budget until the general budget apportionment of the local church be paid in full for the year. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1932.]

Voted: That the present system of including all general interests in one unified budget be continued.

Voted: That the following items be fixed in the general budget: church extension, General Assembly, General Board, General Superintendents' Expense, General Treasurer. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1936.]

423. Relating to Church History

The General Assembly ordered a Committee on Church History and elected Rev. M. E. Redford, Prof. Clinton Bushey and Rev. Roy E. Swim to be the Committee. And

That the expenses of the Committee on History be paid from the general contingent fund under the approval of the Board of General Superintendents.

The Book Committee, the Board of General Superintendents, the General Church Secretary, and the Committee on History were authorized at their discretion to prepare a history of the Church of the Nazarene. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1936.]

424. Relating to Storehouse Tithing

Storehouse tithing is clearly both the scriptural and practical performance of faithfully and regularly placing the tithe in that church to which the member belongs.

Upon careful reflection the local church is the only storehouse properly recognizable in a scriptural sense. Therefore, to widen the scope of the definition but weakens its import and value. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1932.]

425. Relating to Sunday Bible Schools in the British Isles

Relative to Memorial No. 97 from the British Isles District, requesting "That, in view of the nature of the work of the Sunday Bible school in the British Isles, the District be allowed to develop a constitution suitable for their purposes," we concur, but recommend that their constitution and bylaws be submitted to

the Department of Church Schools for approval.
[Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1932.]

426. Relating to Retirement Pension of General Superintendents

The schedule of pensions for retired General Superintendents shall be as follows:

1. A retired General Superintendent having served at least twenty years shall be eligible to receive the maximum pension of \$1,500.00 a year.

2. A retired General Superintendent having served twelve years shall be eligible to receive the minimum General Superintendent's pension.

3. A retired General Superintendent having served between twelve and twenty years shall be eligible to receive an amount proportionate to the number of years of service.

4. The widow of a General Superintendent shall be eligible to fifty per cent of the pension allowable to her husband; unless she remarries. [253 §2b.] [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1940.]

428. Relating to Foreign Missionary Activities Among Young People

That the missionary activities of the Nazarene Young People's Society be continued as heretofore, and that there be no separate organization for foreign missionary activities among young people, except that of the Young Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, an auxiliary of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, in which, according to the present Young Woman's Foreign Missionary Society Constitution, young men may become associate members.

428. Relating to Bible Societies

WHEREAS, the Church of the Nazarene places special emphasis upon the Bible as the written revelation of God, and that we do believe that it is the only effective agency to win new followers to Jesus Christ, and be-

cause there is an increasing need for more copies of the Scriptures; therefore be it

Resolved, First, that the General Assembly express its hearty approval of and sympathy with the work of the American Bible Society in the United States, the British and Foreign Bible Society in England and Canada, and the National Bible Society of Scotland;

Second, that this Assembly endorse the observance of Universal Bible Sunday in December, directing attention of their respective congregations on this day to the essential place the Scriptures should occupy in the lives of Christian people;

Third, that whenever it is convenient an offering be taken by each congregation on Universal Bible Sunday for the world wide missionary work of the various Bible societies, the same to be forwarded to our denominational Headquarters, 2923 Troost Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri, U.S.A.;

Fourth, that the General Assembly authorize its General Church Secretary, or an alternate whom he may appoint, to attend during the ensuing quadrennium each annual session of the Advisory Council of the American Bible Society held in December at Bible House in New York City. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1936.]

429. Relating to Offering for Bible Societies

Resolved, that the Church of the Nazarene designate the first Sunday of December of each year as a special time for the presentation of this important matter and the taking of an offering for the American Bible Society in the United States, and the respective Bible Societies in Canada and the British Isles; also that a special effort be made to have all of our churches take part in such an offering. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1936.]

[NOTE.—It is understood that our churches in Scotland send their contributions to the National Bible Society of Scotland, the churches in England to the British and Foreign Bible Society, and the churches of Canada to the British and Foreign Bible Society of Canada. The churches of the United States contribute to the support of the American Bible Society.]

430. Relating to the General Council of Education

In view of the fact that there has been a feeling that a more positive co-ordination of our educational work with that of the general church is not only desirable, but imperative to the best interests of the cause of education, therefore

§1. We recommend, the formation of the General Council of Education to be composed of one representative from each institution.

§2. The function of this Council shall be to consider all matters relating to our educational work referred to it by the various institutions or otherwise. A further function of this Council shall be to study carefully the educational needs and qualifications in the light of proper educational standards and make recommendations concerning the same to the Department of Education. The Council shall meet annually and the expense of said meeting is to be borne by the various institutions represented.

§3. We recommend, that such major matters as the erection of new buildings, the purchase or sale of property, or the creating of any indebtedness in the capital accounts, involving more than ten thousand dollars [\$10,000.00], must have the approval of the supporting Districts, *provided also*, that such Districts represent the majority of the membership of the supporting zone, together with the approval of the General Council of Education and the approval of the General Board and the Board of General Superintendents.

In other words, this places each institution in vital relation to the general church for the institutions would be directly amenable to their respective supporting Districts and also subject to the approval of the General Council of Education, the General Board and the Board of General Superintendents.

§4. We also recommend, that our schools adhere strictly to the action of the General Board of Education taken in 1921, requiring our schools and colleges so to adjust their current expense budgets as to be able to operate without an accumulation of annual deficits.

§5. We recommend, that the functions of the Educational Secretary shall be to make investigations concerning financial and scholastic needs and possibilities of our educational institutions. He shall further serve our schools and people in connection with the development of a more favorable sentiment regarding our educational work and the securing of General funds and permanent endowments. The expense of such service shall be borne jointly by the schools affected and the Department of Education [Adopted by *General Assembly, 1932.*]

431. Relating to Ministerial Relief and Pensions

§1. We recognize that there is no interest more vitally affecting the whole wide program of evangelism than the support of the gospel worker while he labors, and his treatment at the hands of the church when his advancing years compel his retirement. Therefore we propose the following as the forward looking program for the Department of Ministerial Relief for the next quadrennium:

This quadrennium should witness an aggressive presentation of the Ministers' Pension Plan to our District Assemblies in order to enlist the largest number possible in the promotion of the Pension Plan that will give to the church adequate provision for the future of the old age of our ministers.

Thousands of our people who are in the habit of remembering their friends in honor of our Lord's Birthday anniversary would be delighted to make a contribution to a Christmas fund from which the Department would be able to make an extra Christmas appropriation for each of the needy ministerial relief annuitants. We ask that the Department be permitted to request voluntary contributions at or before Christmas time for this purpose, the same not to be applied on the general budget. [Concurred in and adopted by the *General Assembly, 1932.*]

432. Relating to Use of Church Buildings

This General Assembly goes on record as being opposed to any part of our church buildings being used

for recreational and entertainment purposes. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1940.]

433. Relating to Leadership Training Promotion

That the month of October in each year of the quadrennium be known as Leadership Training Month in which, under the guidance of the Department, church-wide impetus shall be given to the promotion of training classes. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1940.]

434. Relating to Correlation of Subsidiary Organizations

That this General Assembly take action that will place authority in a committee composed of one representative from the Department of Church Schools, one from the W.F.M.S., one from the N.Y.P.S., the Manager of the Nazarene Publishing House, and one General Superintendent to supervise the educational program for these departments, whose decisions shall be accepted by the three departments, thus preventing possibility of friction, complications and duplications. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1940.]

435. Relating to Legislative Amendments to the Manual

Resolved, that all legislative amendments to the *Manual* made by the Tenth General Assembly shall be effective upon such date as may be announced in the *Herald of Holiness* by the Board of General Superintendents. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1940,]

436. Relating to Adoption of the Manual as Amended

Resolved, that the *Manual* be adopted as amended by the Tenth General Assembly. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1940.]

437. Relating to Manual Editing

Resolved, that the Manual Editing Committee be and they are hereby authorized to harmonize conflicting statements, which may appear in the record of the actions of the Tenth General Assembly in regard to changes in the *Manual* and also to make such editorial changes in the text of the present *Manual* as will correct the language without altering the meaning; also to make such editorial changes in the copy of the newly adopted matter as may serve to correct the language without altering the meaning.

The Manual Editing Committee is hereby further authorized to eliminate obsolete material from the Appendix of the *Manual*, to substitute plainly understood words or expressions for confusing words or expressions, to revise the numbering of chapters, paragraphs, sections, and other divisions of the *Manual* in harmony with any actions adopted by the Tenth General Assembly. [Adopted by *General Assembly*, 1940.]



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
